At the Opera House.

It was one of the most notable occasions in the history of the Grand Opera House. The gathering was unique-first, for its enormous size; second, for its personality. It was composed almost exclusively of women, and women managed it entirely. As early as 6:30 p.m. the stream of humanity commenced to trickle through the doors. By 7 o'clock it was a river, and half an hour later a torrent that caused an overflow inside as high as the "gods" gallery. That abode of art was literally packed with bonneted spectators - a most unusual sightwho were unable to secure standing room on the lower floors. Long before 8 o'clock it was impossible for even a woman's small feet to find a resting place, and hundreds on hundreds turned away disappointed. The spectacle was a novel and inspiring one viewed from the stage, and must be looked upon as an ovation for the fair lady who is fast becoming beloved of her sex in Canada as she is in other lands where her beneficence has been proved. There was just a sprinkling of men in the big audience which was a model of order and attention. The platform was embellished with an array of beautiful flowers, flags, and appropriate banners, apart from the several score of ladies who occupied the chairs as delegates from various city societies of a religious and philanthropic nature. THE IDEA IS NOT MY OWN. but one supported by the women of Canada themselves. (Applause.) Although just now begun in Canada, it is all over the world. For the last ten or twelve years at least we note in several parts of the world a desire for some organization which would bring about a greater unity among workers as distinguished from greater uniformity. In the United States it was started by this council, which has been working for the last four or five years. In England and Scotland it begun by several of the towns organ. izing unions of workers among themselves, each union, as years went on being formed on a broader and maturer basis, and now the last four or five years there have been yearly in some of the great towns conferences of women workers, to which delegates from these different unions have come from all over the countries. They have now adopted the name of the National Union of Women Workers. I have only

striven to give you a HISTORY OF THIS MOVEMENT. You want to know what it is intended to do-of what use is it? I should explain that the only way in which to have this National Council was to form councils at the different centers of population, hoping in time to bring in the country districts as well as the towns. We have already organized Montreal, Toronto, Ottawa, and are about to do so in Quebec and Winnipeg. The best way to show you the good such a union can be in the community is to tell you some of my own experience in the first city in which it was started-in Aberdeen. It was some eleven or twelve years since that Miss Ellis Hopkins visited Aberdeen and gave several and should be done among women, and at the close of these meetings it was decided that we should try to raise the moral tone of the whole district and that we should endeavor to unite all the different societies of workers on the same common basis. THE FIRST UNION WAS FORMED representing all the different churches in philanthropic works We adopted the idea of having all these institutions give reports of their labors so that we should know what was being done, and where the different societies were overlapping; that we should get suggestions one from the other, and also

see whether any work was wanted. We soon found there was plenty of new work cut out for us. I will give you a few samples. It was first brought to our notice that there was a large number of little factory girls called "half-timers" one-half day at school and the other at the factory—who were being allowed to run loose in the streets at night, thus molding futures which would leave little hope for them. We formed a "Lily band" for these children, and soon had 200 of them. We formed classes of not more than twelve or fifteen, and gave them instruction in cooking, in making their own clothes, etc. We are filled with grateful surprise when we look at that band now and feel surely

She told you that after the Women's Congress adjourned in Chicago the foreign delegates went home pledged beforehand to organize national councils in their own country, but she quite forgot to tell you that before they parted they unanimously elected her as president of the Internstional Council of Women for the whole world. (Applause.) The International Council will consist of all the different national councils that we hope will soon be organized. It has been organized, as you know, in Great Britain, the United States and Canada. Australia will come in very soon, and so we hope that the good work will grow. All the delegates are to meet once in five years, and so you see through our national councils we will shake hands with the women of the whole world and heip each other on as far as we can on the side of right. LIGHTING LONDON.

The Engineer Presents Specifications-Business Transacted by No. 3 Committee.

The fire and light committee of the City Council held their regular meeting last night. Owing to the absence of Ald. Parnell, who is ill, Ald. Scarrow presided. There were also present: Ald. O'Meara, John Heaman, Wm. Heaman, Nutkins, Secretary Bell, Inspector Bell, Chief Roe and Market Clerk Wilson.

ELECTRIC LIGHTING. The city engineer submitted the specifications to be included in the proposed electric light tenders, and they will require that the poles be not less than 50 feet high. The contract will call for the lighting of the city for 317 nights in the year, though the engineer can order them lighted at any other time. The lamps will be 2,000 candle power, to be strung not less than 40 feet above the ground, at the corners or in the center of the street, as may be deemed advisable. The policemen will report on the working of the lights and, the contractors will be deducted at the rate of 4 cents per hour for all time the lamps are out. The tenders will also be called for lighting the city for the terms of one, five

eight and ten years. These specifications, with slight amendments, will be presented to the council at

It is satisfactory to learn that around Lake Temiscamingue, north of Lake Nipissing, and easy of access, there is a substantial quantity of fertile land, and that the Government has taken steps to promote its settlement. With the development of mining in that region there should be good demand, at paying prices, for the products of the settlers.

rescuing party that over fifteen acres of the inside workings of the Gaylord fell during to-day and more is likely to come during to-night. The surface in the neighborhood of the disaster is also beginning to crack and seams can now be seen fully eight inches in width.

Mine Inspector Williams says it will be several days before the rescuing party can reach the entombed men. They have over 300 feet of solid coal to drive through yet, and then the men may not be in the place where they expect to find them.

Canada's Trade with Great Britain. London, Feb. 14.—The imports from Canada during January totaled £173,049, an increase of 13.2 per cent. as compared with the imports of the corresponding period of 1893. The exports to Canada during January from Great Britain totaled £351,111, a decrease of 10 per cent.

Fatal Fire. BERLIN, Feb. 14.-A disastrous fire has occurred at Cassell. Twenty-eight buildings were destroyed. Several person lost

their lives. Nineteen houses at Loebschuets, Prussian Silesia, were burned to-day. Among the dwellings destroyed was the Manor of Lord Reisch. He and three of his children perished.

The Franco-British Fight. PARIS, Feb. 14.—The Government's version of the second fight between the French and English forces in Western Africa near the Sierra Leone frontier says that the trouble was due to the English invading French territory and attacking a village close to the French post of Benty. The French defended the village and repulsed

the attacking party.

Advices received in London in regard to the latest trouble between the French and English were to the effect that a detachment of British military police, who were encamped in the Sofa country had been fired upon by a French force. The British returned the fire, killing six of the French force. Several of the French force were reported to have been captured.

To Free Poland. WARSAW, Feb. 14.-The police here claim to have discovered an extensive conspiracy to secure the freedom of Poland. The conspirators are said to include Nihilists as well as persons not usually found affiliating with members of that sect. Among those taken into custody are the editorial staffs of two journals published here and many priests. The stipend of the Bishop Kulenski has been suspended. Many other places in Poland are said to be affected by the movement. At Kielce a police visit was made to the seminary and college there, which resulted in the seizure of a large number of pamphlets calling upon the youths of Poland to rise and free their country from Russian rule.




