SHIPPING RETURNS

Montreal's Total Tonnage Will Reach Two Million Mark.

Montreal, Nov. 3.-The total tonnage of the port of Montreal this season will reach the two-million mark, which will be a record. Up to the 1st November the number of sea-going vessels entering the port was 742, as compared with 734 up to the same date last year. The tonnage up to the 1st of November was slightly above 1,-700,000 tons, while the tonnage of the entire season of 1903 was 1,890,000. The increased tonnage besides being due to the increased number of vessels can also be attributed to the larger type of vessels being used on the St. Lawrence route this year. TO RESCUE OF NAN PATERSON

Man Who Says He Saw the Shooting Tells Story.

SAYS YOUNG HELD REVOLVER

Prominent Business Man a New Figure in New York's Hansom Cab Mystery.

New York, Nov. 3. - In defense of "Nan" Paterson, the actress now in the Tombs Prison chorged with having killed Caesar Young, the wealthy bookmaker, in a hansom cab in West Broadway, this city, on June 4 last, Milton W. Hazelton, a prominent businessman of Oneonta, Otsego County, N. Y., appeared at District Attorney Jerome's office and declared in an affidavit that he saw Young fire the fatal

Hazelton said that another man was with him at the time of the shooting. He does not know the identity of this witness, however, as he was a chance acquaintance, attracted by a Masonic emblem on his watch chain. He declared that his conscience had been troubling him so that he finally had to come forward and tell his story. Hazelton told Assistant District Attorney Rand that he is 78 years old and lives in Oneonta. For a few weeks previous to the affair of June 4 Hazelton says he was staying with the family of Rev. D. London, Thursday, Nov. 3. — The Daily Mail prints Hakodate advices of Sept. 25 to the effect that Japanese schooners which left that port in May and June are returning so deeply laden that their scuppers are awash from a raid on the Russian fishing stations at Kamschatka and the seal rookeries in the Sea of Okhotsk and on the Commander Islands. Quantities of furs have been packed and sent to London, where the number offered for sale will be larger than for many years, but hereafter sealskins will be among the rarest furs, for the rookeries, which are largely the property of the Russian crown, have been practically destroyed. Three Japanese vessels which raided Kamschatka were attacked by Russians and captured after a three days' fight. Half the crews were killed and the remainder were captured. Seven other vessels attacked and dispersed the attackers after a fight, in which 50 men were

killed. Japanese and Mexicans, who were raiding on Copper Island, were driven off with the loss of fifteen killed. Fourteen Russians were also killed. The British warship Algerine arrived in August, and warned off the raiders. She also frustrated a scheme to attack the Kamschatka Commercial Company's warehouse at Petre Paulovski, where skins value at \$1,500,000 are stored. It is estimated that the raiders

Captain Gillard testified that the Trawler Guli was close enough for her crew to speak to the Russians. In order to clear the battleships the trawlers went out of their course. The Russians passed in two divisions, turning their searchlights on the trawlers. They then fired. The Russian squadrons were a mile to a mile and a half apart. The firing lasted fully an hour. There were no Brish or foreign tor-pedo boats among the fishing fleet, the crews of these vessels being able to see clearly owing to the searchlights. 

> Scotland Yard Has a New System for Criminal Records.

London, Nov. 3.—The interesting statement is made in the official review of last year's crime that at the close of 1303 there were 60,000 sets of finger prints of criminals registered with the police at New Scotland Yard.

Since the official report was closed some thousands of additional records have been obtained, and the register is now increased to about 70,000 sets. It is growing at the average rate of 350 weekly.

The commissioner of police states that as a system of crime detection it is showing excellent results. The system is thoroughly established throughout England and Wales, has just been introduced into Ireland, and many police officers have come to London from the colonies to study how it is worked at Scotland Yard. Yard.

A wing of the Scotland Yard building at Westminster is specialy set apart for this finger-print museum: it is officially designated "The Convict Supervision Office." In the quietude of this block of offices Inspector Collins and his staff are daily classifying, pigeon-holing and reexamining their prints of the finger tips of the habitual criminals of the United Kingdom.


