The official proclamation calling upon the whole Order to observe the day will appear in the next FORESTER. Meantime this early intimation is given to the Courts so that they may have everything ready for the 22nd June next.

Spread of the Order.

We learn that the Supreme Chief Ranger has made complete arrangements for the vigorous prosecution of the work of the Order in the new States of Washington and Oregon, as well as in British Columbia, Deputies are already at work in these jurisdictions, and the members may look for the planting of new Courts all along the Pacific Coast until there shall be a Court in every available locality thereof.

The Canada Life.

The reports and proceedings of the last annual meeting of that most excellent Insurance Company the Canada Life, have just been published in the public press. They afford considerable food for reflection and furnish most unanswerable arguments in favor of the I. O. F. system. It will be remembered how the Monetary Times and other like publications have time and again declared that with the I. O. F. and kindred fraternal Orders it was a question of a few years only-9 or 10 years—when the rates collected would prove

These figures as given to us by the Presi-

"The fall in the rate of interest in Canada during the past few years, to which I have already alluded, and the possibility of some further reduction, have given us a good deal of consideration, the result of which is to lead us upon the present occasion to lay aside out of the present profits a special reserve of \$250,000 as a preparation for such a change of our busis of interest as to 4 per cent., should that, at a future time, become expedient."

! Of course if in the years to come "should that, at a future time, not become expedient," the Company will restore the policy holders' share of the \$250.000 now taken. Perhaps!

THE LECTURE.

The lecturer in the course of his remarks reviewed the history of the craft from its inception in England in 1745 to the foundation of the present organization at Ottawa in July, 1881. He pointed out the many advantages to be gained by membership of the Order, the principal being free medical attendance in case of illness, sick benefit, provision for funeral expenses of deceased members, a system of insurance at an almost nominal cost and a total and permanent disability benefit. In 1881, at the time of the reorganization of the present body as the Independent Order of Foresters, the number of members was 396, and liabilities amounting to \$4,000. On Feb. 1st of the present year, the members of the Order numbered 17,969 with a balance of over \$190,000 to credit. The lecturer spoke for an hour without any assistance from notes, and was listened to with rapt attention. The Mayor proposed a cordial vote of thanks to the iecturer and pointed out the advantage of such lectures as that which the audience had just heard.

Mr. James Reilly seconded the resolution, which was put to the meeting by the chairman, Dr. Lindsay, and carried unanimously. Dr. Oronhyatekha having replied, the proceedings terminated.

No thoughtful or educated person needs to be told what are the qualities of the mass of American newspapers, with the creditable exceptions already referred to; whether they are high or low in intellectual ability and tone, in what language they are usually expressed, whether they seek to enlighten and guide public opinion, or to follow its worst aberrations and cater to its lowest instincts; whether they attempt to discuss with fairness and candor the merits of controverted questions, or whether they depend upon misrepresentation of facts, upon cheap gibes, and appeals to the meanest prejudices; whether or not they observe the truth, respect private character and the decencies of of life; whether, in short, they serve, so far 10 07 as they go, to instruct, to improve, to elevate their readers, or only to delude and debase them, are inquiries that thoughtful men can answer from their own observation. can be generally answered favorably, so much the better for the newspapers, and so much the worse for those who venture to question their character and their influence.

One thing, at least, must be generally admitted—the newspapers have put an end to all human privacy. There is no man so obscure, so unassuming, so utterly withdrawn from the public eye and from all challenge of popular attention, who has the right to a concealment of any act or fact or word or thought of his own private life, if it will make an item, or, especially, if it be one from which, by any misrepresentation or gloss, a sensational story can be made and sold. The Three Greatest Poets.

Dante, Shakespeare and Goethe are the greatest poets of the Christian era; as Job, Homer and Virgil were the greatest of the That we are fortunate in the possession era before Christ. They rise like pyramids

· But with this common characteristic they differ as widely as the nations and ages to which they belong, and as the languages in which they wrote. They are intensely human little, and that little is uncertain and disputand yet intensely national. Dante could only have arisen in Italy and in the thirteenth century, Shakespeare only in England and in the sixteenth century, Goethe only in Germany and in the eighteenth century. Dante is the poet of the Middle Ages and of Catholicism; Shakespeare is the poet of the Reformation; Goethe is the poet of modern cosmopolitan culture.

It is difficult to say who is the greatest and the most universal of the three. Shakespeare is an unexplained literary miracle as to creative fertility of genius and intuitive knowledge of human nature, English, old Roman, Italian, French, Scandinavian, Christian, Jewish, heathen, noble and wicked, angelic and Satanic. Goethe presents a greater variety of poetic and literary composition, and excels equally in drama, epos and song, in narrative prose and critical judgment. Dante in one respect is the most exalted and sublime of the three, as he follows men into the eternal world of bliss and woe. Goethe does the same in his "Faust," who in the First Part goes down to perdition for his sins, but in the Second Part we find h m in heaven without passing through the purgatory of repentance, and without faith in The angels who carry the immortal part of Faust greet him as one who is saved by a process of self-purification This is the moral defect in that great tragedy. Dante was a Catholic believer, and peoples his Paradise with spotless saints. Shakespeare professes no religion, and is hid behind his character; but he reverently bowed before Him.

" Whose blessed feet were nail'd For our advantage on the bitter cross."

There is no finer and more truly Christian description of mercy than that given by Shakespeare in the "Merchant of Venice" (Act IV., Scene 1):

"The quality of mercy is not strain'd It droppeth as the gentle rain from heaven Upon the place beneath. It is twice bless'd It blesseth him that gives and him that takes. 'Tis mightiest in the mightiest; it becomes The throned monarch better than his crown His sceptre shows the force of temporal power, The attribute to awe and majesty, Wherein doth sit the fear and dread of kings. But mercy is above this sceptred sway: It is enthroned in the hearts of kings, It is an attribute to God himself;

An earthly power doth then show likest God's When mercy seasons justice."

House Drains.

House drains as a source of ground contamination are pronounced by Professor John McMullen to be even more dangerous than the common sewers, since they are so frequently located immediately under the house, where the results of any defects are more directly manifested. By unskilful construction, or by subsequent careless usage or want of repair, the filth is effused into the basement or cellar, and impregnates the soil under the house. In country districts isolated outbreaks of diphtheria, traceable to cesspool effluvia, are not at all uncommon. In these cases it is generally found that there is a water closet in the house, where there is little or no provision for any change of air, that the soil pipe is never ventilated, and that the closet drain discharges into a cesspool, which is completely covered up and only cleaned at rare intervals. The consequence is that any gases generated in the cesspool have no outlet, except through the water closet into the house, and hence result attacks of diphtheria, ulcerated sore throat and other ailments. From an inquiry instituted by the State Board of Health of Massachusetts respecting the predisposing causes of diphtheria, its prevalence, etc., it is shown that this disease has been most severe in the rural districts where there are no sewers, and where the drainage is bad.


