Town Council.

A meeting of the town council was held on Tuesday evening, Aug. 16th. Present: The Mayor, Councillors Thomson, G. W. Bolden, C. H. Bolden, the Recorder, and the Water Committee.

A letter was read from Mr. L. E. Duncanson, referring to extension of College avenue and offering to give land for the widening of the street at the east end. Resolved that the offer be accepted.

Resolved that the council authorize the levying and collecting of a rate of 50 cents on the hundred dollars for school purposes, and 25 cents for roads and all other purposes except water-making in all 75 cents.

Resolved that the Town Clerk be instructed to obtain offers for the loan to the town of the sum of \$8000 for water works.

The beautiful edifice in which the impressive ceremony took place was handsomely and tastefully decorated with elegant house plants and cut flowers, while the vast attendance present fully denoted the high esteem in which the bride is held by her host of friends. The bride was attired in a light-brown cheviot traveling suit, trimmed with becoming dark-brown and moss-green velvet ribbon, with hat to match, and the bridesmaid wore a robin-egg blue with changeable pink silk vest and lace hat trimmed with pink roses. The Acadian Quartette. Wolfville has had a rare treat during the past week in a visit from the above company of musicians, from Beverly, Mass., who gave an excellent entertainment in College Hall, on Monday evening under the auspices of the Y. M. C. A. of Yarmouth. Unfortunately the attendance was not large, owing no doubt to the disagreeable state of the weather, the hall being only partially filled at the hour of commencement. Those who remained away missed one of the best entertainments ever presented to a Wolfville audience. The ladies composing the quartette are of refined and pleasing presence and possess voices of unusual sweetness and culture. The quartettes were harmoniously and artistically rendered, and the solos pleasingly executed. Each number received the hearty applause of the audience. Miss Goodridge has a charming manner and takes her high notes with birdlike clearness. Her selection "The Chalet Horn," was especially enjoyed. In both solo and chorus Miss Foster displayed talent of an unusually high order. Miss Brown's alto is charming, and she was a favorite with many. Miss Blidde did not favor the audience with a solo, but her rich contralto came out well in the choruses. Miss Larson, the youthful cornetist, won golden opinions. She shows a remarkable talent, which will one day place her at the head of her profession. Miss Flynn rendered a number of humorous readings in a very acceptable manner. Her reading was noticeable for originality, absence of affectation, and showed the possession of an excellent memory. The general verdict was that the entertainment was excellent throughout. Echoes of the Turf.

At Mystic Park, Aug. 12th, "Nancy Hanks" failed to beat her record, 2:04. The stallion "Nancy" trotted in 2:09, a record from 2:10.

The gelding "Deceit," owned by C. R. Bill, Jr., won a half mile on the Kentville Driving Park on the 10th, inst., in 1:15.

The mare "Pass," which Mr. Gibson, of Brooklyn, has entered for the week's races at Moosepath, went half a mile on that track on Thursday of last week in 1:16.

"Little Hope" is the dam of "Adrian" by "Allie Clay," and of "Bookmark" by "Bronze Chief." "Adrian" trotted a half-mile on Kentville Park when sixteen months old in 1:36 1/2; "Bookmark" at fifteen months paced a half-mile in the same time (1:36 1/2) on the same track.

Mr. James Curry, of Halifax, with his little trotting wonder, "Topsy's Baby," recorded 2:33, weight 660 lbs., paced through Wolfville Monday, on his way to Bangor, Me., where he has entered the little mare in the 2:37 class. The baby will meet with some good ones in the race, as there are fifteen entries now in. First Bangor Mr. Curry will go to New York, and from there to the World's Fair.

There is being constructed for "Jerry Girl," 2:23 1/2, a sulky constructed of aluminum that will weigh only 32 pounds. She is now wearing five and a half ounce aluminum shoes in front and three ounce shoes behind. These shoes are as strong and as large as double the weight in steel, and owing to the softness of the aluminum, the shoes are better on slippery roads, as they do not wear so smooth. The reason for the great care in reducing weight is that the mare herself only tips the scales at 700 pounds.

England's Latest Annexation. While the civilized world has been stirred over the seizure of the Siamese territory by France, England has quietly annexed a group of islands in the Western Pacific, by no means contemptible in area, and of some value from both a commercial and naval standpoint. The group in question is known as the Solomon Islands. These islands lie 500 miles to the east of New Guinea and stretch southeastward in two parallel chains for 600 miles toward the Santa Cruz group. The soil is of great fertility and the atmosphere moist. The natives are savage and said to be cannibals.

A noteworthy fact is that the northerly portion of the group appears to have been claimed by Germany, the aggregate area under German control having been estimated at 9,000 square miles. The Germans do not appear, however, to have occupied the island, and presumably the British protectorate, which was formally announced at Berlin on July 28th, met with no opposition in Berlin.—Ez.

The Country's Wealth. The deposits in the Post-office and Government saving banks, the Caisse D'Economie and the Montreal City and Savings Bank, the four saving institutions of the country which make monthly returns show that the total deposits on the 20th June in those were \$54,103,575, the largest amount ever recorded in the history of Canada. The next highest year was 1889, when the deposits rose to \$53,715,838. This was the time when the government was paying 4 per cent on deposits. It speaks well for the country that at a time when the government is only paying 3 1/2 per cent, interest the returns should evidence a most prosperous condition of affairs.

The total amount of inland revenue accrued during June was \$699,493, an increase of \$19,000 as compared with June 1892. The unreserved statement of inland revenue accrued during the year is \$8,483,561, or an increase of \$407,025. As the complete returns are not all in it is expected that this amount will be swollen by a few thousand dollars.

The author is a Nova Scotian hailing from the lovely old town of Digby, and he writes with keen sympathy and ample knowledge.

An Ottawa dispatch says: A delegation of Germans who visited portions of the Northwest on returning to Winnipeg were advised by an American Railway agent that the best land was to be found in the United States. They took his advice and went to Minnesota and after weeks' delay they returned to the States. They were disgusted with the poor soil which they saw, and state that no land seen in their travels compared with that in the territories where they have taken up their location. The fact of five thousand being unemployed at present in St. Paul made a great impression on their minds, and they were glad to return to Manitoba.
