The fact appears to be that Minister Johnson has interpreted more literally than is agreeable to American feelings the instructions which he received, before his departure, from Mr. Seward, to bring about a settlement of the question by making any honorable concession. They never contemplated the possibility of his admitting the right of English citizens to claim compensation for damages done to their property by the United States navy; but, if we are to believe the latest information on the subject, he has done so, and this action constihas done so, and this action constitutes a pill at which Americans are making grimaces even before they have been actually called upon to swallow it. They fully anticipated that what ever cash there was in the transaction would be to their credit, and

that there would be no contra.

The latest version of the story re The latest version of the story regarding the arrangements is, that the question of damages is to be referred to a commission of four, two to be chosen by England, and two by America, and that it has been decided the commissioners are to sit in Washington. Britain holds herself in readings which may any damages which may ton. Britain holds herself in readi-ness to pay any damages which may be given against her: and the first ar-ticle in the protocol gives her the pow-er of compelling the settlement of all counter claims for losses sustained by her subjects in consequence of the ci-vil war. To this point the Americans object as conferring a favour upon object, as conferring a favour upon them not to be enjoyed by loyal citi-zens of the South, who suffered severe cons of the South, who suffered severe losses during the conflict and are debarred from all hope of recompense. But the cases are entirely dissimilar. On the one hand there were neutrals whose property should have been considered inviolable by the contending parties; and on the other there were citizens of the United States who chose to take a certain side and in so doing inevitably incurred a certain risk, so that no paralell can be established. It is to be hoped, however, that the honourable, the commissioners will soon meet in Washington or some place else, settle the matter as satisfactorily as possible and let us have done with it.

Mr. Greeley's back is toward us. He is seated at his desk. His head is bent over his writing, and his round shoulders are quite prominent. He is scribling rapidly. A quire of fooleap, occupying the only clear space on his desk, is melting beneath his pen. A glance at the manuscript reveals two dozen knotry figures. You may be sure of a leader on the National Debt to-morrow morning. The desk itself is a heap of confusion. Here is Mr. Greeley's straw hat; there his handkerchief. In front of him is a pack of newspaper clippings, not neatly rolled up, but closely sprawled over the desk. At his left a rickety pair of scissore catches a hurried nap, at his right is a paste pot and a half broken box of wafers appears to have a rough-and-tumble fight. An old locking paper holder is just ready to tumble on the floor. An old fashioned sand-box, looking like a dilapidated hour glass, is half hidden under a slashed copy of the New York World. Mr. Greeley still sticks to wafers and sand, instoad of using muclage and blotting paper. A small drawer, filled with postage stamps and bright steel pens has crawled out on the desk. Fackages of folded missives are tucked in the pigeon-holes winking at us from the back of the desk, and scores of half opened letters mixed with seedy brown envelopes, flop lazily about the table. Old papers lig gashed and mangled about his chair, the debrisof a literary battle field. A clean towel hangs on a rack to his right. A bound copy of the Tribune Almanac, from 1838 to 1868, swings from a small chain fastened to a staple screwed in the side of the desk; two other bound volumes stand on their feet in front of his nose, and two more of the same kind are fast asleep on the bookrack in the corner. The room is kept scropulously neat and clean. A waste paper basket squats between Mr. Greeley's legs, but one half the torner of the same kind are fast asleep on the bookrack in the corner. ing room. Mr. Greeley gets paper quicker than a hugry fisherman could skin an cel.

Mr. Greeley can lay a Virgina wormfence in ink faster than any other editor in New York city. He uses a fountain pen, a present from some friend. He thinks a great deal of it, but during an experience of three years has failed to learn the simple principle of suction without getting his mouth full of ink, and he generally uses it with an empty receiver. He makes a dash at the ink-bottle every twenty-seconds, places the third finger and thumb of his left hand on the paper, and scratches away at his worm fence like one possessed. He writes marvelous fast. Frequently the point of his pen pricks through his sheet for he writes a heavy hand and a snap follows, spreading inky spots over the paper resembling a wood-cut portraying the sparks from a blacksmith's hammer. Blots like mashed spiders or crushed huckleberries occasionally intervence; but the old veteran dashes them with sand, leaving a swearing compositor to scratch off the soil, and dig out the words underneath.
