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KING GEORGE IS VERY BUSY MAN

Body of Late King Will Be Conveyed to Westminster Hall Tuesday

FUNERAL SERVICE WILL BE BRIEF

Many Appropriate Wreaths Are Being Sent From Canada and U. S.

London, May 12.—From a life of comparative ease and retirement, King George suddenly found himself one of the hardest worked officials in the kingdom. In addition to spending considerable time in the study of the comforting his widowed mother, he has to attend to multitudinous duties connected with the preparation of the royal funeral and the arrangement of the details of the funeral in state and the funeral of Edward VII.

BRITISH COMMONS TO MEET JUNE 8

A Large Amount of Business to Be Considered and Session is Expected to Be a Long One.

London, May 12.—Aquith's announcement that commons will meet on June 8 gives the Ministers a badly needed extension of holiday and accords with the general desire that the constitutional controversies should not be resumed earlier. The premier's outline of business to be taken, namely, civil list and some unnamed business, including possibly a bill dealing with the coronation oath, means a further pause in the budget of 1911, due of course to whether it will be introduced with the lords yet still undecided.

T. BURROWS' SAW MILL BURNED TO THE GROUND

Loss is Very Heavy and is Only Half Covered by Insurance

Grandview, Man., May 12.—T. A. Burrows' large saw mill, which was started this season's cut on Monday, was burned to the ground this morning about 7:30 o'clock. It is supposed that sparks from the chimney started the fire. The loss on the mill is about \$65,000 which is about half covered by insurance.

PERIOD OF MOURNING FOR LATE KING

Edmonton, May 12.—His Excellency the Lt.-Governor has announced the following cable-gram from the colonial secretary in London: "The Governor-General has agreed to furnish the current by August, or September at the latest, so that the accident means that power cannot be furnished before October, anyhow."

UNIVERSAL UNIFORM FOR MOUNTED TROOPS

Decidedly Different From Any Other Uniform in the Militia and Will Be Very Attractive.

Ottawa, Ont., May 12.—The militia department has adopted a uniform for all mounted troops. The idea is to make the uniform question less complicated. The cavalry and artillery will be particularly affected, as well as the mounted divisions of other branches of the service. The present uniform will not apply to infantry. It is decidedly different from any other uniform in the militia, the riding breeches being one color and the serge another. The trousers are of Bedford cord material, of a khaki color, and will be worn with tanned leather leggings and tanned boots.

SEVERAL NEW TOWNS ARE SPRINGING UP

Route of Proposed New Railway From Medicine Hat to Calgary

Medicine Hat, May 12.—The Southern Alberta Land company, the head office of which is at Medicine Hat, is pushing work on its big irrigation project as quickly as possible. The company owns approximately 400,000 acres of land, of which it has the Bow river and six townships along the main line of the C.P.R. west of Medicine Hat.

COURSE OF MAIN CANAL

The intake of the main canal is four miles west of the Blackfoot Indian reserve, south of Strathmore, and after cutting across the south western part of the reserve runs almost directly south for about twenty-five miles, along the line of the Bow river.

TOWN OF SUFFIELD

The company placed the townsite of Suffield on the market on April 29 last, and in three days sold 42,000 worth of property at prices ranging from \$100 to \$250 per acre. The town is located near the eastern side of eastern section of the tract and is surrounded by a very fertile soil.

SOUTHERN ALBERTA RAILWAY

One of the questions that will come before the provincial legislature when it re-assembles on May 25, will be that of guaranteeing the bonds of the Southern Alberta railway company, the proposed line from Medicine Hat to Calgary.

Calgary would rather lose to him than to any other team, and perhaps that's the story in a nutshell of why Calgary lost yesterday.

To tell everything that happened would take up the space of a whole newspaper. There was a grand parade, good baseball, bad baseball, errors, home head plays and everything else that comes under the baseball category. It was a very exciting game on account of its close score.

Deacon got a 3 run lead in the first inning, but steady plodding by Calgary, who got a run in the second, third and fifth, tied the score. Then in the eighth the naughty Deacons got two more. Not by anything like good on their part, because they pulled the two scores without even making a hit. Calgary went up into the air so high that the two runs came in before they touched ground again.

Things looked pretty rosy, but Connors filed to third and Stanley hit out to Rube Mills, and thus the prospects were like a rabbit's tail cut short.

The burlesque of the day was from Alvin Baxter, who started kicking about Gehan's delivery. He kicked himself out of the game. The Ump's told Moose to skidoo off the grounds, but Moose said he would stay right where he was. He was bluffing, but with the umpire, who got a policeman to move Mr. Baxter. When Moose saw the cop he made a quick exit, one that would do credit to a theatrical performer on amateur night, when the hook is in sight.

In the second, third and fourth, fifth and sixth Calgary played swell ball, and Edmonton never had a look in. It was a case of one, two, three each time.

From the second to the end of the seventh only nineteen men faced Gehan in six innings. Then the unlucky eighth came. Deacon got two runs without making a hit. Two errors and a base on balls and two hits by pitcher tallied the score for Calgary. One in the second, Kellackey got up on Brennan's over-throw to first, was sacrificed to second, but Catcher Stanley got down perfect one to left and scored Kellackey. Another came in the third. Duggan got up on Jack Brennan's wild throw, Carney beat out a bunt, and Duggan scored on Clpe's sacrifice. There was nothing doing in the fourth. Carney's bunch got another in the fifth and one more in the eighth. In the last half of the ninth Calgary needed one run to tie the score. Pete Standridge was sent in to bat for Gehan, but Peter struck out, leaving Calgary's chances very slim. The final came when Duggan lined out a hard one, which under ordinary circumstances would have been a safe one, but it lined right in. Mills hit a sac-

ager Bill, the last and only hope of the locals, was next. Carney hit one down to Brennan, but this time Jack managed to throw into the first baseman's mitt, and the game was over, with Edmonton winners of the first game of the first home series of 1910 by the above mentioned score.

POPULAR CALGARY PASTOR RESIGNS HIS CHARGE

Ill Health Has Compelled Rev. A. W. Coone to Take a Much Needed Rest

Rev. A. W. Coone, for three years pastor of Trinity Methodist church, East Calgary, on Wednesday night tendered his resignation because of ill health. He has just recovered from an attack of typhoid fever, which has reduced his weight 35 pounds. He will rest for two or three months, but what he will do after that he does not know yet.

An invitation has been extended to Rev. W. J. Haggart of Banff to accept the pastorate, which Mr. Coone will leave on July 1. Mr. Coone came here from Ontario, and has increased the membership of the church tenfold since he arrived. He was very active in religious work in the city, having been secretary of the Ministerial association, president of the Calgary Moral and Reform league, and president of the local branch of the Epworth league. He will be obliged to tender all these positions.

CALGARY PRESBYTERY TO SUPPORT HOME MISSIONS

The Presbyterians of the city are interested in the special home mission effort being made this week. A request has been made to have the services of Wednesday, donated to this cause and these offerings will be placed on the plates in the various churches next Sunday. The undertaking involves the support of all mission fields in this Presbytery, about twenty in number, costing about \$5,000 this year. Nearly half this amount has already been subscribed by ten friends of the cause, and it is expected the general membership of the six Presbytery churches in the city will make up the balance. Calgary receives much from the surrounding district, and in this way will give some of it back to a cause that stands for both piety and patriotism.

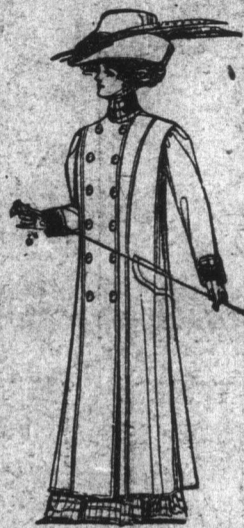

TOWN OF STRATHMORE IS GROWING RAPIDLY

Many Business Blocks and Private Dwellings Being Erected This Year

IMMIGRANTS ARE STILL COMING IN

Strathmore Will Have Lively Season of Athletic Sports of Different Kinds

Strathmore, May 11.—Strathmore is still growing. Most of the new stores commenced at the beginning of this year are now finished and occupied. A new store and bakery is at present being erected for Messrs Martin & Evans, and the cellar for the hotel extension, 420 feet long, is excavated and the foundations are being put in. The Canadian Bank of Commerce will commence the erection shortly of a handsome building on Second street, for its own use. Numerous dwelling houses are also springing up. As an idea of the phenomenal growth of the town it may be mentioned that in the last three months three new restaurants have been opened, and recently a new rooming house with accommodation for a large number of guests, was opened. The hotel and the new rooming house are filled to their utmost capacity nightly and the C. P. R. Irrigation Hall is also housing a large number of settlers. Activity at Demonstration Farm At the Demonstration Farm, this year, big improvements will take place, on which a total of \$20,000 will be spent. A new house is to be built for the superintendent, Professor Elliot, a club house built for the use of the workers on the farm, the cow-barn will be doubled in size, and a large sum will be spent on green houses. A visit to the farm is very instructive just now, when the crops are in the initial stage of development. Rye, alfalfa and wheat are showing green already, and the many young trees planted within the last three years have survived the winter all right. A patch of strawberries, planted last August, has come through the winter without damage, and should yield a good crop this year. Settlers Coming In There are still a good number of settlers coming in. Last Monday a party of 76 from England arrived, the majority of whom are taking up the 50-acre ready-made farms. A big amount is to be done this year in the way of road improvement, and \$2,500 is to be spent on this by the newly formed Local Improvement District Committee. New Churches to be Built The Presbyterians and Roman Catholics have decided to build churches in Strathmore at an early date, so that there will soon be four churches in the town. Mr. Rorrie, the New Presbyterian minister, is proving a very acceptable preacher, and is drawing congregations to every service. Athletic Sports The local sports associations are now organized. The Football Club has already done some practice, while the Baseball Club is only awaiting the completion of their new diamond before setting out. The Tennis Club are also getting their grounds into shape. The first baseball and football matches of the season will be with Glenora on Victoria Day, May 24. Calgary Man Starting Farming A Calgary wedding that excited much local interest was that of Mr. Eugene Sly, formerly of the Western Canada College, and Miss Ethel Vickery daughter of Mr. W. Vickery, 619 Fourth avenue west. Mr. Sly and his father-in-law are going into the farming business at Strathmore, and have already a handsome dwelling-house, with barn, garage, etc., erected. One of the recent arrivals here was Rev. Dr. Evans, a well known Church of England minister, who is intending to take up farming in Alberta, and is on the look out for a good section of land.

Four Calgary Lodges to Unite in Joint Emergency Communication

LODGE ROOMS WILL BE DRAPED IN BLACK

Grand Master J. T. Macdonald Sends Letter to all Masonic Lodges in Jurisdiction

In all the lodges under the jurisdiction of the Grand Lodge of Alberta, A. F. & M., a lodge of mourning in memory of the late King Edward VII, great grand master of the United Grand Lodge of England, will be held on Sunday, May 15, at 2 p. m.

The four Calgary Masonic lodges, Bow River, Perfection, Calgary and Ashlar, will hold a joint communication in the Masonic Temple, Alexander corner, at the hour mentioned. The following circular letter has been sent by Grand Master J. T. Macdonald to all the lodges under his jurisdiction:

"Brethren,—Inasmuch as our most illustrious Sovereign and beloved brother, King Edward the Seventh, by the grace of God, of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, and of the British Dominions beyond the Seas, the Defender of the Faith, Emperor of India, and to us Past Grand Master of the United Grand Lodge of England, Ancient Free and Accepted Masons, has been called by the Supreme Grand Master of the Universe to the inner chamber of the Temple, not made with hands, there to receive the reward of a life given to the welfare of humanity, and that ended in the humble, heroic statement, 'Well, it's all over, but I think I have done my duty,' and you, his Masonic Brethren, are ordered to hold a lodge of mourning.

"As Brother Masons we should mourn the loss of one who for long years stood in view of the world as a leader of the craft. As a fraternity we regret the loss to the Empire of one so well beloved by the world for his many qualities, able statesmanship, and broad sympathies. During a long life all his talents were devoted to the promotion of all that is expressed by the Tenets of Masonry: profession, Brotherhood, Love, Relief and Truth; for he was kindly and helpful to all who appealed to him, and in the broad scope of his majestic station he ever strove to foster and establish world-wide peace and prosperity.

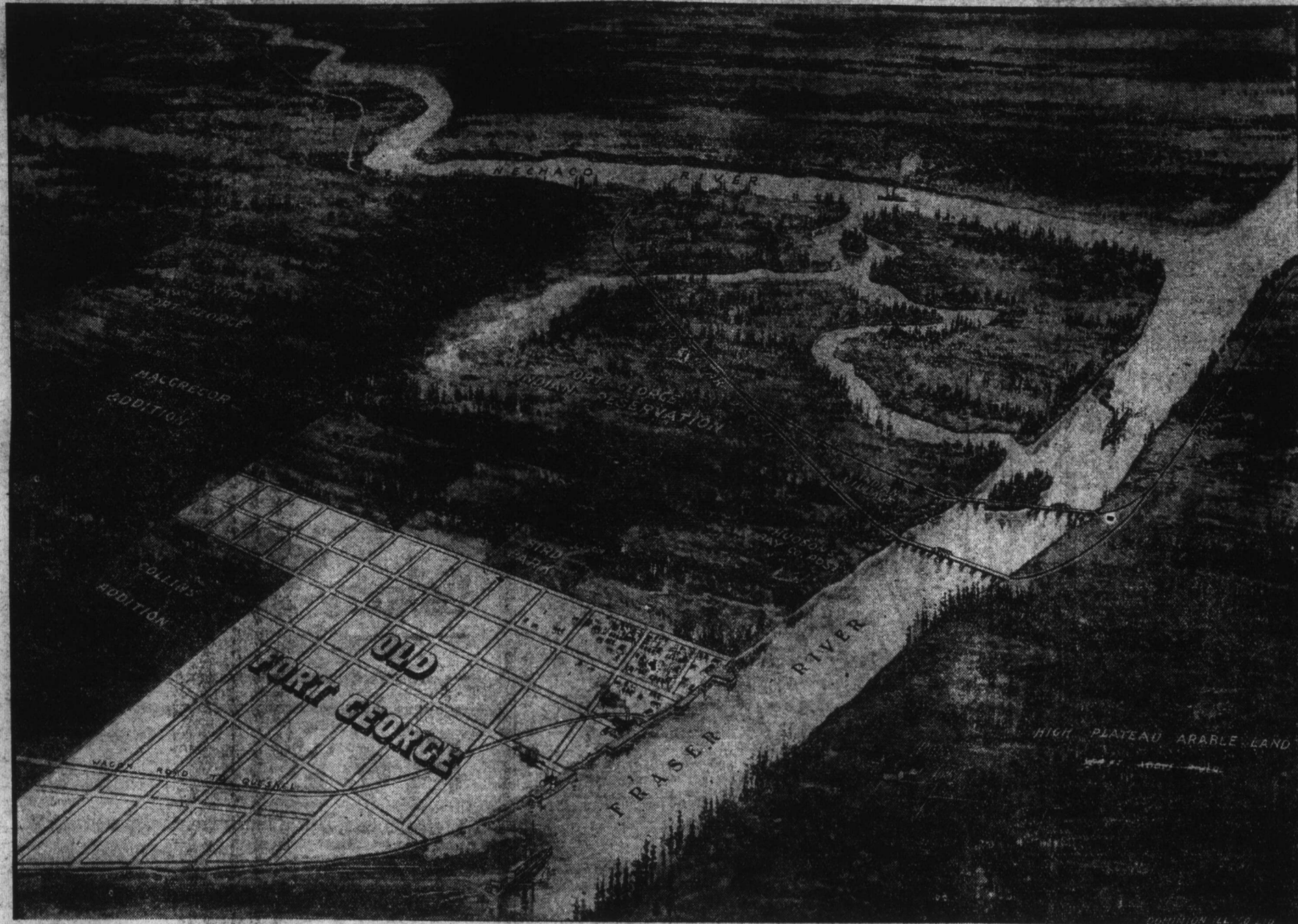

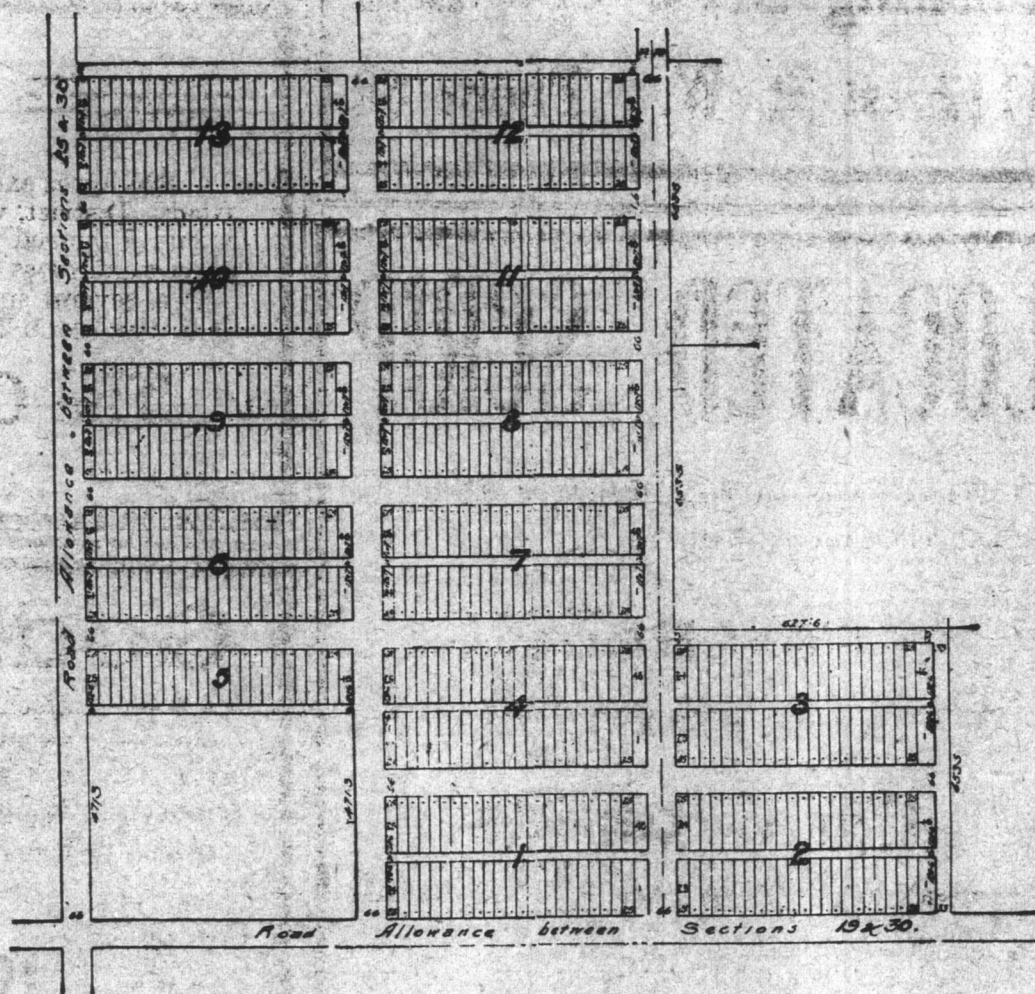
