



Mercury and Venus are now on the same side of the sun, and their apparent places on the celestial sphere are not far apart, as seen from the earth. If the corona, on this occasion, should exhibit a great wing or shaft of light, extending to-ward the two planets, especially if no other that the phenomenon had a real connection with the planets. If such a wing should be seen double, the axis of each portion pointing toward one of the planets, it would almost amount to a demonstration. The planets, however, will appear so close together, that even if two coronal wings in reality existed they would probably appear blended into one.
