If games and other amusements are debarred what will the people do on this public holiday? They will, with few exceptions, do much worse. Then let us be natural. Let those who wish, attend their churches and say their prayers. Let others who wish play, especially the younger people, and do not let them feel that those who so gallantly gave their lives are to be a stone around the necks of the living. When a soldier is being buried, the men parade slowly, the drums are muffled, the band plays the saddest airs. Once buried, the men step out lively, the drums are not longer muffled, the band plays the liveliest airs they know. Those men have died glorious deaths. Their memory is dear to us. In time memorials will be raised to them as an inspiration to future generations. What more can we do? Let us do what they would have us do, what we ourselves

(a reference to the extra point given in the game of cribbage to the holder of one of the jacks.) The prince smiled merrily and waved his hat to the man with "gleaming teeth." As he walked through the great mills thousands of girl employees lined up and sang "For He's a Jolly Good Fellow," a song which the prince appears to enjoy more than "God bless the Prince of Wales." At Paisley Town Hall, the Provost said to him, "You do not refuse to do your work. You are one of the hardest workers in the whole Empire. Your pluck and endurance in the war have produced in our hearts the deepest esteem. More than all our respect for your ancient lineage we like you."

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
