Some of the owners will come down in August and some of them are at their other country homes or travelling abroad and won't be here at all."

"And have they no friends to whom they could loan their houses?" I asked.

"I don't know," said the old resident, shortly. He looked as if he would like to add, "And I don't care to know. It's none of my business or yours."

But I didn't mind his disapproval. You see, I was so busy wishing I were a King—not the kind of a King they have nowadays, but the fairy tale kind who could make all the laws he wanted and have them obeyed.

And then, the old resident having left me in disgust, I sat down under a pine tree, looked up at the blue sky and pretended I was that kind of a King. And these were the laws I made:

A fine of from one thousand dollars up shall be imposed on any subject who deliberately leaves a beautiful

house closed and useless. If he is too rich to need the rent, he shall loan his house to someone who is too poor to pay the rent. (Judges will not listen to the plea of those who say they were afraid their household goods might be injured. Judges will feel the culprit that he could have found plenty of people who would treat his home as well as his own family would.)

The presence of empty seats in automobiles shall be sternly discouraged. Any owner who is constantly seen with a half-filled car shall be fined. If he persists his license shall be taken away. Automobileists who always take other car owners, or potential car owners, out with them, shall be punished in a similar manner.

To let a ticket to any place of amusement go unused before it has been offered to at least three people who could not have afforded to buy it for themselves, shall be punished by a fine of not less than the value of more than a hundred times the value of the ticket.

Household Notes

New Ironware cannot be used for cooking unless it is first boiled and the addition of potato peeling to the water is one of the best means of getting the new ware in proper condition. Some experienced housekeeper could do a bride a good turn by helping her in this respect.

To split a shortcake without burning the fingers, fill the pan half full of the batter, then spread it over with a teaspoonful of melted butter. Then put in the rest of the batter and spread it out so that none of the batter shows. When the cake is baked it will split easily.

An excellent cement for mending tinware is made by mixing litharge and glycerine to the consistency of thick cream or putty. The mended article must not be used until the cement has had time to dry, which may be a week or more. The litharge can be secured at drug stores.

When anything on a cooking range boils over, burn and smokes, open all the kitchen windows and lift one plate from the range to allow the smoke to be drawn up the chimney. If this doesn't destroy the odor, put a little vinegar on to boil, which dissolves unpleasant smells.

When taking a cutting from a plant, form the habit of rubbing a bit of damp earth upon the end of the slip and also upon the spot where it was broken off. This prevents what is called bleeding—a loss of sap—and saves the vitality of both. It is putting saliva upon an open sore.

My white enameled bed became very much soiled, and a friend advised washing it with soda water. She dissolved one teaspoonful of baking soda in one pint of warm water, and after washing the bed with a soft cloth saturated with the solution, wiped it off with a dry one. This treatment will clean any white enameled furniture.

It is a difficult matter to cut away the material under lace insertion without severing a wrong thread un-

Getting Rid of Mosquitoes.

The worst kind of mosquito infestation in any neighborhood can be suppressed and the pests destroyed within two weeks, if proper and efficient steps are taken toward breaking up the breeding places, or oiling the water where the young live. A film of oil, such as common kerosene oil, on the surface of the water will destroy the larvae within a few minutes. When the oil is first poured on the water, the little wrigglers will go down, but they soon come to the surface to breathe. When they come in contact with the thin film of oil, they are unable to breathe, and they are sure to perish at once. Thus it is possible to keep the water in the rain barrel, tank or cistern without mosquitoes multiplying in it.

The addition of a little kerosene oil to water that is to be used for laundry purposes will not prove harmful in the least, but on the other hand will be really beneficial. Of course, where water is to be used for drinking by poultry or live stock, the oil should be dipped or strained off before one can expect the animals to use it.

Cook Pours Hot Fat on Woman and Baby.

New York, August 21.—Three women and a child were frightfully burned with boiling fat by a cook who attacked them in the home of Bernhard A. Ludwig at 182 Ward Ave., Stapleton, yesterday afternoon. The women who were injured are still unable to give a connected account of the occurrence, but it is believed that the cook was insane from the intense heat of the kitchen where she had been working. She disappeared before any one could reach the house and has not been caught.

Neither Mr. Ludwig, who is a chemist at 182 Front Street, Manhattan, nor Mrs. Ludwig was home at the time. Mrs. Mary Holoch, a niece of Mrs. Ludwig, went to the Ludwig house intending to have dinner there. Mrs. Jennie Clansh, a nurse, Mrs. Hugh Hauflert, a landress, and Mr. Ludwig's son, Irvine, who is 18 months old, were the only persons there beside the cook.

Her name is Amelia Ditcher. She is 25 years old and has been employed there since March. Mr. Ludwig says she was always well behaved.

How Are The Mighty Falling.

When Sir Edward Morris was returned to power in 1909, he convinced himself he was firmly in the saddle for a quarter of a century. Then he was high and mighty, to-day he is low spirited and depressed. There is not a constituency in which his name are not shaking in their shoes. The Morris men obtained power by promises, some of them in the Manifesto, more of them out of it.

Promises put them in. Willful waste is putting them out. St. John's East was never stronger liberal than it is to-day. Nothing can stand against Kent and his colleagues. St. John's West is only waiting its chance to show Sir Edward Morris and his colleagues the door. Last election it was recognized that the Morris men were beaten in the city and won out by votes in the outlying settlements. To-day these settlements are giving Morris and his men the cold shoulder, and the sentiment in the city was never so adverse to Morris as it is to-day. In Harbour Main it is conceded that Woodford and Murphy will not have a ghost of a chance. The hopes of Warren are very slim in Port de Grave. He got there last time by some twenty odd votes. The Union men in Baredene and Port de Verde are giving him a strong support last time are now determined to put him out and out he will go. Three Opposition men this time for Harbour Grace is the cry throughout the district. A great change has come over Bay de Verde. Coley's Point, Shearstown and Sparling's Bay where Piccott and his colleague drew their main support. Bryant's Cove, Upper Harbour, Harbour Grace South and Harbour Grace are more liberal to-day than they ever were. Carboneau is the strength of the Morris Government. Pickings, patronage and jobs have cooked Goodson's goose. The Union and Liberal forces will play havoc with Crosby and Whiteway. Crosby's contracts and spars and Whiteway's patronage have opened the eyes of the voters in Bay de Verde and they are determined that the Morris men must walk the plank. Everybody recognizes that the Morris men are doing for in Trinity Bay. The hostility of Catalina, Trinity Bight, the head of the Bay and the settlements on the South Side against the Morris Government makes it clear that Watson, Squires and Grant cannot win. The strength of the Union organization makes that certain. Bond's candidates in Trinity Bay will be on top.

The revulsion of feeling in the Bonavista district is phenomenal. The strength of the Union is paramount. The success of Mr. Coaker in the Bonavista District is marvellous. Blandford, Winsor and Morrison are agitating and when the Election Day comes, when the Union strikes, they will wonder what struck them. No one can seriously contend that the Morris men will have a show there in face of Liberal sentiment and Union resentment against the Morris Government. Morris got an eye opener when he was there. In Green Bay it will take the Tory candidates all their time to save their nomination fees. Clapp will be nominated under. He will be strongly supported by the Union. The Gibbs-Downey racket has done away with the chance the Morris men had. Moulton if he goes to Burgo this time will have the fight of his life. In Fortune Bay, Emerson is hard up against the sentiment against the Tory Government and the desire of the people for a change. The outlook for the Liberal candidates in the Burn District is fine. Never better. The Tory vote in Grand Bank will not be so plentiful.

Last week he had the misfortune to fall over the stairs at his home and broke his hip. He was hurt internally as well, and never recovered from the shock. Deceased is mourned by a large circle of relatives and friends.

Cable News.

WASHINGTON, To-day.
President Wilson to-night warned all Americans to leave Mexico at once, and at the same time the American Embassy and all Consular representatives were instructed to notify all officials civil and military in Mexico they would be held strictly responsible for harm or injury done to Americans or their property. The Congressmen leaves decided last night that President Wilson's vigorous assertion of a definite policy toward Mexico would have the effect of staying Congress for a time at least from open criticism of the Administration and the demands for information. Those who discussed the message agreed to the general statement it presented of a frank statement as to recent negotiations with the Huerta Government, and at the same time definitely outlined the American policy for the future. Republicans joined with the democrats in endorsement of the President's utterances. Thus far, however, there has been little detailed discussion of the plans outlined.

S. S. Imperator. Damaged by Fire.

Officer and Sailor Perish.

NEW YORK, Noon.
The steamship Imperator, largest afloat, swept by fire to-day at dock in Hoboken with crew and over a thousand passengers aboard. Second officer Cobbecht, who led the crew into the hold to fight the flames got cut off from his men and enveloped in a cloud of smoke and suffocated. The body was recovered untouched by fire; one seaman also perished. Tons of water were poured into the hold. When the fire was checked the vessel had listed fifteen degrees. The passengers were aroused from sleep by the crackling of flames and rushed panic stricken from the pier.

Sir E. P., Mr. Bennett and Mr. Kennedy were out at Petty Harbour yesterday. They visited many houses including the power house, sounded the people and "kissed the baby." Their reception was about the coolest that Sir E. P. and colleagues got in that section. The people of Petty Harbour are about as tired of false promises and general neglect as the people of Grand Cove, Killbuck and St. John's West which gave the Premier such a jolt last time. The avalanche will strike as quickly in St. John's as elsewhere.

Firemen's Sports at Bell Island.

The firemen's sports at Bell Island, held yesterday were very interesting and were attended by a concourse including many from St. John's. The sports were held in connection with the Garden Party under the auspices of the D.L.S. Boat Club, and clever exhibitions were given by the fire-fighters whose company was organized two months ago by Mr. McMillan, of Sydney. The men climbed ladders to great heights with the agility of the chamois, ran with their hose carts and performed feats of strength and daring well worth seeing. An entertainment and dance followed. The Regatta sports take place Saturday next.

Arthur Lush Reported Killed.

By yesterday's mail, news came that Mr. Arthur Lush, a Newfoundland and who resided on King's Road, was killed in the mines at Trinidad, Venezuela. The first intimation of the tragedy was received by Mrs. E. Dehoney, who had a letter from her husband, who was working beside Mr. Lush. Both these men left here together and it is not more than a week ago that the Telegram noted the fact how they were making good, earning big wages and were foremen over a batch of sixty men each in the Mataco mines, Trinidad. However, the letter received from Mr. Dehoney, stated briefly how Mr. Lush met his death. He received a fall, only a short distance, but was so seriously hurt internally that death resulted. The letter stated that everything possible was done for him. This morning, Rev. G. R. Golden was acquainted of the "divine" news and he was inconsolable over the loss of her son, as she was looking forward to his home-coming shortly. Deceased was a very man favored, known in the city. For many years he was a prominent member of the C.L.B. and an active worker in its undertakings. James and Charles Lush, of the Reid Co., and Fred Painter at Campbell's Carriage Factory, are brothers of the deceased. He leaves three sisters. The deepest sympathy of the community will be extended to the family in their grief-stricken moments.

Has Crew of Chinamen.

The s.s. Amelia, which arrived here recently from New York, has a crew of 19 Chinamen on board. These comprise sailors, firemen and stewards, and only yesterday did it become known to the authorities that they were on the ship. As it became evident to the captain that there was a disposition on the part of some of them to land, he acquainted the police officers O'Keefe and O'Flaherty were commissioned to watch them, and they guarded them faithfully. Yesterday afternoon and to-day a police officer is on the pier keeping strict guard over the Chinamen. These Orientals are now being employed as sailors, they are undermining the white races in other walks of life, and some day the trouble will come, as an Ethiopian poet well expresses it:— "He can pick up a libel wherever he goes." By walking the railroad and washin' old close. He can lib' about as cheap as a leather wing hat. For he watches the rat market keen as a cat. But dere's goin' to be racket wiff waitin' to see "the walkin' man butts" gainst the yaller Chinee."

World's Champion Bucking Horse Rider.

Winnipeg, August 17.—Emery Le-Grande, Pincher Creek, Alberta, was on Saturday declared the world's champion bucking horse rider at the Stampede, after having ridden no less than three times, each time on a fresh broncho, during the decision of the contest, so close was the fight. The award was popular among the contestants and the spectators. Le-Grande followed up the announcement with an exhibition of riding without any bridle at all and with both hands high in the air as he bucked as the corals held, Harry Webb, of Cheyenne, Wyoming, was awarded second place. The bareback buck-jumping championship went to Rufus Rollins, Miles City, Montana, who rode throughout with his hand banded and suffering from a bad case of blood poisoning. Red Walker, of High River, Alberta, was second, and Bob Wilson, Estevan, Alberta, third. A. J. Bryson, Medicine Hat, is the Canadian steer roping champion. Joe Gardner, Sierra Blanca, Texas, is the world's champion in the individual steer roping contest, and his team also won the \$3,000 team contest. His best time for one steer was 27 2/5 seconds. Frank Marsh is the world's best bull-dogger with an average of 30 1/2 seconds each for three steers. His best time for one was 7 4/5 seconds. Florence LeDuc (Mrs. Guy Weadick) retains the fancy roping championship among the women, and Bee Ho Gray won the men's championship.

A Japanese Idea.

The late Mutsuhito, emperor of Japan, on an occasion shortly before his death took a railway journey in the northern part of Japan and arrived at his destination half an hour late on account of a slight accident on the road. Next day the manager of the road committed suicide giving as the reason for his act the fact that his bad management had inconvenienced the emperor. The case attracted a great deal of attention, and some of the leading men of Japan, commenting on the dead man's act, criticized his point of view. In the eyes of his fellow-townsmen however, his deed was commendable, for they erected a statue in his honor a san ideal exponent of the Japanese conception of loyalty.

SHERBROKE, To-day.—Harry K. Thaw won three victories yesterday and was locked last night in Sherbrooke jail, because of the time being from the Dominion immigration authorities, after having received from the townspeople at Sherbrooke an ovation that would have done honor to a Prince of the Royal blood. So riotous was the scene in the Supreme Court, when after the morning session Justice Glenshank refused to allow Counsel representing New York State to be a party to the proceedings that our subsequently awarded spectators that a reputation of cheering, chair climbing, handkerchief waving, and general hysteria would mean jail sentences for the demonstrators. Speaking from the bench in the afternoon session, he said never in his experience as a member of the Bar and Bench had he been witness to such disgraceful scenes. It was carried out in the presence of four armed Dominion police, who stood immobile while emotional women rushed towards Stamford Whites' lawyer, crying, "Three cheers for Thaw." Three cheers for British flag, we will give you justice, Harry." Last night with Thaw's term of confinement indeterminate and the key to the middle anoned, there was general exodus of those who rushed hither after a fugitive's sensational escape from Mattawan, eleven days ago.

There was no fire at all but the fire was really in progress and directed them. Had he left the box he must have got into trouble as it would have likely constituted a case of false alarm.

Kaiser William Tries to Undo Press Mischief

London, August 19.—The German Emperor took advantage of the Emperor Francis Joseph's 83rd birthday yesterday to undo some of the mischief caused by the Austro-German press polemics during the last few days. His speech at the birthday banquet at Hamburg was even more cordial than his rude on such occasions. He was evidently anxious to efface the impression caused by the divergence of German and Austrian policy over the question of the revision of the Bucharest treaty during the second Balkan war and the ensuing peace negotiations. It became clear that the two countries did not see eye to eye on Balkan matters. Austria was anxious not to see Bulgaria too greatly weakened nor to see Servia and Greece become too powerful. When the treaty was concluded she wished it to be revised by the Powers, with the object of procuring for Bulgaria a better outlet on the Aegean and a greater share of Macedonia.

Mr. Lawson Dodd, of London, says that 70 per cent. of the children of the children of England require dental attention and that women's teeth are worse than men's. His view is that every person should be entitled to demand, at any time of life, the "dentistry of necessity." There are 25,000 dentists qualified to serve under the Insurance Act. There are only 5,000 dentists. There ought to be far more.

The possibility, apparently not imminent, of the National Insurance scheme having money to spend on dentistry is to be anticipated. After a long discussion the idea of a public dental service was approved, and the board of the association was instructed to promote such a service in desirable towns and areas.—Daily Mail, Aug. 4.



Now Guarding the Great Seal.

The visit of the Lord Chancellor (Lord Haldane) to America, during the long vacation this year, is by way of being a precedent, for it is the first occasion of a Lord Chancellor paying an official visit abroad since the days of Cardinal Wolsey.

The Lord Chancellor is custodian of the Great Seal, and the post is no sinecure. He must take the Great Seal with him wherever he goes in Great Britain, but it is never allowed to leave the realm. Wolsey broke this rule by taking it to France, an infringement of the constitution which was amongst the causes which led to his downfall. Whilst in office, therefore, the Lord Chancellor cannot take a holiday abroad. During Lord Haldane's absence from the country it will be necessary to find temporary custodians for the object of his charge. When James II. fled from England he threw the Great Seal in the Thames, thinking that no important document could be signed without it. One of our famous Lord Chancellors, Lord Brougham, had a somewhat curious experience when he took it to Scotland. He was one of a house party, and the ladies determined to play him a practical joke. They took the Seal from his room and hid it out of his reach. When he discovered it was missing he was beside himself with distress, for he believed it had been stolen. Soon, however, he realized the trick that had been served him. He joined in the laugh against himself and searched the house, eventually discovering it in a tea chest.

The woollack is also an early symbol of the Lord Chancellor's office. It is reminiscent of the days when wool was Britain's staple product, and consists of an ottoman couch stuffed with wool to represent the importance of this commodity. Whilst acting as Speaker of the House of Lords, the Lord Chancellor sits on the woollack.

ATELHASA, Ate, To-day. Rev. Mr. Fry, Anglican Missionary, who set out last year to investigate the Steffanson story, regarding the discovery of a tribe of blonde Eskimos, was compelled to return to Herschel Island from Perry Sound, owing to a shortage of provisions.

LONDON, To-day. Strong pickets of strikers, belonging to the construction and electrical trades, endeavored to induce workmen to lay down tools at Buckingham Palace, Marlborough House, the Admiralty and Premier Asquith's official residence at Downing St. The strikers appear to be gaining ground. Many firms granted their demands. Most public museums and Government institutions are suffering from the absence of electricity. Candles were the sole means of illumination last night at the Colonial Office where elevators have been put out of commission.

PEKING, To-day. A crisis was reached here yesterday owing to the arrest of nine members of the Chinese Parliament. Since the proclamation of martial law in the capital, arrest and summary executions have been of frequent occurrence, several victims being members of parliament. Many Deputies departed for South in fear of their lives. The Assembly in Parliament of a Quorum has been prevented on numerous occasions, owing to rumors that the police intended to make further arrests. The senate passed a motion delegating the speaker and deputy speaker to visit the Provisional President, Yuan Shi Kai, to ask him for an explanation of the arrests and also to inquire whether he still desired to govern China with a Parliament or not. At the same time, the Senate resolved not to sit again if the reply of Yuan Shi Kai proved unsatisfactory. The Lower House passed resolutions of similar tenor.

South African Naval Policy Not Announced.

LONDON, August 19.—The general opinion in Capetown regards the present time as inopportune for any declaration. As to South Africa's willingness to share in the empire naval defence, General Botha has to find a hundred thousand pounds for land defence, and the desire is to have a mobile striking force, the necessity for it being apparent in the recent Rand trouble, when the police, scattered all over the country, proved totally ineffective.

CAPE GRIZNEZ, Aug. 27.
Jabez Wilks abandoned his cross-channel swim yesterday, returning here in the accompanying boat. The water was too rough. This was his ninth attempt.

HALIFAX, August 27.
Tonnage entering this harbor continues to increase. It is expected that this winter there will be a larger amount than ever. Additional liners are the Cunard six steamers a month and the Italian and Norwegian American lines each with two a month.

DUBLIN, August 28.
The Lord Lieut. has refused to order an investigation into the conduct of the Londonderry police during the recent riots, who the Unionists say favor the Nationalists, because they want to curry favor in event of the Irish Parliament being established.

DOVER, August 27.
Henry Sullivan, of Lowell, Mass., failed in his attempt to swim the English Channel yesterday. He was in the water 9 hours 28 minutes, and within six miles of Cape Griznez, France. Seas breaking over the accompanying motor boats, the pilot demanded that the effort be abandoned.

WASHINGTON, August 27.
President Wilson, as scheduled, read his message to both Houses of Congress to-day, defining the American policy in Mexican affairs. The message states that Mr. Lind having practically concluded his mission, went to Vera Cruz chiefly to impress upon Huerta that the limit of delay had been reached.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 27.
A joint resolution requesting President Wilson to negotiate with the British and Canadian governments to establish railroad connections between the States and Alaska, has been introduced. The preamble says that the railroad is necessary to enable the Assembly, with consent of Canada, to undertake the defence of Alaska.

JUAREZ, August 27.
Advices from Mexico say that Huerta has resigned. It is stated he sent his resignation in a sealed envelope to Senor Gamboa. The contents of the note has been sent to Washington. General Trivene is said to have already been chosen as Huerta's successor, and will take charge as provisional president as soon as he reaches Mexico City.

BELGRADE, August 27.
The Serbian government decline to cooperate with the Carnegie Commission investigating alleged Balkan atrocities, because of the presence of Professor Paul Mikloff, leader of the Constitutional democrats in the Russian Duma. The countries represented are Britain, United States, France, Russia, Germany and Austria. Premier Paschitch of Serbia yesterday expressed the fear that Professor Mikloff might be prejudiced

Another Double Drowning.

Two Lunenburg Fishermen Drowned While Trawling on the Grand Banks—One Body Recovered.

At three o'clock yesterday afternoon the Lunenburg banking schooner W. C. McKay, Capt. Deal, came to port with net bag flying at halfmast and reported the loss of two of her crew. The victims are James Moseman, married, with a wife and two children, and Andrew Hirtle, unmarried. Both belonged to Lower Kingsburg, Lunenburg.

Yesterday week the vessel left Lunenburg where she got a squid baiting and went to the Grand Banks to fish. On Monday morning last all the dories of the banky visited the trawls. At noon when they came back one dory failed to turn up. This was the one that the two unfortunate young men were in and which was struck by a heavy squall and capized. The vessel immediately set out in quest of the missing dory but after a two hours search it was found bottom up with the lifeless body of Moseman laying on it, but there was no sign of Hirtle who had gone to the deep.

When the dory capized Moseman managed to climb to the bottom of the dory and held on grim death to a rope until he succumbed. The poor fellow must have struggled hard in keeping himself on the dory while being tossed about by the waves. His legs and arms were badly chafed so that it is believed he died chiefly from exhaustion.

Moseman's body was taken from the dory and put on board the vessel which returned to port last evening. Under the present commitment his trial may not come on till October. Jerome says that the position is beyond him, the fine points of the Canadian law involved are such that he could not feel justified in even guessing the outcome. District Attorney Cinger says that if Jerome cannot solve the muddle, he certainly can not.

ROCKLAND, Me., Aug. 28.
Speeding across the bay in a motor boat, Henry Dyer, fisherman, sighted a motor boat drifting seaward. Ranning alongside he found two occupants in it dead; Carl Perry, aged 20, and Aggie Spear, aged 19. The girl was shot through the heart, and Perry held a revolver in his death grasp and was shot through the mouth. Mutual agreement to die is the coroner's verdict.

CHRISTCHURCH, N.Z., Aug. 28.
Relief arrived just in the nick of time to save the life of Dr. Mawson, the Austrian explorer, and his five companions, who were left in March last on Mequarrie Island, in the Antarctic Ocean. When the other 24 members of the expedition returned to Tasmania on the s.s. Aurora, from the South Polar trip, the six men were believed to have ample provisions to last until the Antarctic spring, but the Commander of the Government steamer recently sent to the relief, reports the explorers had exhausted all their supplies and were sometime living on hearts and tongues of sea elephants. The expedition, which was unfortunate in losing two of its members, left Hobart, Dec. 2, 1911, to explore and survey the Antarctic coast line.

BERLIN, August 27.
In an article in the Zeitung Mittag, Baron Hartman von Richthofen, formerly secretary of the German Embassy at Washington, and recently charge d'affaires in Mexico City, criticizes America's "do nothing" policy and demands that speedy steps be taken to establish permanent government in Mexico. Revolution, he declares, would be impossible without the importation of arms by Huerta. President Huerta would not claim the necessary funds to maintain his army if the States would prevent this. If America refuses to recognize Huerta, the Baron says, she should announce it publicly, and offer his successor a guarantee for the absolute closing of the frontier to both men and arms. In that event, he believes Huerta would be patriotic enough to retire.

Ferdinand and Isabella



Ferdinand and Isabella were a devoted married couple who have become famous in history by acting as a joint angel for Christopher Columbus. They backed Christopher to the full extent of several bond issues, and Isabella even went so far as to pawn her jewelry in order that Columbus might discover a land which a few years later wiped Spain off the high seas with one hand.

At the time Ferdinand and Isabella were married Spain was infested with a large number of unpopular citizens called Moors, who were holding all of the offices and distributing the food and patronage in any way they saw fit. Ferdinand and Isabella determined to get rid of the Moors by confiscating their breath, and they were so successful in this pursuit that not a Moor got out of Spain with a perfect windpipe. The hardest Moor they had to deal with was a person named Boabdil, who refused to even become hoarse until he had slain several thousand Spaniards who were in a good state of health at the time. Boabdil shut himself up in the city of Granada and did not surrender until he was completely out of sand, iron and canned goods.

From accounts given by people who knew Ferdinand and Isabella well, it appears that Ferdinand was the weaker vessel of the two. He was an excellent lawn tennis player, but objected to getting out on the fringe line and having arrowheads sunk into his person. On numerous occasions Ferdinand was about to surrender in one proud Castilian leap when Isabella would mount her horse and egg on the Spanish militia with voice and whip. There was very little of the clinging vine about Isabella, which accounts for the depressed look Ferdinand wears in most of his pictures.

It was Isabella who invented the Spanish inquisition, which enabled a great many patriots to die for their country on the installment plan.

Ferdinand and Isabella reigned for thirty years and each had the satisfaction of dying a natural death. They also died seized of considerable real estate, in Cuba and elsewhere, to which no confining American ever read his title clear.


