The Cost of Living And the Living Wage

LUNF'S WBEKLY advocates a minimum wage AS basis of all becompense for labor

The Price of Skill will Regulate Itself, Once the Lowest Living Rate is Fixed on Firm Foundation

The scheme of the Canadian Government Department of Labor to 5 x the lowest rate of pay which is to be given the various craftsmen employed on government work has, in an places where the scheme has found a place, resulted in fixing for all time on all other jobs the minfinum for the class or kind of work specified.

It has not, as some labor advocates contend, kept the rate down th the lowest possible notch: but bas simply fixed for the workman of average skill, of whom there are so many, the least amount he should receive per hour for his work.

Reference has merely to be made to the fact that in Truro. where brieklaying, stone-cuting, mason work, iron and metal work, carpentering, etc., is being done on goverument jobs, and on noo-goverument jobs, such as the Stanfield mills enlargement and general house building, the minimum wage fixed in the Fair Wage Schedule on the government contract is far below the actual wage paid.

For instance, the rate per day for stonecutting is $\$ 3.50$ per day, while $\$ 4.50$ is actually paid.

This is the basis the Cap Workers wish to have esta lished in all the workshops in Truro.

Women, girls, boys, men, sometimes make big pay, be cause they are extra skilled and strain themselyes often to the breaking point.

The average, steady, sober, christian home lover, doesn' make enough, can't make enough, to more than keep body and soul together.

It is a section of the latter who have struck work at th Cap factory, and have asked for a living wage.

They concede the right of the expert to demand and re ceive the big pay, if he is willing to sac-ifice health, home Thid comforts, to earn it.
They only demand for themselves a fair chance to make first a minimum which will keep want from the dror, and the wherewithal to decently clothe and house themselves.

They will demand nothing more, unless their acq skill entitles them to earn it.
