The Derby was established in 1780, a year later than the Oaks. This latter classic, which like the One Thousand Guineas is for fillies only, is run over the same course as the Derby two days later. In 1787 Lord Derby's Sir Peter Teazle won the Derby, but no horse carrying Lord Derby's colors won again until Sansovino captured the classic last year.

An indication as to the possibility of Manna, the Two Thousand winner, capturing the Derby, is given in the records which show that in the past 112 years just 26 thoroughbreds have won both classics. There were Smolensko, Caland, Day Middleton Cotherstone, West Australian, the Marquis, Gladiator, Lord Lyon, Formosa, Petrarch, Pretender, Shotover, Ormonde, Ayrshire, Gormon, Isinglass, Ladas, Saltee More, Flying Fox, Diamond Jubilee, Rock Sand, St. Amant, Minoru, Pommern, in 1915, Gay Crusader in 1917 and Gainsborough in 1918, the last three substitute races at Newmarket.



Field Marshal Sir John French, Earl of Ypres, a soldier who has figured most prominently in the history of British military affairs ever since the days of the South African campaign, has passed away in his seventythird year following an operation.

The oldest son of a Naval officer, he joined the training ship and served as a cadet and a midshipman for four years. Decida greater attraction for him, he, citizenship. effected a transfer, and in 1874 joined the 8th Hussars.
