





Still there is a fair amount of business doing, and there have been large buyers in town who are in the habit of looking for jobs, which a good many wholesalers are willing to clear out at a concession rather than carry over. With regard to the dry goods trade while the large departmental stores are busy there is more or less complaint among dealers of moderate calibre that sales are not so active as they would like to see them.
