

#### Differences in the British Cabinet.

It has been apparent for some time that there have been differences in the British Cabinet with reference to the conduct of the war. A coalition Ministry is always difficult to maintain, and, of course, much more so during a period of such stress and strain as is involved in the present war. Men are bound to differ, and differ strongly, in view of such incidents, per example, as the tremendous loss of men in the Dardanelles operations without commensurate results, and also in regard to the newly-developed Balkan situation. Sir Edward Carson, long a stormy petrel in British public life, has resigned and his withdrawal has recalled the fact that Foreign Minister Delcasse of France recently took a like step, which was thought an indication that he also was dissatisfied.

John Redmond, the Irish leader, who is in close touch with inside affairs, does not hestitate to say that there is a Cabinet crisis, and that there may be a reconstruction.

On top of all this word comes today over the Courier's leased wire that Premier Asquith has been taken suddenly ill and will not in any event be able to be at the Empire helm for several days. Mr. Asquith is an elderly man, who has for years had a very stormy time of it, even apart from hostilities, and the wonder is that he has not sooner collapsed. The war some time ago proved to him that he must sacrifice some of his existing colleagues in an effort to strengthen the hands of the Administration, and it may be that out of the existing chaos an entirely new order of control will be evolved at Westminster. Whatever the outcome, the aim and the purpose of the central authorities will remain the same-of bringing this war to the one issue.
