## Scandal in New York

Millionaire Sage Defendant in a Suit For \$10,000 Damages.

Charged With Betrayal Under Promise of Marriage.

The Matter Kept Quiet for 25 Years-An Alleged Case of Blackmail,

New York, July 19.—The story that Russell Sage, the millionaire, is defendant in a suit to recover \$10,000 for betrayal under promise of marriage was revealed yesterday by proceedings in the Court of Common Pleas, when the court denied the motion that an order extending the defendant's time to answer be vacated. The complaint was served April 29 last, and a partial answer filed June 26.

Several conflicting statements have been made in the case, apparently to conceal the

The plaintiff is Miss Della Kegan, of No. 425 West Thirty-ninth street. She alleges that she came to this country from Ireland in 1868. Her sister was then employed as a cook in Russell Sage's home, and Miss Della went there to stop temporarily with her while she was looking for a situation. She alleges that Mr. Sage, who at the time was a widower, there betrayed her under promise of marriage, and then was cognizant of a criminal operation that was afterwards performed.







AMPERES AND WATTS.

Be Well in Their Way, But He Wanted to Encw How the Car Went.

An old man from somewhere beyond the suburbs stood yesterday on a Forty-seventh street cerner watching a trolley car moving swiftly eastward with a heavy load of passengers.
