Twenty Burned to Death In a 'Frisco Hotel Fire

Scores of Sleeping Italian Laborers Trapped by Flames and Buried Beneath Falling Walls.

San Francisco, April 4.-Twenty men were burned to death and twenty others injured in a fire which destroyed an Italian hotel af Seventeenth and Connecticut streets, in the Potrero district, early today. The injured were of the laboring class, and were asleep in their rooms when the fire started. Before they could be aroused, the flames had spread through the building. The walls fell, and the inmates were buried in the ruins, twenty being taken out dead and dying. People from other hotels in the vicinity rushed to the assistance of the buried victims and succeeded in rescuing all of them from the flaming timbers. Teams were hurriedly harnessed and automobiles brought into service, and the injured were rushed to the Potrero Emergency Hospital, where several dled while awaiting treatment.

The majority of the injured were hurt in leaping from the upper windows. A number of women are reported to have been in the building, and all of them are believed to have perished.



PREMIER OFF FOR CONFERENCE

Hon. Mr. Fielding to Lead the liouse, Which Prorogues About End of Month.

[Special to The Advertiser.] Toronto, April 4. - A Government caucus was held this morning before the meeting of the House. It was purely a family gathering to say goodbye to the Premier and his two colleagues, who leave this afternoon for the colonial conference in London, will devolve upon Hon. Mr. Fielding, and Senior Privy Councilor Cartwright will be acting premier. This is the standing rule.

Sir Wilfrid announced that no contentious legislation would be pressed, and that the session would likely be brought to a close about the 20th of the month. On the 22nd Parliament will have been in session five months. Among the bills to be held over will be the Dominion lands act. Mr. Templeman's proprietary medicine bill will not be pressed, should it meet with much opposition. 



CITY WILL NOT

Council Agrees Not to Help Defray Cost of Opening Up Streets.

The city of London has grown tired of being asked by interested parties to pay the cost of the purchase of certain lands required to open streets which years ago should have been

opened up all the way through. Consequently, the council on Monday agreed to a proposition brought in by No. 2 committee that a bylaw be passed whereby it will be impossible for the council to contribute any sum of money toward the cost of purchasing lands from private parties necessary for street opening.

A case in point and which resulted in the bylaw being asked for, is that of the McKenzie estate in South Lon-

Mr. R. K. Cowan, for the owners, de cires to open up a street 50 feet wide, running north and south and parallel with the line of the Southwestern Traction Company.

But the street, owing to the fact that the parties interested cannot come to terms, will only run a part of the way between Grand avenue and Emery street, instead of having an outlet on both streets.

The McKenzie estate is making no trouble, and is very anxious to have the street opened, but the property at both ends of the proposed thoroughfare belongs to other parties, and they cannot get together. Consequently the only way to reach the street will be by cross-streets, to be opened from Ridout street east, and sooner or later the people of South London will be asking the council to assist them in having the street opened up at both ends. To block any grant for the purpose, a bylaw such as is recommended by No. 2 is to be drawn up by the city solicitor and adopted by the council.





BRITAIN LOSES STRIP IN AFRICA

Lakes and Mountains Supposedly Britain's Belong to the Belgians.

London, April 4. - The Royal Geographical Society is about to make an announcement which shows that Great Britain is faced with the loss of some of her most cherished East African territory. It is to the effect that the exact longitude of the Mountains of the Moon, hitherto variously stated, has just been scientifically determined, with the result that the greater and more important part of the mountains lie on King Leopold's side of the Belgian-British frontier, which by treaty is the thirteenth meridian. Moreover, Lake Albert Edward, which was named for King Edward when he was Prince of Wales, goes for the same reason to the Congo Free State, disappearing from British control.
