Wolfville Chautauqua

A Complete Success. Will Be Repeated Next Year.

Wolfville's first Chautauqua closed on Wednesday evening after a most pleasing and profitable three days of instruction and entertainment.

The thirty citizens who assumed the responsibility of the enterprise expected a week ago to be called upon to contribute towards a deficit and were quite willing to do so but this was unnecessary as the sale of season tickets proved ample to provide for the full expense of the course.

Six entertainments were given on the afternoons and evenings of Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday and all were most enjoyable.

The lectures each afternoon by Prof. L. A. Downey, Ph.D., on "Child Development", were most interesting and valuable and those who heard them were highly pleased. The course was one that should be heard by everybody. Dr. Dawney is a thoughtful and interesting speaker.

Miss Margaret Bradway, the Junior Leader, won many friends while in Wolfville. Her work with the young people was most valuable and the entertainment given by pupils of the school on Wednesday evening, after such a brief training, surprised and pleased everybody.

The lecture on Monday evening by Charles H. Poole, M. P., the eloquent New Zealander, was a delightful treat, as was also the lecture on "Russia" by Dr. George Lawrence Parker, of Boston, on Tuesday evening. The latter was a class-mate of Dr. Cutten at Yale, and has spent much time in Russia and apparently is very familiar with conditions in that country. Hon. Mr. Poole is a most attractive speaker and in his address gave a splendid idea of conditions

Thursday of last week was a big day for Wolfville school children. In the morning sports were held on the college campus for girls and boys, with first and second prizes in each event. The most interesting events were the inter-class contests, such as tug-of-war and relay races. The sack races and three-legged races were opened to both boys and girls and were keenly contested. Prizes were distributed by Rev. Mr. Miller. Scoutmaster Brown and assistants had charge of events.

At 2.30 o'clock in the afternoon the exhibition was opened in the college rink in vegetables, flowers, canned goods, was large.

THE BY-ELECTIONS

The Federal elections necessitated by the appointment of Hon. F. B. McCurdy as Minister of Public Works and Hon. R. W. Wignore as Minister of Customs and Inland Revenue took place on Monday. Hon. Mr. McCurdy was re-elected in Colchester with a majority of 1500 over his opponent, Capt. Hugh Dickson, M. C. At St. John-Albert, N. B., Hon. Mr. Wignore was elected over the Liberal candidate with a majority of approximately 4,200 votes, the defeated candidate losing his deposit.

ODDFELLOWS' FRATERNAL VISIT.

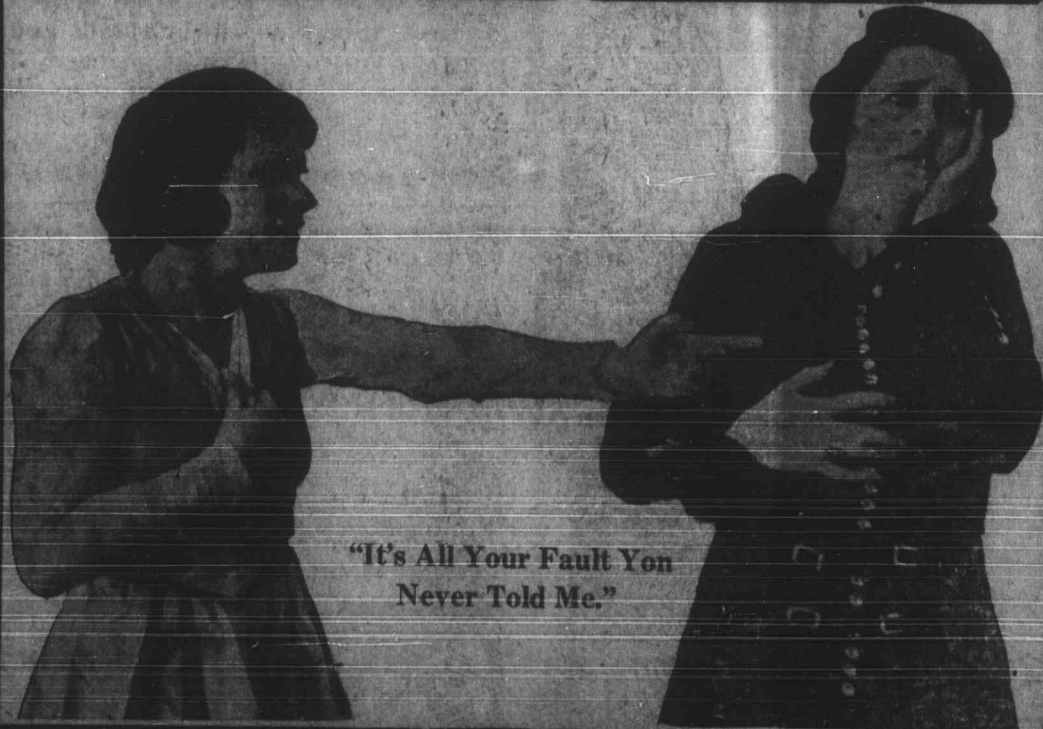

TRADE BETWEEN CANADA AND THE WEST INDIES

A booklet on "THE BRITISH WEST INDIES and BRITISH GUIANA" just issued by the Bank of Montreal, is a most timely publication in view of the new trade agreement between Canada and the West Indies now awaiting the ratification of the respective governments. The booklet gives a concrete and interesting description of the salient features of the various colonies which are party to the agreement, including the physical characteristics, area, population and principal exports and imports. It shows that are most PROMISING MARKETS awaiting development by enterprising Canadian merchants and industrial firms.

At the present time, it is stated, the British West Indies, British Guiana and British Honduras have a total population of over 2,000,000, with natural resources that have really only just begun to be developed. For instance, it is officially estimated that there are at least 20,000,000 acres of fertile land in the British West Indies not yet beneficially occupied, whereas the area under cultivation is only one and a half million acres.

The opinion is expressed that under the system of preferences granted by Canada and the United Kingdom, and with the growing world-demand for such commodities as the West Indies produce, the development of these colonies will proceed apace. There is every prospect of considerable and progressive increase of the population. If all the fertile land there were brought under cultivation the colonies which are in the new agreement could easily support a population of between 30,000,000 and 50,000,000. Even at the present time the interchange of natural products between Canada and the British West Indies is only a tithe of what it well might be, and probably will be, with the larger preference now advocated and the much-improved steamship services provided for.

The booklet gives Canadians an excellent idea of the directions in which trade may be extended. It is replete with details and authoritative information of the imports and exports of the various colonies, and gives most useful information as to the best methods to be pursued in getting into touch with the local business houses and building up trade relations.

This pullet has laid 104 eggs in 104 days. As a rule a hen lays two or three days and then misses a day, and some are known to have laid five or six dozen without a break but never before in the knowledge of the Dominion Poultry Department has a hen laid 104 eggs without a miss.

ANOTHER ADVANCE IN NEWS PRINT

Canadian newspapers have been notified that, starting October 1st, plain white news print will ADVANCE to 6½ cents a pound. This means \$130 a ton at the mills. The following shows how news print has advanced in the past three years:

MOTORS AND MOTORING: A Page Full of Interest to the Owner or Prospective Owner of an Automobile.

SQUEAKY BRAKES

Worn brake linings may cause the heads of the rivets holding the linings to the hand to strike the drum. This brings the squeak when you apply the brakes. To correct this, remove the bands and sink the rivet heads below the linings, or, if the linings are too thin, renew them.

In certain cars a loosening of the engine bolts, those which hold the motor in place, may cause a misalignment of the engine, with serious trouble as a result. Even though the looseness be but slight it may allow the motor support to hammer and thump. In time this may result in an actual breakage of the supporting arm.

MANY SQUEAKS IN LIGHT CARS

Nearly every car which costs less than \$2,000 has a squeak, groan or rattle, which offends the ears of driver, passenger and pedestrian as well. It may be a tiny squeak where two unlubricated surfaces rub together from vibration, or the rattle of loose brake linkage, or some other loose part, but it goes to make up the chorus of every busy highway. In higher price cars money has been spent to eliminate the causes of most noise, though occasionally one of the luxury cars will develop a squeak of prodigious proportions.

Not all noises of cheaper cars can be eradicated. But although there may be some such noises which are indigenous, the great majority can be prevented and overcome by intelligent action. Riding in a taxicab a few days ago, an annoying squeak jarred the nerves. I found that the vibration of the car and loose hinges made the door shake. The catch rubbed against the stop and the squeak was the result. A drop or two of oil will end such a noise for a time.

This same vibration might cause body and dash to rub and squeak if not bolted tight, or if no felt strip be interposed to prevent noise. Nearly all light cars vibrate excessively, partly because the frame is so light that it is perfectly rigid, as are the frames of the heavier cars, and it bends and gives with the unevenness of the highway and jolting over car tracks and other bumps. Where such is the case it is almost impossible to prevent all sorts of noises.

If the body is not bolted tight to the frame it will rattle. It used to be considered good form to put in a felt strip to overcome this; a strip of cotton tape is used in most cases to-day. But be sure to keep the nuts on the fastening bolts tight, with lock washers to keep them from slipping.

WATCH THE LITTLE HOLES

Did you ever notice a ragged hole about the size of a silver dollar in the rear tire of a car? This little ragged hole is the result of carelessly turning corners. Many motorists swerve swiftly around a corner without slackening speed. They fail to allow sufficient leeway between the car and the curb in order to clear the rear wheel. When too sharp a corner is made, the rear wheel will often graze the edge of the curb or climb up on it. This peels off some of the side-wall rubber.

Though little thought of, this injury, according to tire and tube experts, is often the first cause of a later side-wall blowout. The facts of the case are that the fabric side-wall, having lost its rubber protection against the elements, quickly deteriorates. If taken in time the repair of such an injury is very simple. The motorist may make a temporary repair by cleaning with gasoline, and then covering with a plastic, self-vulcanizing gum. When an opportunity arises, the same should be taken to a surgeon for a permanent repair.

Municipal publicity well and wisely done is an important force which in Canada has already proved itself in many of the cases of makers of prosperity. It is not only necessary to make a town known to the outside world; those responsible for the good administration of the town, those who possess municipal authority, should make it their first duty to make the town known to its people. It seems ludicrous to think of teaching citizens the value of their own surroundings, but when once you try to question a man in the street about his own town, you will generally find that he knows much less about it all than the ordinary stranger who steps out of the train with a guide book in his hand.

Municipal publicity stimulates civic consciousness, and this means general interest, which promotes civic pride and results in civic improvements. Try and persuade the citizens of Hopetown that the meadows adjoining the city boundary can be turned into a beautiful park of which they will be proud, and funds will be forthcoming to buy the site the women will organize church bazaars and concerts and everyone will help to promote the scheme. Tell these same people that the fire station is defective and they are in danger of death if a bad outbreak was to take place, and they will at once proceed to ameliorate matters. Nothing is as bad as stagnation. This same municipal publicity will help people to know who's who in their own town, from which of their neighbors they can get what they need, in fact may be used to secure very definite and positive results of an increased home market for a town's products, teach the people that the secret of success for a growing town is for everybody to buy at home until the commercial possibilities of the place have outgrown its popularity, and it can supply the markets of the world. As for the value of making a city known to the outside world, this hardly needs demonstration.—Exchange.

NEW WORK FOR AIRPLANE

The following item is taken from a recent issue of The Digest, published at Grand Mere, Que., under the auspices of the Laurentide Pulp & Paper Co., Ltd. Lieut. Graham is the son of Mr. Edson Graham of this town.

Lieutenant Staurt Graham left last week on what is perhaps the most important work yet to be performed by the Company hydroplanes, namely, to get pictures of the boundaries of limits held by the Company which have never been accurately determined. The trip will probably require about ten days or more, as Lieutenant Graham is also to take some of Mr. Small's men in the air to let them look over certain areas.

So far as known, airplanes have never been used before for determining boundaries. This is usually the work of a party of eight or ten men who require a month to do what is hoped the plane can accomplish in a day. It is planned later to have the hydroplane carry supplies to lakes along the boundaries and when the party follows on to blaze the limits, to have their supplies at various points along the way so that all the men will have to carry will be their topographical instruments and bedding.

The outcome of the new work is being awaited with interest, particularly since it represents a great saving in time if it is found to be practicable and to insure definite information about the boundaries of little known limits. Lieutenant Graham should return about the end of the week.

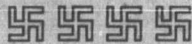


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
