IMPORTANT FROM CAPE OF GOOD HOPE.

Rebellion of the Caffres, aided by the Hottentots

The accounts are nost deplorable The Caffre Chiefs have generally rebelled against the English authorities, and it was feared at the latest accounts that the Hottentots were also wavering in their loyalty.

From the last of December, the date of the last advices, a war of posts had been

continued between the rebels and the English, and their native allies, in which the former were always victorious, where the action was in open field.

The accounts of the murder of farmers of the interior, their families and servants, by the rebels, come in from all quarters and where they were not killed, they were driven off pennyless, and their farms and houses plundered and burnt

Sir Harry Smith, the English governor, was forwarding levies to the scene of war. The colonists were aiding him, believing that in a prompt suppression of the rebellion lay their only safety. Should any number of the different native chiefs, with the Hottentots, join the rebels, the contest would be a desperate one. It was thought that the Governor would soon be at the head of ten thousand men.

The Cape Town Gazette of February 1, says, that on the 23rd of January, the Caffres, 3,000 strong, attacked the colonists, and their allies near Fort Hare .-They were repulsed with the loss of 100

On the 3rd of January, a strong force of Caffres attacked Fort White. Caffres were dispersed with twenty killed. On the morning of the 7th, the rebel chief Hermanus, with his horde of Caffres and the Hottentots whom he had seduced or compelled to accompany him, attacked Fort Beaufort. The assault was repulsed, and the chief and his son and a number of his people killed, and his party completely routed.

In fact, the authorities were so alive to this, that about three o'clock, the inhabitants generally were aroused and warned to keep a sharp look-out. However, the morning passed off quietly, and up to this time, Tuesday, three o'clock, P. M., nothing further has

transpired to disturb our tranquillity. A letter from Cradock states that Mapassa is lying within a few hours ride of the colonial border, at the head of 5,000 men; that spies have been seen in the neighborhood of the town; and that in fact they have been informed it is the determination of the Tambookies and Hottentots, in conjunction, to destroy the place. The Hottentots in that neighborhood are forming themselves into camps and lagers in the most formidable numbers. At one place, Water Kloof, it is supposed, and in this several of the statements agree, there are not fever than 1,000 men. In all the cases that have come to hand, the servants on the farms have turned against their employers and joined the rebels.

It will be noticed that this was previous to the crisis of the 'scheme," when it was found impossible to raise the proposed amount by subscription, and ere the chrysalis Joint Stock Market Company had been ransmigrated into a full-fledged Board of Taxers

It will be apparent that the Temperance Hall affair was one of the most liberal complexion, in which all were invited to take part voluntarily, but for which no man was to be taxed; and the object was to attain an amount of accommodation much required in the place, while it was ascertained that the rents, from the lower part of the building, and casual revenue, from the Hall, would cover the expenditure, thus supplying the different religious and benevolent associations of the town with a place of meeting free of expense, and retaining for charitable and benevolent purposes a considerable amount now disbursed by the different institutions in the shape of rent.

It is not to be denied that the Taxation Scheme paralized for a time, but we believe only a brief one, the previous attempt, and it is consequently not a matter of much wonder if the promoters of the preposed Temperance Hall should conceive they had attained, if not "a Great Victory," at least a pretty considerable ovation in the defeat of an attempt which, whatever other objects some of its promoters may have had in view, was obviously intended by others to prevent the erection of a Temperance Hall. Had, however, the latter project never been mooted, we should have deemed it equally a duty to endeavor to set the rate-payers right in the matter, and to warn them against involving themselves in a scheme "implying a large expenditure of public money and nsequent taxation," and which, in common with the great majority of the late public meeting, we believe, under existing circumstances, to be alike impolitic and unnecessary.

HORRIBLE MURDER IN MISSISSIPPL. THE MURDERER BURNT TO DEATH.

We copy the following horrid partieu-lars from the Paulding (Miss) Clarion

of the 1st inst. "Since the time when the midnight murder of Dr. Longon and family sent a thrill of horror through this community, no event has created a deeper sorrow and more pervading indignation, than the assassination, on Tuesday last, of Mrs Dixon wife of John Dixon, and her infant child, at her residence, in the neighborhood of William Bridges, Esq., by Haley, a negro man belonging to Mr. Zachariah Thompson. Having been summoned on the coroner's jury, we went in person to the scene of the horrible tragedy, saw the mutilated body of the murdered woman, the severed throat of her infant, and witnessed, without regret, the summary and terrible, but still inadequate, expiation of his triple and atrocious crime by the monster. The revolting facts are briefly these :- On Tuesday morning Mr. Dixon, unconscious of the awful doom impending over his family, started from home in quest of cattle. His little son, an artless child, a few months over two years old, started fondly after him, pursuing him some distance, unnoticed by the father, and undiscovered by the mother. Mrs. Dixon soon missed the boy, went after him, and called to him to return. She was then approached by the brutal villian, unconscious of the awful doom impending was then approached by the brutal villian, Haley, who at once offered such indignities as the virtue and pride of civilized woman resents and resists, even at the peril of life. She repelled the advances of the bestial monster yielding neither to threats nor disgusting importunities, when he felled her to the earth. An outrage too abhorrent to mention, was then perpetrated on the person of his victim, by the incarnate demon. Reft in a moment of her most precious jewel-forcibly despoiled of her purity, by the villian slave of her own father—the wretched lady doubtless felt that every thing valued in the world was lost: but she was not ready for eternity. She asked, at the hands of her fiend. life--life, that she might prepare for her solitary remaining hope—a refuge for her crushed spirit in Heaven? But the ruffian heeded her not; he spurned the prayer of the wife injured beyond reparation, and beat her on the head with pine limbs, and stabbed her till she died. Bruised, mangled and defiled, lay the corpse of this lady, whom a husband had greeted gladly and unsuspectingly a few hours before, presenting a specticle too hideous, too replete with horrible memoirs, for an unaverted eye. The infant was found about thirty steps from the mother, its throat cut twice, with long deep gashes. It is probable the little child was the last victimand that the last aspiration of her unutterable agony fell appallingly upon his infant ear, before the cold knife of the monster assassin passed over the throat of the in-nocent creature. The attendance of the coroner was procured on Wednesday, and the jury, after a patient investigation, returned the following verdict :- "The said jurors do upon their oaths say :- That the said Mary Dixon came to her death from Dr. Larzette's Juno Cordial, or Problows inflicted by a certain negro man named Haley, the property of Zachariah Thompson, of Jasper county; that is to in the married state without offspring. When Haley was arrested, his clothes were stained with blood, and the wretch attempted and did throw away his knife. After being severely whipped, he made the annexed confession.
