sheep coming in here at present is that there is a shortage of the Canadian article. There has been a large increase in the population from the old land in the past few years, and they are all consumers of mutton. The tariff restrictions and the limited market that has resulted since the introduction of the Dingley tariff by our United States neighbors are responsible for the shortage.
