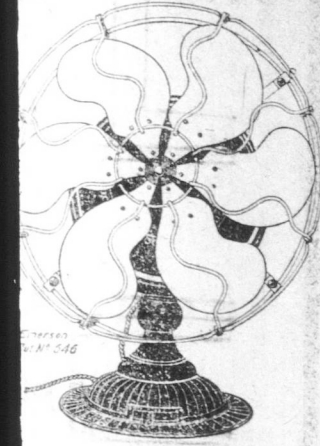

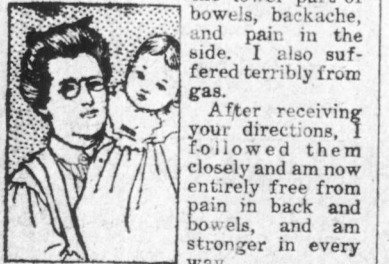

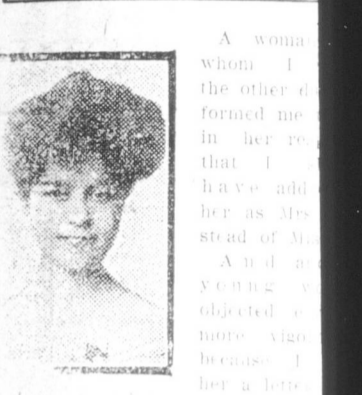

### Reciprocity Affects Newfoundland.

The Reciprocity agreement generally provides for the admission free of duty of all kinds of fresh, frozen, packed in ice, salted or preserved in any form, except sardines and other fish preserved in oil, and shell fish of all kinds, including oysters, lobsters and clams in any state, fresh or packed, and coverings of the foregoing. Seal, herring, whale and other fish oil, including cod oil.

This quotation is from Schedule A or list of articles free of duty. Attached to this Schedule is the following Note: "Fish oil, whale oil, seal oil and fish of all kinds, being the products of fisheries carried on by the fishermen of the United States, shall be admitted into Canada as the produce of the United States."

### The Home Ashore.

The S. S. Home, Capt. O'Reilly, who coming back from Burnin to Pheacina last night, ran ashore on Florida Island. She did not hang on the rocks and when the engines were reversed, she slid back into deep water. Finding that the ship did not leak very badly, Capt. O'Reilly decided to run for Rushmore, about seven miles distant, and beach her. This was done successfully. The Reid Nfld. Co. received the news this morning and at once gave orders to have the S. S. Petrel put in order to go up to Rushmore and tow the Home to St. John's if she is not leaking too badly. They are in the meantime waiting further news as to her condition before sending the Petrel on. The S. S. Glencoe is also held at Grand Bank and will be sent to the assistance of the S. S. Home tonight if deemed necessary. Capt. Jacobs will go in the Petrel. This is the first accident of the kind to the R. N. Co. ships for three years. It is a matter of wonder how the captains of those steamers call at every creek and cove in the Bays at all hours of the night and in all weather without mishap.

### Helen Steward Lost.

This morning a telegram was received by the Smith Co. to the effect that their schooner, the Helen Steward, a fine vessel and one of the best of our foreign carriers, was lost yesterday at Algoa, between Mexico and Pernambuco, on the coast of Brazil. The vessel went from this port some time ago to Pernambuco with a load of fish, reached her destination without mishap, and after discharging was proceeding to Barbadoes to load molasses for this port when the accident befell her. She was commanded by Capt. Burge, who with his crew are natives of this country, and they are safe. The vessel, we learn, was insured.

### Portia's Herring Fishery Report.

From Capt. Fitzpatrick of the Portia we learn that there were four American vessels at Port aux Basques when he was there, and that one of them was hauled into the railway wharf and shipping herring, as they come from the Islands over the rails. The Gloucester schr. Essex, bound to Belleoram, was there in the ice. She is to take there 3000,000 lbs. of green fish owned by Harvey & Co. and sold to the Americans. The Maxine Elliott was at Rose Blanche to procure, if possible, a load of green fish also. These vessels were engaged before this in the herring fishery at Bay of Islands and Bonne Bay. This green fish represents the balance of the bankers' catch remaining unsold at Belleoram. The Hispaniola, Capt. John Lewis, is in Connaigre Bay, and should be there by the time with frozen herring for Boston. Capt. John Lewis hauled 900 barrels of herring for them, and \$2.50 per barrel for green herring, 34 gallons being the standard measure per barrel. Two tubs of the fish go to that measure. Bay of Islands and the Humber are solidly frozen over out to Frenchmen's Head, as are the North and Middle Arms, and the herring are hauled over the ice by teams to the railway station.

### The Fogota Arrives.

The s.s. Fogota, Capt. B. Barbour, arrived here this morning at 8 o'clock from the northward. She left here at 3 p.m. Saturday and had fine weather for a while. When N. W. gales occurred and a heavy snow storm was experienced Saturday night, compelling her to lay in Trinity all that night. She left there Sunday morning early but had a most difficult time of it in getting through the ice, and also which covered the harbor. She was engaged butting her way out from 6 a.m. until 1 p.m., and the ice was 15 feet thick she did not force clear of the pack until 6 p.m. She had a similar experience at Catalina, and reached Fogota Tuesday evening, bringing her freight for that place on the ice, the consignees hauling it away on dog teams. She arrived at Twillingate at 10 Tuesday night after a hard time butting through the ice, and could only reach within a mile of the wharf, and the goods were here also taken over the ice by dog teams. She left again at 1 a.m. Wednesday and proceeded to Herring Neck on her way back from Change Islands, as it was not deemed prudent to enter there on her way north, as there was a possibility of her being caught in the ice, so that she went direct to Twillingate. She had a good run back to Seldom, which she could not reach going north. She then came up to Seldom and other ports and had to butt into Westleyville through the ice. All the bays are covered with thick ice and the heavy Arctic flow is about 7 miles off Cape Bonaville, outside the made ice. Messrs. Murphy and Greene came by her with a few steerage passengers. The ship will now lay up for an overhaul and will dry dock next week. The well deck is to be covered in and the hull to be given an overhaul, as well as the N. Co. ships for three years. 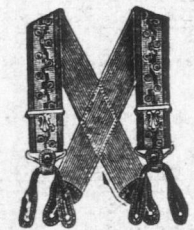

## Holiday Notes for 1910.

I. C. MORRIS.  
Chapter III.—The Beach-stone Industry.

When first we read of the beach stone industry we looked a sort of doubtful, and then smiled, and then wondered would, or could, there be anything in it.

The project seemed an unlikely one, and the familiarity of the beach stones tended to prejudice our minds against their commercial value. But this was not any fault of the stones; they were all right, and our prejudices did not in the least undermine their value. The prejudice was ours; and like many other things in life, we despised them before we tested them, or gave them a chance to prove their worth or state their case. It seems to have been ever thus, and some of the best inventions of the age have been ridiculed by ignorance, and almost defeated by jest.

However, being keenly interested in the industrial problem of the country, and having been in touch with the industrial world for half a century, we decided to see for ourselves what prospects of employment these beach stones offered. Therefore we availed of an early opportunity and went out by the afternoon train on the half holiday of June 22nd. At Manuels station we left the train and wended our way to the beach in the distance, and saw for ourselves the practical side of this peculiar industry. The beach, as most of our readers are aware, is quite a long one, and is about one hundred feet wide, and its summit is about thirty-five or forty feet above the sea level. Thus it will be seen that the entire bulk of such a beach must assume fairly large proportions, and contain myriads and myriads of stones. These stones are all of a small and medium size and mostly of a steel or sea-blue colour. In shape they vary, but none of them are really round nor nearly oval, but resemble eggs or pears in shape and size. For years the sea

has been creating this beach, and annually casts at its base an additional layer or two.

From childhood we had been looking at this very same beach, and only saw it in a long ridge of round stones, and only occasionally met a person on it. But on our arrival there this time a very different picture presented itself to our view, for at regular distances we beheld groups of men and lads, all busily engaged in this novel industry. Some were gathering the stones, others were sewing up the sacks, and others were piling the sacks in bulks along the beach. We noticed that several large bulks had already been made, and that the time for a shipment was evidently drawing near. Those who gathered the stones were provided with a gauge and also a short prong, called a "tormentor." With this latter implement they scratched and roused and turned over the surface, and separated the different sized stones; and then followed the gathering and assorting. The gauge was of metal, and was simply a piece of cast iron scroll work, in which were three openings; through these openings the different stones were passed as a test of their size. From what we saw of this arrangement we decided that this gauge was only used in cases of doubt, as the assortment was made by the men in a general way. Several of the men had strong cuffs and gloves on their hands, and on being questioned as to why they used these appendages, they told us that the constant picking up and handling of the stones was very hard on the fingers, and that several of them who had begun to gather them with their bare hands had suffered from bruises and scratches.

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On a sack being filled, it would at once be taken to the scales and placed thereon, and when the regular weight of one hundred and sixty-eight pounds was made, it was immediately removed and taken in charge by the sewer, who, with strong twine and large needle, firmly bound the mouth of the sack.

The next process was that of numbering the sacks. We did not ascertain how the numbers were arranged, but we noticed that all that we looked at were marked "No. 1." This evidently was in reference to size; there being three sizes of stones put up in the different lots. It could not be a mark of quality, as all the stones were alike in this respect. Sometimes "No. 1" is marked where some other number should go; but in the case of the beach stones there was not any room for such latitude. These stones were in their natural state. They were genuine. Adulteration was an impossibility. They had been thrown up by the sea, and had been bleached by the wind's and storms and sunshine of centuries unknown. Neither the craft nor the intervention of man had affected them; they were Nature's product, and like all the works of Nature, they were perfect and gen-

ine. The sacks being numbered, there was but one more process, and that was piling or putting them in bulk. With this, the work of the pebble gatherers was finished and the entire process performed. We knew many of the men thus engaged and spoke to them, and they were all quite happy in their work. Some of them were well advanced in years, and not very well able to compete in the more exacting channels of labour, but in this industry they had found an avenue of employment that seemed particularly suited to them. They could kneel, or sit, or stand, in the discharge of their duties, and it did not make much difference. The stones were at their feet in millions, and the work was not difficult, though, as we have stated, a little hard on the fingers.

The gentleman in charge did not appear to take any interest in visitors, therefore we did not ask him any questions, or solicit from him any information whatever. We know all about the beach ourselves, and for half a century had a knowledge of it. The process of gathering was open and simple, therefore we learned all that was necessary, and all that we have stated, in a glance or two of the eye. Besides, we were conscious that a few days before our visit there had been some little difference as to the mode and manner of payment, and in this age of strikes and demands it is not unlikely that we appeared in the eye of the manager as a socialist, or a possible disturber; and especially so, as we had shaken hands with some of the aged men.

We were in holiday attire, and had a walking stick, and perhaps felt inclined to appear as somebody. Men do feel that way sometimes. It is a sort of nice to feel oneself a somebody without having the burden of responsibility which such a position usually involves.

But we started out to write about beach stones and not men; but like some speakers, we have got far from the topic. However, we are pleased to be able to say that we found the pebble industry one of much benefit to the people of Long Pond and Manuels, and one which has brought to their very doors a very easy chance of making a good summer's wages. Anything that means employment to our people is worthy of all the support the public can give it. In closing, we therefore wish the Atlantic Pebble Co. continued and abundant success.

Terrible Cases of Destitution.

WOMAN BITTEN BY RATS. The duties which Head Const. Dave and Const. Lawlor at present undertake, have brought them face to face with some terrible instances of poverty and privation the past few weeks.

One of these came under the notice of both men yesterday in a residence on Lime Street, and they will never forget the harrowing spectacle of a man, woman and child, existing in the last stages of hunger, squalor and poverty. James Davis occupies this house with his wife and child, a boy of about 12 years of age. The mother, who would have gladly taken the rats and the legs and cannot get about, while his wife is ill. There was absolutely no food whatever in the house and the mother was literally starving. The kitchen where all were huddled together, had no fire in it nor had there been any in the little stove for days and the mother and child were actually perished from want but for the occasional small dole of food given them by people almost as poor as themselves. Water, which had been accidentally spilled on the floor was found frozen in the kitchen, and the man lay on an old mattress covered with brim bags and an old coat. He suffered severely and told the officers that only a few nights before rats which infest the house, severely bit his wife about the arms while she slept, and this was verified when the woman showed the men the wounds. The officers reported this appalling affair to Inspector General Sullivan, who took immediate steps to supply the present wants of these unfortunates. It would be a kindly act of charity for people possessed with a plenitude of the world's goods to attend to these poor stricken creatures. We also have learned of another case where a man was found in a hotel in the West End, starving with his wife and 2 children in a similar condition. These also were unfortunately without food or fuel and to intensify the horror, the situation of the man was ill and a portion of his back was eaten away with cancer. Those who discovered the case were horror stricken and paid immediate attention to the sufferer and his family.

Not Entitled Under the Rules.

Editor Evening Telegram: Dear Sir.—In last evening's issue of your widely read paper there appeared an item, "A member of the Longshoremen's Union who had been laid up with an attack of illness and had been in the Hospital three months, complains that he is unable to get any satisfaction as to the monetary help that he is entitled to under the rules of the union."

Whoever gave your reporter the information must have done so either through a want of knowledge of the rules of the Union or a desire to misrepresent the attitude of the Union in such cases.
