BANDITS HOLD CROWD PASSENGER TRAFFIC BACK WHILE JEWELRY HEAVY ON ALL ROADS WINDOW IS ROBBED

Trio of Daring Crooks Carry Railroads Report Record Busi-Out Well-Planned Scheme.

ALL MAKE ESCAPE

New York Treated to Most Sensational Robbery in Weeks.

New York, March 12.-While Broadway tonight was crowded with theatregoers, three armed bandits smashed in the window of a jewelry store at Thirty-seventh street, kept the crowds at bay with their revolvers until they had emptied the contents of several trays into their pockets, and then escaped, shooting one pedestrian who A few minutes later three men en-tered another Broadway jewelry store a few blocks up-town, and after throw-ing pepper in a clerk's eyes, grabbed

One Pedestrian Shot.

In addition to the pedestrian who was shot, but not seriously injured, one other member of the crowd succeeded in getting his fingers on a fugitive. He was rewarded by a crack on the wrist from a revolver butt which caused his arm to fall helplessly to his side.

Proprietors of the two stores estimated that thousands of dollars worth of jewelry had been stolen.

The first robbers, in the control of the stolen. of Jewelry had been stolen.

The first robbery, in which Schwartz Bros. were the victims, was engineered with great daring. While rubbing elbows with passing pedestrians, one of the bandits slipped an iron bar through the handles of the door, so it could not be opened from the inside. Then a brick wrapped in cloth was hurled through the window.

At the fingle of falling glass, Frank Schwartz ran excitedly to the door and tried to pull it open as he shouted for tried to pull it open as he shouted for help. The crowd, also attracted by the crash, swarmed about the robbers, two of whom continued coolly at their task of raking diamonds and rubies out of the window.

Windy City Jurist Gets Worst Of It in Role of Peacemaker.

Chicago, March 13.—An attempt at peacemaking by Chief Justice Harry Olson of the municipal court during a fight in a darkened corridor of the city hall last night resulted in a bruised eye for the jurist and his threat to swea out a warrant for the arrest of a police sergeant, who, the judge said, choked him, while his original assailants fled. Judge Olson was leaving the city hall for the night, when he came upon four men fighting in the corridor. A fifth lay on the floor, bruised and bleeding. The judge appealed to the men to cease fighting, whereupon one of the four knocked him down. RINGLEADERS ARE OF PAN-GERMAN CLIQUE WHO OPPOSED PEACE

Paris, March 13.—The names associated with the new revolutionary movement in Germany indicate its reactionary character. The Dr. von Kapp reported as having assumed the chancellorship, it seems probable, is Dr. Wolf Gang Kapp, a former Conservative member of the Reichstag and general-director of the German Agricultural Society. He was one of the deputies who sarly in 1918 urged the Government to speed up the U-boat building program. He became president of the German fatherland party, the notorious pan-German organization which urged that Germany carry on the war to the bitter end. After the abdication of Emperor William and the signing of the armistice, Dr. Kapp was one of the men for whose arrest the Independent Socialists clamored on the ground that he and his associates had been responsible for the continuation of the war and the hindering of peace.



TEACHER IN INDIAN SCHOOL GIVES INTERESTING LECTURE

Speaks To Audience in St. Andrew's Hall.

A very interesting illustrated lecture was given by Miss Margaret Russel of Bombay, India, last night at St. Andrew's Hall, exemplifying the ways and the ignorance of a large proportion of One of the most interesting things Miss Russel mentioned was the very changeable habits of the natives. She

stated that when she was teaching in the high school at Bombay, before the present king made his trip to India for the durbar, everyone talked sedi-tion. After he had gone, all one could hear was "The King smiled at me." One of the hardest things that the British Government had to do in the country was to keep the different tribes from coming to blows over their different religions, Miss Russel stated. The ignorance of the people in India was very pronounced, Miss Russel said. They worshiped five gods a day and went through numerous foolish antics. went through numerous foolish antics, which they thought would protect them from the evil spirit. A number of the natives, however, were taking advantage of the schools and going through for their matriculation. Some of them even came to America to finish their education.

The views which Miss Russel showed included a number of very pretty scenes in the vicinity of Bombay. One of them showed the fine school in which she taught, which is known as the Queen Mary High School, a name given at the time of the durbar in honor of the present queen.

THE SPECTATOR AND LLOYD GEORGE. London Spectator (Conservative) Mr. Lloyd George as the man mainly responsible for "Great Britain's unpreparedness" in 1914, and in a measure for the war

Je was "Mr. Winston Churchill's principal opponent" in naval preparation, and then he led the wing of the Asquith ministry which opposed the entrance of Britain into the continental war until Belgium was invaded.

"It is quite possible," says the Spectator, "that if, the moment Austria threatened Serbla, we had instantly warned Germany that if war took place we should immediately come to the aid of France and Russia the German emperor would not have dared to provoke the contest." This is rather absurd: remember the "contemptibles." The Spectator holds that Britain was morally bound to stand by France against an attack by Germany, quite apart from the violation of Belgium. The Spectator is full of respect for the old secret diplomacy and its power to bind the nation, full of the old Tory doctrine of balance of power, and a strong believer in everlasting armament.

The truth is that France could be expected to take care of herself against a German attack upon her own frontier. The plunge through Belgium forced France to defend, with British aid, a line twice the length of the Franco-German boundary. It had been reckoned also that if the Germans attacked through Belgium, the Belgian army and fortresses could hold them until both French and British forces came to the rescue; but they were reckoning without the new Austro-German siege guns. Great Britain had really no proper business in the conflict until Belgium was violated. Then she had three reasons for fighting, (1) sympathy and honorable obligation to the Belgians. (2) the far greater peril of France, which involved Britain's own security, (3) the specific danger to England in a Teutonic occupation of the coast from Boulogne to Bremen; even Holland this pirate maritime dominion right opposite Dover. With a united cry the British people and all their overseas brothers jumped to the side of Belgium and France against the power which was now unmasked as the assailant of the world's civilization, morality, law and honor

And Lloyd George was not behindhand. The Spectator quotes him against himself as saying in 1914 that he "would not have been a party to a declaration of war had Belgium not been invaded." The Spectator says that "he was too late in realizing that when Germany declared war on France and Russia there was neither honor nor safety for us except in going to the gid of those who later became our allies." This is not true. Mr. Lloyd George and the great majority of the British people, at home and overseas, took action at precisely the right moment and put themselves in the right against the transgressor.

As for the "unpreparedness" of Great Britain in 1914, for which Lloyd George is mainly blamed by the Spectator, that is another fiction. The British navy was never before in such splendid condition, though of course perfection is an impossibility in human affairs. It did its work. The expeditionary force of both professional troops and territorials was far the finest and largest army ever sent out of England, and the quickness and smoothness of its dispatch to Flanders was a wonder. If there was unpreparedness it was in France, whose troops still wore red breeches when the war opened,-a straw which showed the way the wind blew in French affairs. The French artillery used lately in the Balkans had excelled the German artillery used by the Turks, and no one expected that the German armies would so easily crush in the French defences. The secret of the early reverses was of course the

guns in general, which France had little to match. Hence the quick traversing of Belgium and the outflanking of the French, which necessitated British aid on a scale that could not have been reasonably expected.

When the Spectator again quotes Lloyd George against himself from the ante-bellum days, that British armaments should be curtailed, as "if we went on spending and swelling their strength, we should wantonly provoke other nations," the charge is a boomerang. It was lucky for Britain that in the evil hour her exchequer was rich in the silver bullets that did as much as anything to win the war .- And who was the chancellor of the exchequer in those last years before the test?

SAFE AND SANE.

British labor refuses to see Red is the great fact to be adduced from the overwhelming vote against the use of direct action to compel the Government to carry out the Sankey commission's recommendation that the mines be nationalized. The great mass of the workers have decided to stick with constitutional methods in the effort to secure better conditions. The vote against a general strike was a rebuff to Smillie, Hodges, Snowden and the rest of the extremists, from which they will not readily recover. The trades unionists have been steadily securing more and more influence in Parliament, and at the present hour appear to be close to assuming the dominating part in the administration of national affairs. By resorting to revolutionary methods they would have sacrificed this chance, for a general strike throughout the United Kingdom would unquestionably have brought on bloody strife that would in the long run have ended disastrously for the forces of trades unionism, and lost them the consideration and confidence they are now receiving from the general public. British traditions of democracy have been once more spectacularly vindicated by the refusal of labor to adopt the policy of direct action.

LIBERAL REPRESENTATION ON THE HYDRO BOARD.

H. H. Dewart, the Liberal leader in the Provincial Legislature, has demanded that a Liberal be appointed on the Ontario Hydro Commission. He claims that Beck is a Conservative and Col. Carmichael is a member of the United Farmers' party. He therefore asks for the appointment of a Liberal.

Nothing is more in politics than hydro in the most undesirable sense. Hydro power has been a political power with a vengeance! It is dangerous, and should be destroyed. Mr. Dewart's suggestion is all right as far as it goes, but it falls far short of the action necessary.

FLOOD CONDITIONS CAUSE OF DAMAGES TO RETAINING WALL

Thames Overflows New Park At Ingersoll—River Near High Water Mark.

INGERSOLL, March 12 .- But for the drop in the temperature tonight flood conditions might have been serious. The Thames rose rapidly today, and tonight is close to the high-water mark. It has been fed by scores of tributaries draining all sections of the surrouncing districts, and had there been the usual tectors review difficulties. the usual ice floes, serious difficulty might have occurred at the bridges in the town. In some quarters of the town the freshet has been viewed with uneasiness. Many cellars have been flooded, and in some instances the warter in them is four feet deep. Somewhat serious damage has oc-curred at the new park as a result of the flood. This wall was built with a view to preventing the overflowing of the park. 

Seagulls Dropping Clams, Dint Heads of New Yorkers

NEW YORK, March 12.—From Rockaway Point to Edgemere, the borough of Queens is suffering from a plague of clams. Millions of the bivalves were washed ashore by recent storms. Fishermen reaped a rich harvest, but the crop of clams seems undiminished. It is proposed to burn them with crude oil, but the estimated cost is a million dollars. OTTAWA, March 12.—(By Canadian Press).—In answer to questions of C. A. Fournier (Bellechasse) in the House, the minister of agriculture explains that the embargo on Canadian cattle exported to Great Britain was placed by the United Kingdom in 1896 on any cattle entering that country except for immediate slaughter.

The Canadian livestock commission had made representations to the British Government in 1919 for the removal of the restrictions as they apply to Canadian cattle. Agree To Call Off Strike Pending Setting by a Board of Arbitration.

Accept Suggestion of Fair-

from the C. P. R., G. T. R. and M. C. R., who have been on strike for nearly two weeks, will return to work Monday morning, according to a state-ment made last night by J. S. Jones of Toronto, representing the Teamsters' Union. The men are returning to work pending the settling of the dispute by an arbitration board, for which an application is being forwarded to the Government by E. Compton, the Government's fair-wage officer, this

morning.

According to Mr. Jones, Mr. Crompton met a committee representing the union on Wednesday night. He recommended that if the matter could not be adjusted satisfactorily to both parties, an application be made for a board of conciliation under the industrial disputes and investigations act. A mass meeting of the union members was called on Thursday morning, and the recommendation was adopted by a unanimous vote.

At the conclusion of a conference with the managers of the three transportation companies held Friday afternoon, Mr. Crompton reported to the representatives of the men that he could not arrive at a settlement mended that if the matter could not the representatives of the men that he could not arrive at a settlement which would be agreeable to both parties. He asked that a mass meeting be called last night in order that the matter might be put before the members of the union and arrangements made for them to return to

The meeting was addressed by Mr Compton and, acting on his sugges-tion, the men agreed to return to work pending a decision of the board. Mr. pending a decision of the board. Mr. Jones said that the board would probably sit within fifteen days.

When interviewed by The Advertiser last night. Mr. Compton would make no statement regarding the strike, but said that he was well pleased by the courteous reception and splendid treat-ment which he received from both the men and the companies.
