with the simple fervor of childhood,  
faith, proudly, made confession of  
his sins.

The candidate for knighthood  
passed nights in prayer in a church  
and fasted in preparation for his  
investiture. He heard Mass and  
received Holy Communion. His  
mind was a symbol of purification,  
and he was clad in a white robe to  
signify the purity of life expected  
from him; over this was a red gar-  
ment, a token that he must be ready  
to die for the faith. He wore an-  
other, as a reminder of his duty  
to him the duty of prayer. When  
present at Mass, a knight always  
held the point of his sword before  
him during the Gospel, signifying  
his readiness to defend it. And  
being thus Christian, chivalry was,  
as Hallam declares, "the best  
school of moral discipline which the  
Middle Ages afforded."

Every one of the religious orders  
had its motive in fraternal charity.  
Men bound themselves by vow to  
the maintenance of man's life; they  
drank no water, unless it be that  
came from devotion, and upon a  
meal of penance, do abstain from  
other meats; they eat plentifully of  
bread; they wear the woollen cloth in all  
their apparel; they have great stores  
of alms; they are plentifully  
furnished with all implements of  
hospitality, and all other things that  
are requisite to the accomplishment  
of a good life according to their es-  
tablished degree.

Woman held a high place in  
medieval society. Eminent by  
Christianity, she was degraded to  
which Paganism had reduced her,  
poets sang her praises, knights per-  
formed feats in her honor, the  
Church gave her a seat at its coun-  
cils, the person of learned abbesses.  
Laws were made in various  
countries for her special protection.  
An insult to a woman was punish-  
able by heavy penalties. James II.,  
of Arragon, decreed that none save  
a murderer could be executed in  
presence of a woman. It was a law  
of knighthood to permit no word to  
be said in derogation of the sex.  
And medieval womanhood, as a class,  
was the most noble and noblest  
woman was then expected to be an  
adept in household arts; the higher  
her rank, the greater were the num-  
ber and variety of domestic details  
which she was called upon to manage.  
Many women, in the absence of their  
lords, governed castles, managed  
estates, and even occasionally sum-  
med the control of kingdoms. Mar-  
garet of Norway united all the king-  
doms of the North. Xena in Rus-  
sia, a princess, was famous for her  
learning.

It would be a most interesting  
study to inquire how far the  
principles prevailed with the mon-  
archs of the medieval period. There  
is little doubt that they compare  
favorably with those of our own  
sovereigns who have ruled the  
world. For even where there were  
great crimes, there was nobility  
and magnanimous repentance, an  
humble avowal of wrong, a desire  
to make satisfaction. But, whether  
in king or peasant, was then known  
by its own name, and deplored as  
an offence against Heaven. Cha-  
teauvibrant declares that "St. Louis,  
a legislator, a hero and a saint,  
is the representative of the Middle  
Ages."—St. Louis, of whom Vol-  
taire admits that "human perfec-  
tion could not go farther, and  
whom Hallam declares to be "the  
most eminent pattern of unswerving  
rectitude and Christian strict-  
ness of conscience that ever held  
the sceptre in any country." St.  
Louis was one of many.

Chivalry, that strange and fas-  
cinating creation of an older time,  
has furnished us with a host of  
noble names,—men who were Chris-  
tians no less than they were knights,  
who valued their unblemished  
reputation second to their Catholic faith.  
No young man that day was  
named to bear arms every now  
and then to approach the Sacraments  
openly and frequently; for a  
knight it was a sacred duty. A  
Black Prince knelt at the head of  
his army to hear Mass and receive  
the Blessed Sacrament before he  
engaged in battle. An Alphonso d'Aguilar,  
a Lord James of Douglas, a  
Robert Bruce, a Bertrand du Gues-  
clin, an O'Neil, or a Cordova, prayed

for the souls of the dead, and  
for the souls of the living, and  
for the souls of the departed.

favorite pursuit. She was  
often seen at cottage doors, the daughters  
of burghers in the country, and  
listening alike to some noble tale,  
or to some music of minstrel or  
troubadour. Dante represents the  
Florentine ladies as listening, while  
they plied the distaff, to  
"Old tales of Troy, France and Rome."  
Kensin Digby is authority for  
the statement that knights loved to  
confer generally into the marriage  
of the Middle Ages. "The maxims  
of the Pythagoreans," he declares,  
"to avoid a woman with gold upon  
her hand seems to have prevailed  
in all its forms. During the  
fourteenth century, in France, the  
dowry of a woman was a chagrin of  
ruin."

The household of the Middle  
Ages were in many cases models  
of order and decorum, as well of  
state and elegance, even when they  
did not reach the perfection of that  
civilized and polished society which  
Elizabeth and Delia had. The rules  
laid down for the government of  
that home forbade, in short, "all  
excess against the law of God,  
None were to be idle. All were to  
spend a certain time in prayer and  
study. All were to be ready with-  
out offending God. "For," said the  
Bari, "I have no affair so near at  
hand as the salvation of those who  
serve me."

The architectural beauty of the  
palaces and dwellings was very  
great, while the interior decorations  
were in perfect harmony with the  
exterior. As to the abbots and  
Cathedral chapters, "symphonies in  
stone," as Victor Hugo puts it, they  
were truly the creations of love and  
worship. Kings gave their jewels,  
nobles their wealth, artists and  
architects their inspirations, arti-  
cians their greatest labors, that all  
might have a share in the great  
monument of faith. Mechanisms were  
known to travel great distances and  
to put on bread and water that they  
might add their toll to the sublime  
work. In Spain alone there were  
great churches; in France, 30,000  
parishes, 165,000 chapels, 2,000  
cathedrals, and 1,500 abbots. Some-  
times these enormous numbers were  
the cost of a certain number of ser-  
vants or soldiers or monks. On  
one occasion, a hundred and twenty  
coachesmen united for such a purpose.  
As an interest of highly decorated  
cathedrals, the Church of St. Martin  
of Tours was of great value and  
red marble, increased with gold and  
precious stones. The number of  
sleepers and turkeys gave a noble  
appearance to the medieval cities.  
It was the custom of the nobles to  
commemorate notable events by the  
erection of graceful towers. In  
Florence a celebrated one was the  
creation of Giotto di Legno; it was  
the tower of the cathedral, which  
Dondi Brothers also erected as clock-  
makers and astronomers.

The cities were marvellously  
quiet, travel being usually on horse-  
back, and the use of the halberd  
of Bohemia once gave a place to  
ground outside the city limits where  
all noisy trades might be carried on.  
"The silence says a chronicler, "was  
broken only by the tinkling of in-  
numerable bells for church and  
monastery. The streets were  
divided of every hour from church-  
bells, palaces, convents or portals, that  
it was like a constant shower of  
hours, a beautiful harmony; or else  
it was by the solemn chanting of a  
litany, begun within a church and  
continued in the adjoining streets  
by the kneeling multitude." One  
vent to fancy those quiet old  
towns, where all great men and  
women gathered upon stately benches  
before the doors of houses, listening  
to the song of minstrels, or the recita-  
tion of wandering troubadours.

The maritime cities were usually sit-  
uated in the most favorable spots, be-  
cause navigation was so much in  
advance of other means of transport.  
The Free Cities of Italy became the  
nucleus of pure democracy. And  
how much do we not owe to these  
cities in the matter of dis-  
covery and invention, of mighty  
kings and sublime intellects!
