

### ANOTHER CRISIS.

Venezuela Has Another Cabinet Trou ble on Hand.

Willemstadt, Island of Curacao, Oct. 31.—Advices received here from Caracas say that a cabinet cisis is expected there as a result of the wording of the answer of the President of Venezuela to the resolution adopted by the pan-Am-erican congress, expressing the hope that Venezuela and Colombia would reach an equitable agreement regarding their present difficulty. The reply was sent against the wishes of the Vene-zuelan cabinet.

Colon, Oct. 31.—The Venezuelan troops at Tachira have been ordered to withdraw, according to the latest advices received here from BZrranquilla, where the aggression of Venezuela is waning. The Colombian government, however, continues to strengthen its position at Bio Hacha. Four thousand troops guard the Colombian frontier and 1,510 troops have been sent to Antoquia.

## WAGONS FOR THE ARMY.

More Supplies Purchased in Canada By Imperial Authorities.

From Ottawa Citizen.

Apropos of the arrangement made with the war office for the supply of a million bushels of oats from Alberta for army use in South Africa, it is estimated that since the Boer war began Canada has furnished army supplies to the imperial forces to the value of over three million dollars. Besides hay and oats there have been purchased in Canada through the department of agriculture large quantities of canned beef and vegetables flour and other provisions. The militiu Eyes of British Capitalists Turn Toward Canada.

The militi-department also has been keenly alive to the commercial possibilities of the war and by dint of prompt cabling to the war office, has secured for Canadian manufacturers considerable orders for munitions. The orders for saddlery, harness, clothing, boots, and the like furnished both to the army in South Africa and the British forces in China aggregate about \$1,250,000 to date. Rezet:ly the militia department received an order for 50 transport wagons made on the pattern of a sample submitted to the British military authorities. The first shipment of 28 of these wagons has been shipped from Montreal. They were made by the Massey-Harris com-pany, which will forward the balance of the order shortly. Col. Pinault was pleased to learn from the war office that the Canadian-made articles were cou-sidered to be superior to the British-made wagons and as they are somewhat less costly he hopes for further orders before long.

Port Angeles, Wash., Oct. 31.-(Spe-cial)-The announcement made made at last night's city council meeting that the Port Angeles & Bastern railway scheme has been taken up by a syndi-cate of American capitalists with T. P. Oakes, James McNught, Charles T. Barney and Joseph J. Redding at the bead, to push work and develop the re-sources of the southern and western side of Puget Sound. The capital of \$4,000,000 is being furnished by United States and London men and the belief is

Port Townsend, Oct. 31.—The steam-ship Roanoke arrived today from Nome, bringing 600 passengers. The Roanoke is the last of the Nome passenger fleet. She reports all the shipping in the North practically at an end at Nune, St. Michael and Dutch Harbor. All of the smail fleet of vessels have been hauled out of the water and placed in winter quarters. The steamer Newport was in Dutch Harbor on the 24th, and was to sail that day for Puget Sound via Juneau. The revenue cutter Thetis-will be the last boat to sail from Dutch Harbor, and after her departure the North will be closed until spring. Chicago, Oct. 31.—The grand jury to-day voted an indictment against Dr. Orville Burnett, charging him with mu-der as an accessory before the fact. Dr. Burnett was with Mrs. Charlotte Nichol when the latter committed suicide at a hotel recently, alone fulfiling an agree-ment which, Burnett says, they made to die together rather than be separated.

DISASTERS TO SHIPPING.

Patient in Hospital Declined to Be Operated Upon. Reports of Wrecks and Missing Vessels: Coming from Newfoundland.

St. John's, Nfid., Oct. 31.—Three-schooners were driven ashore on the Labrador coast last yeek. One was laden with the families of fishermen re-turning from a summer sojourn on the coast. The women and children were rescued with great difficulty, the schooner being beached at Sandy Spit. In all three cases the crews were saved. Two other vessels, one carrying a Catholic priest who had been making a sacerdotal visitation, were driven sea-ward, and have been missing for 10 days.. The steamer Glencoe went in search for them but without result. Twelve lives are involved, and it is feared that all have perished. London, Ont., Oct. 31.—Ira Sherry, a farm laborer, died at Victoria hospital on Tuesday night because, it is said, he would not submit to an operation. The doctors believed he could have recover-ed had he submitted to the knife. He was argued with and every effort made to induce him to go upon the operating table. "No, I came into this world whole and I'm going out that way," was his final answer to the protests of the surgeons.


