





The rapid expansion of Canada commerce, in population and in agriculture now make it plain that instead of a struggling, poverty-stricken colony, we have on our northern from tier a vigorous, prosperous and ambi-tious young nation. Now that her expansion has got a good start, Canada ought to grow as rapidly as the Unit-ed States did at a corresponding period of its history. In 1800 the United States had 5,308,483 people, almost exactly the number Canada had by the census of 1901. By 1820 the population of the United States had infax and Yarmouth. creased to nearly 10,000,000. But in this age of railways the settlement of a country can go much more rapidly than a hundred years ago. Moreover,

Canada is bound on the south by nation of 80,000,000, whereas a hundred years ago all the immigrants i to the United States had to cross the ocean. But whether the population of Canada be 10,000,000 or 20,000,000 twenty years hence, the increase will be so great that in view of the proximity of the country, our con political relations with it are likely to be more important than with any other country.
