BIG SALE OF TIMBER

To Facilitate Entrance of Settlers Into North Ontario.

Toronto, July 30. - The Government timber sale, which is expected to take place next December, will be the largest since 1885, and the fourth largest since Confederation. About 900 square miles, or 25 townships, will be offered. Some of the crown lands imber agents and estimaters received instructions Tuesday as to their duties in connection with the sale. They will furnish information upon which to base the Government upset price. The reason for the sale lies in the necessity of making room for the influx of settlers along the lines of the new railways now under construction or pending, viz., the Temiscaming and North-ern Ontario, the Bruce Mines and Algoma, and the Central Canada. Another reason for the sale is to prevent loss by forest fires with the incoming of settlers. Since Confederation there have been fourteen timber sales in Ontario, disposing of 10,818 square miles.
