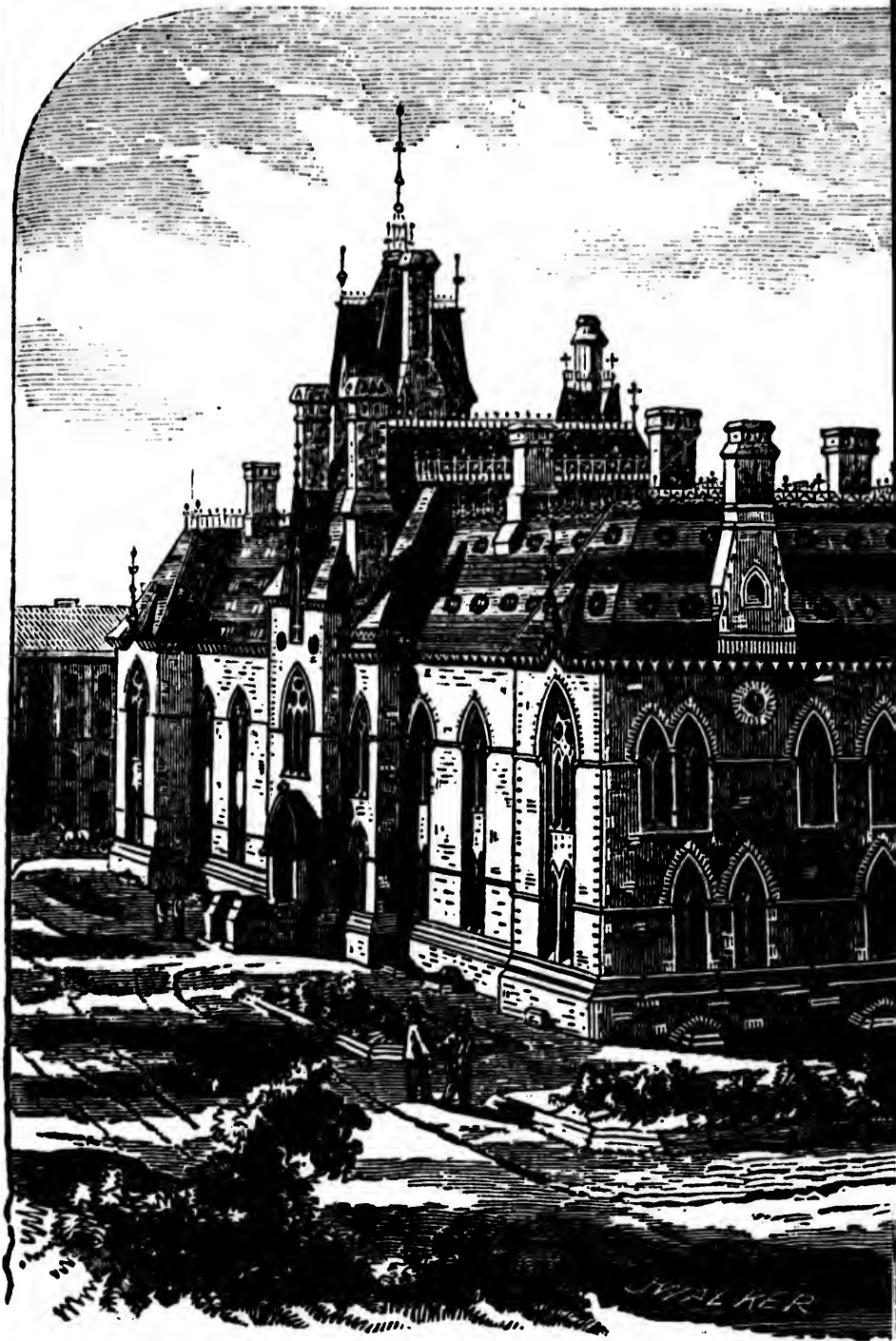

THE PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS AT OTTAWA.

These splendid Buildings in process of completion, and which will be occupied for Legislative purposes on the next meeting of Parliament, stand upon a lofty plateau of some twenty-nine acres in area—formerly known as Barrack Hill. The Buildings are widely detached, and form three sides of a quadrangular figure; the main or Parliament Building facing Wellington street and Centre Town to the southward; the Departmental Buildings facing inwards to the square, and forming the other two sides of the figure. The costliness and splendour of the buildings themselves, their fine commanding site, together with the beauty of the surrounding scenery, place them in a very enviable position—compared with all other structures used for similar purposes on this continent—and must ever make them objects of interest to the stranger and the tourist.

The style of the buildings is the Gothic of the 12th and 13th centuries, with some modifications to suit the Canadian climate. The dressings round the windows, and the ornamental work, are of Ohio Sandstone. The plain surfaces are faced with a cream-coloured sandstone of the Potsdam formation, obtained at Nappean, distant twelve miles from Ottawa. The spandrels of the arches, and the spaces which occur between window-arches and the sills of the upper windows, are filled up with a quaint description of stonework, composed of stones of irregular size, shape and colour, very neatly set together. These, with the Potsdam red sandstone employed in forming the arches over the

windows, afford a pleasant variety of colour and effect, and contrasting with the general masses of light coloured sandstone, of which the body of the work is composed.

The Parliament Building, as you approach it from Wellington street, presents a very imposing appearance. The central of the seven towers, which is very rich in design, projects its width from the front of the building. Its height, when completed, will be 180 feet. The body of the building in front is about forty feet high, above which rises the slanting roofs of slate, surmounted by lines of ornamental iron cresting. The length of the building is $471\frac{1}{2}$ feet, and its depth from the front of the main tower to the rear of the library is 570 feet, covering an area of 82,886 superficial feet, or about three and seven-tenths acres. It stands at a distance of about 600 feet from the street, so that the quadrangle formed on three sides by the buildings and on the fourth by Wellington street, is 700 feet from east to west, and 600 feet from north to south; thus affording a very spacious square. The ground upon which the buildings stand varies somewhat in elevation, that portion forming the site of the Parliament Building being the highest. The basement floor of the buildings is assumed to be 159 feet above the ordinary summer level of the river, while that of the eastern and western blocks is 185 and 142 feet respectively. The increased elevation, however, improves the general effect, and when the proposed carriage way to the Parliament Building is finished, and the intermediate space formed into terraces, each kept somewhat lower than the ground lines of the different buildings, the effect will be very fine.

The main entrance is through the principal tower, the spacious arches of which admit of carriage way under them. The piers which support the tower are ornamented with pillars of polished Annapriot marble. Passing through it we enter a large hall, paved with tiles, and also surrounded with marble pillars. Ascending and moving towards the left, we come to the Chamber of the Legislative Assembly. The room measures eighty by forty-five feet, the ceiling being upwards

of sixty feet high, and formed of fine open work; the skylights being above this intermediate ceiling. The windows at the sides are of stained glass. The room is surrounded by large piers of a light greyish marble from Portage du Fort, surmounted just above the galleries by clusters of small pillars of the dark Arnprior marble; the arches supported by these pillars being again of the light coloured marble. The galleries are calculated to accommodate 1,000 persons. The Reporters' gallery extends in rear of and over the Speaker's Chair.

At the other side of the building, to the left of the main entrance, is the Legislative Council Chamber, a *fac simile* of that of the Legislative Assembly. Along the passages are innumerable committee and clerks' rooms, reading and smoking rooms, and a very fine apartment for a saloon or dining-hall.

The library plan, which is situated to the rear of the buildings, is on a polygon of sixteen sides, and is 90 feet in diameter. Outside of the main room is an aisle of one story high, in which are formed a series of small retiring rooms, where persons desiring an hour or two of uninterrupted study can secure it. A corridor connects the library with the main building; this will be used as a picture gallery.

From this side of the building, the north front, we look upon some very extensive and beautiful scenery, and over a long reach of the Ottawa river, which flows round the foot of the cliff, 162 feet below.

The Eastern block of the Departmental Buildings is a very irregular and picturesque pile. It is 245 feet on the west front or that which faces the square, and 319 feet on the south front or that which faces Wellington street, and covers an area of 41,840 superficial feet. In this building are situated the Governor General's office, the Executive Council room, the President of the Council, the Attorneys and Solicitors General East and West, the Minister of Finance and Audit office, the Bureau of Agriculture, Patents and Statistics, the Provincial Secretary and Provincial Registrar. In this building also, is a large model room connected with the Patent Department. From the Eastern

front of these buildings, extensive views are also obtained, embracing the lower part of the city and the country stretching beyond. Nearer is a plateau, somewhat similar to that upon which the buildings stand, and known as the Major's Hill, and in a deep hollow between and immediately under the walls, is the long chain of locks of the Rideau canal, spanned a little higher up by the Sapper's bridge, which connects the lower with the upper portions of the city.

The Western block of the Departmental Buildings is similar in style to that just described, but more regular in its construction and not quite so large, being 220 feet long on the East front or that which looks over the square, and 277 feet on the South front or that which faces Wellington street. It is somewhat less imposing as to its main entrance, a circumstance which is probably accounted for by the fact of the Governor General's room and the Executive Council Chamber being in the Eastern block. In it are located the Crown Lands Department, the Board of Works, the Post Office Department, and the Adjutant General's Office and Militia Department. The West front of these buildings looks upon the Upper Town and beyond it towards the Chaudiere Falls, and Hull, and gives a fine view of the wooded shore on that side of the river and the distant range of hills beyond, including an extensive view of the river and its banks, stretching to the southwest in the direction of Aylmer. Similar or still more extensive views are obtained from the west front or end of the Parliament Building.

The ceilings of the passages and of many of the rooms of the Parliament Building are constructed of pine wood, varnished, which being wrought into ornamental cornices and panels produce a rich and very fine effect. The doors of the rooms are of the same material. The fittings around the grates and the mantle-pieces are of polished Arnprior marble; it is a greyish blue marble of very fine grain, and capable of being polished to a high surface. All the floors are supported by rolled iron girders, and filled in between with cement, rendering them fire-proof. The stairs in the building are all built of blue Ohio stone, and constructed with hanging steps.

The system for heating and ventilation appears to be very perfect. Immediately under the great central court of the Parliament Building is the boiler room, in which are six Cornish boilers, each twenty feet long and five feet in diameter, furnished with a steam drum, safety-valve, &c., and a steam engine of sufficient horse-power to work the pumps and throw 250 gallons of water per minute into tanks placed in the towers, from whence water is supplied to all parts of the buildings. The heating is effected by steam conveyed in pipes from these boilers to the Legislative Council rooms, the Library, and the room immediately adjoining, on what is called the vault system; that is, a duct of sufficient area for the introduction of an abundant supply of fresh air, is situated immediately under a vault in which steam pipes are placed to warm the air on its entering the vault from the duct, through a perforated floor, and before it passes into the rooms proposed to be heated. These ducts enter at all sides of the building, and range in size according to the position in which they are placed. Of the ducts, there are 3,600 lineal feet, generally 2 feet 4 inches high, with sides built of dressed stone and formed with a slight descent where they pass out of the building. The other parts of the building are heated on what is called the coil system, or by direct radiation. For the rooms heated by this system there are 4,308 feet of hot air flues, 24 by 19 inches sectional area, formed in the wall adjoining the committee rooms and other parts of the building thus heated, exclusive of ninety feet of others of greater dimensions for the larger steam pipes.

The Architects of the Parliament Buildings are Messrs. Fuller & Jones; and of the Departmental Buildings, Messrs. Stent & Laver. The Contractor for the stonework of the Parliament Building is Mr. Thomas McGreevy, and those for the Departmental Buildings, Messrs. Jones, Haycock & Co. The system for heating and ventilating has been successfully carried out by Mr. Charles Garth.

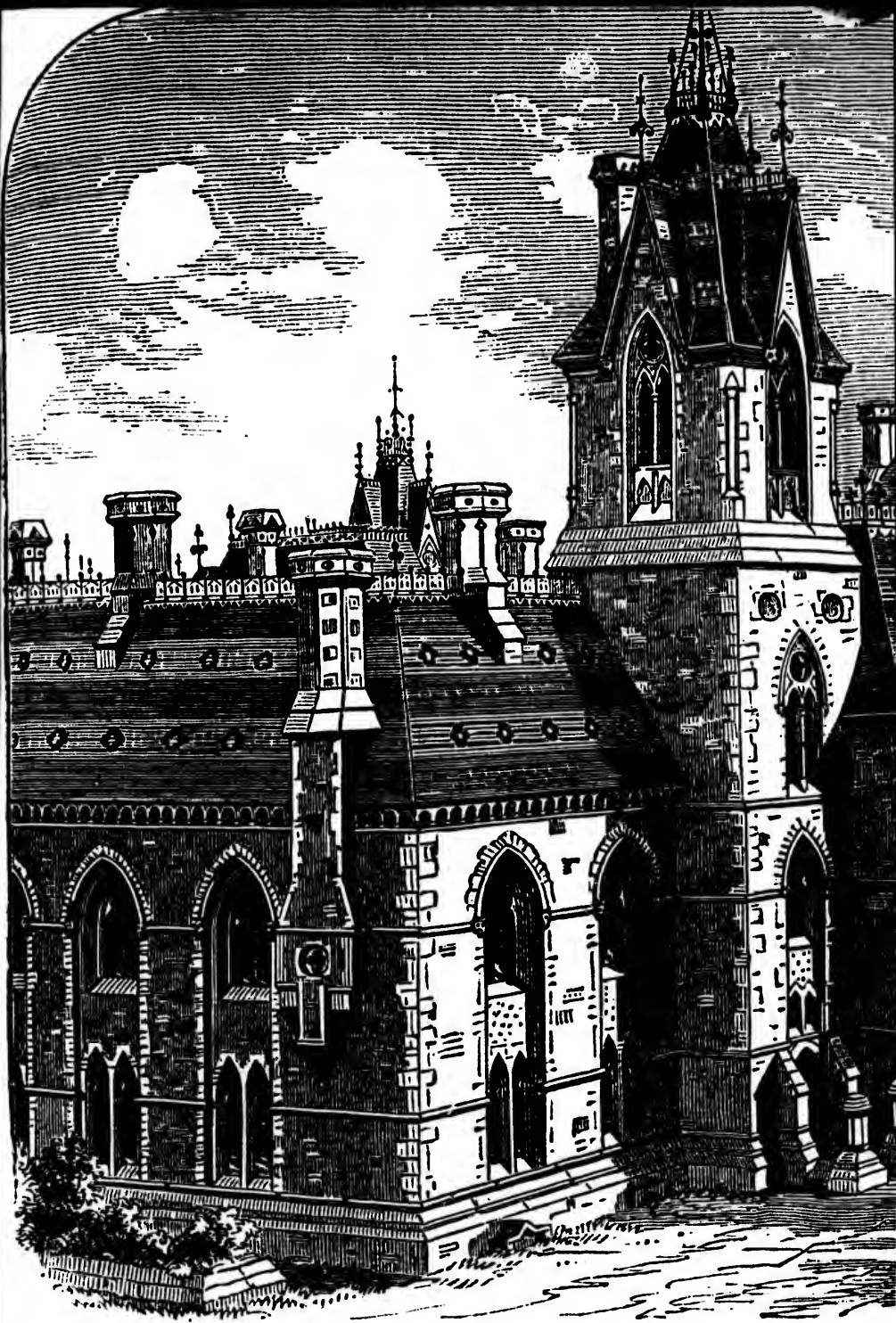
It would be impossible to give a perfect idea of these splendid buildings within the limits of a mere pen and ink sketch; we

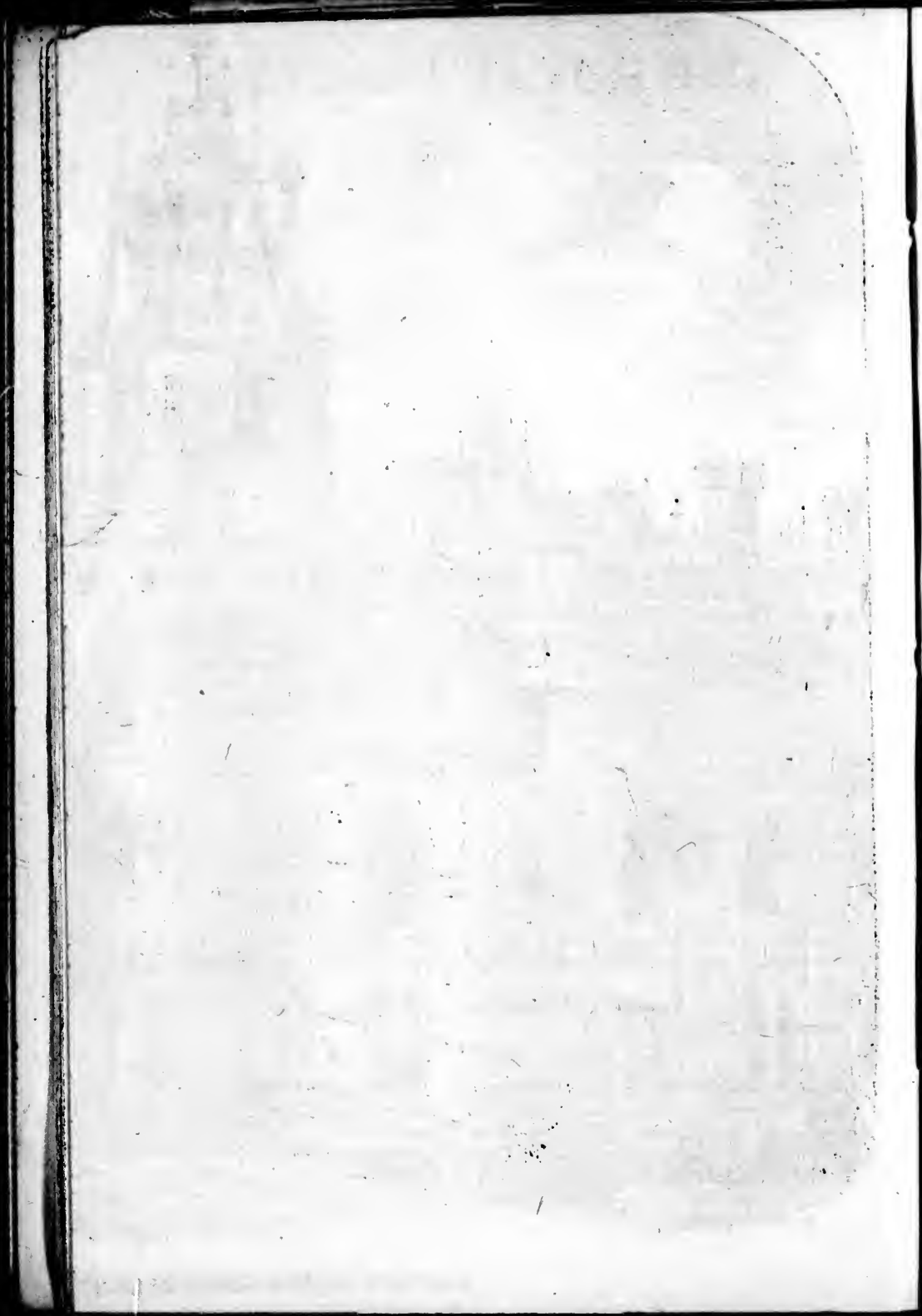

ECLIPSES.

I.—On the 16th of March, there will be a partial Eclipse of the Sun. It will not be visible on this Continent.

II.—On the evening of 30th March and morning of the 31st, there will be a total Eclipse of the Moon. This Eclipse will be visible throughout this country. At Quebec, it begins on the evening of the 30th at 9.52, and will be total at 10.59. The totality ceases on the morning of the 31st, 38 minutes past midnight, and the Eclipse ends at 1.44. At Toronto, the Eclipse begins at 9.20 of the 30th; is total there at 10.27, and ends at 12 minutes past 1.

III.—On the 15th of April, there will be a partial Eclipse of the Sun. Not visible in Canada.

IV.—On the 24th of September, there will be a total Eclipse of the Moon. Not visible in Canada.

V.—On the 8th of October, there will be a partial Eclipse of the Sun; but very small, not 1 digit in size. At Montreal, it begins at 11.9 in the morning, and ends at 25 minutes after noon.

PLANETS.

Until 25th of February, Venus will be morning star; then until 11th of December evening star. It will be brightest on the 5th of November. Until 8th of October, Mars will be morning star; then evening star the remainder of the year. Until April 21st, Jupiter will be morning star; then evening star the rest of the year. Until January 31st, Saturn will be morning star; then evening star until November 7th. Mercury will be exceedingly brilliant before Sunrise, about the middle of January and May, in the beginning of September and at the end of December.

Letter-Rates.—Letters posted in Canada, addressed to any place within the Province, pass, if prepaid, for 5 cents per half-ounce, but if posted unpaid, are charged 7 cents per half-ounce.

On letters to Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward's Island, the rate is 5 cents per half ounce, with optional prepayment.

The rate on letters to the United Kingdom will be—

By Canadian Packet.....12½ cents per half-ounce.

By Cunard Packet.....17 cents per half-ounce.

If a letter exceed 1 ounce in weight, it will be liable to *four* rates, as, after the first ounce, fractions are not recognised, the rate progressing by the ounce.

Letters for the United Kingdom must be prepaid, or they will be charged a fine of 6d. sterling in addition to the deficient postage on delivery in England.

The British Post Office forwards letters to Canada by the first packet sailing after the letter is posted, unless the letters bear a special direction,—“By Canadian Packet,” or “By British Packet,”—and in that case, they are kept over for the packet designated. “By Canadian Mail” is not a distinctive superscription; for any mail for Canada is a “Canadian Mail,” by whatever packet forwarded.

Letters for British Colonies and Possessions, beyond sea, and for Foreign Countries, *via* England, must be prepaid.

The rate on letters for the United States, 10 cts. per half-ounce.

The rate on letters for British Columbia, 10 cts., to be prepaid, —there is a further charge on delivery.

The rate on letters for Red River 10 cts. per half-ounce, which must be *pre-paid*.

The rate on letters for the following destinations, per Canadian Ocean Steamers, is 23 cents per half-ounce, and must be prepaid:—

Africa (West Coast of); Australia (including all the Colonies embraced in this general name): Ceylon, Egypt, Gibraltar, Gold Coast, India, Liberia, Malta, Mauritius, Monte Video, New Zealand, Sierra Leone, Spain, Tasmania, West Indies (British). The rate to Buenos Ayres, is 35 cents the half-ounce.

The postage upon letters for the following places has recently been increased to 35 cents per half-ounce, viz.:—Cape of Good Hope, Ascension, St. Helena, Natal, Surinam, Hayti.

The rate to Belgium, 19 cents the half-ounce.

The rate to Holland, 17 cents the half-ounce.

For the principal German States, the rate is 23 cents per half-ounce.

For France and Algeria, 17 cents per quarter-ounce.

On letters to the above destinations, forwarded by the Cunard line of steamers, an additional charge of 5 cents per half-ounce becomes necessary.

Registration Charges.—For the registration of a letter addressed to any place in British North America, the charge is 2 cents.

For the registration of a letter to the United Kingdom, 12½c.

For the registration of a letter to the United States, 5c.

France, and other countries for which letters pass through France, an amount equal to the postage.

No letter can be forwarded as registered unless postage and registration fee are both prepaid.

Miscellaneous Charges.—The charge on parcels, by Parcel Post, to any place in Canada, is 25 cents per pound, [with 5 cents additional, if registered]. No parcel must exceed three pounds in weight.

One cent per ounce, payable in advance by postage stamp, is the rate on printed circulars, prices-current, hand-bills, and other printed matter of a like character; and on books, bound or unbound, when posted at a Canadian Post Office, addressed to any place in Canada, British North America generally, or the United States.

The charges upon prices-current, when addressed to the United Kingdom, is 2 cents each, and must be prepaid by postage stamp.

Postage Rates on certain Miscellaneous Matter passing within the Province of Canada, or to and from the United States:—

1.—Packages of seeds, cuttings, bulbs, roots, and scions, or grafts, may be posted in Canada for delivery within the Province, or to an address within the United States, on prepayment by postage stamp of a rate of one cent per ounce; and when received from the United States, addressed to any place in Canada, such packages may be delivered on payment, by the person addressed, of a like rate.

2.—The limit of weight for such packages will be one pound. No communication, whether written or printed, must be enclosed in them; and they must be so put up as to be easy of examination, for the purpose of verifying the alleged contents. If put up in bags, the bags must be simply tied at the neck, so as to admit of inspection; and, in the case of such packages mailed in Canada, the nature of the contents, such as "*Seeds*," "*Roots*," &c., as the case may be, must be marked on the package by the sender, as a statement of the claim to pass at the reduced rate hereby made applicable to such matter.

3.—Book manuscript, and printers' proof-sheets (whether corrected or not), maps, prints, drawings, engravings, photographs (when not on glass or in cases containing glass), and sheet music (whether printed or written), may pass in covers open at the ends or sides, and provided that no letter, or other communication intended to serve the purpose of a letter, be enclosed therein, on prepayment, when posted in Canada, by postage stamp of the ordinary printed-matter rate of one cent per ounce; or upon payment of that rate on delivery on such matter when received in the mails from the United States.

Transmission of Books, Patterns of Merchandise, and Samples, between Canada and the United Kingdom:—

4.—On and from the 1st January next, patterns of merchandise, and samples, may be forwarded between Canada and the United Kingdom, by the Canadian Packet Mails, at book-post rates, and subject to the following conditions :—

A—The patterns or samples must not be of any intrinsic value ; and this rule excludes all articles of a saleable nature, and whatever may have a value of its own, apart from its mere use as a pattern ; nor must the quantity of any material or article sent as a pattern or sample be so great that it could have on this ground an intrinsic value.

B—The patterns, &c., must be sent in covers, open at the ends, so as to be easy of examination. Samples, however, of seeds, drugs, and such like, which cannot be sent in open covers, may be enclosed in bags of linen or other material simply tied at the neck ; but bags closed against inspection, although transparent, must not be used for the purpose.

C—There must be no writing or printing other than the address of the person for whom the packet is intended, the manufacturer's or trade mark and number, and price of the article.

D—Any infringement of the above regulations will render the packet liable to be treated and charged as a letter.

E—The rule which forbids the transmission through the Post of any article likely to injure the contents of the mail-bags, will apply to patterns and samples ; and any package transgressing this rule is to be sent to the Postmaster General.

5.—The book-post rate between Canada and the United Kingdom remains unaltered, at 7 cents for a packet weighing not more than 4 ounces.

For a packet exceeding 4 oz., and not exceeding $\frac{1}{2}$ lb. . . . 12½c.

Ditto $\frac{1}{2}$ lb., do 1 lb. . . . 25c.

Ditto 1 lb., do 1½ lb. . . . 37½c.

And so on, adding 12½ cents for each additional half-pound, or fraction of half-pound weight. These charges must be prepaid.

6.—No prints or printed matter will be allowed to pass by book post between the United Kingdom and Canada, unless printed on paper, parchment or vellum.

Book packets addressed to the United Kingdom can be registered on payment of the ordinary registration fee (12½ cents) in addition to the postage.

Book Post with France.—For a packet of printed matter, or single newspaper, book, &c., not over 2 ounces 4 cents.

Ditto, exceeding 2 ounces, and not over 4 ounces 8 "

Ditto, do 4 ounces, do 8 ounces 17 "

Ditto, do 8 ounces, do 16 ounces 34 "

And so on ; increasing 17 cents for every additional half-pound.

The Book-post Regulations between Canada and England apply to matter between Canada and France.

Newspapers and Periodicals.—Newspapers published in Canada may be sent by post from the office of publication, addressed to any place in Canada, at the following rates, *if paid quarterly in advance*, by either the publisher at the post office where the papers are posted, or by the subscriber at the delivering post office:—

For a paper published 6 times a week. . . 2s. per qr., or 40 cents.

Do do 3 times a week. . . 1s. do or 20 “

Do do 2 times a week. . . 8d. do or 13 “

Do do 1 time a week. . . 4d. do or 6½ “

When the above rates are not paid in advance, by either publisher or subscriber, such papers are charged one cent each on delivery.

Transient Newspapers.—Transient newspapers, that is to say, Canadian Newspapers, posted otherwise than from the office of publication, and American or British papers posted or reposted in Canada, must be prepaid one cent each, by postage stamp, or they cannot be forwarded; except only *British newspapers* distributed to regular subscribers by Canadian booksellers and news-agents, such papers pass free, as they would do if received in the Canadian Packet Mail.

Newspapers by Mail from England or United States.—Newspapers received from England by the Canadian Packet Mails are delivered free.

Newspapers from England by the Cunard Packet, are charged 2 cents each on delivery. [This is the American transit charge].

United States newspapers, brought by mail into Canada, are charged 1 cent each on delivery.

Periodicals passing by Mail in Canada:—

1.—The rate on all periodicals, other than newspapers, passing by mail in Canada save such as may be addressed to or received from the United Kingdom, and such as are exempted from postage by statute, will henceforth be one cent per 4 ounces weight of package containing periodical matter, whether the package contain one or more numbers.

2.—Any fraction of 4 ounces to be charged as a full rate.

3.—On periodicals posted from the office of publication, or by news-agents or booksellers, to regular subscribers *within the Province*, this rate may remain to be collected on delivery, and must in such cases be marked upon the packages and charged in the letter-bills; but when mailed to go out of the Province, such periodical matter must be prepaid by postage stamp. British and United States periodicals may be posted in Canada by news-agents and booksellers to regular subscribers in the Province under this regulation.

4.—Transient periodical matter posted in Canada must in all cases be prepaid by postage stamp.

5.—The above rate will be payable *on delivery* on all periodi-

cal matter received from the United States, except that Canadian editors may receive exchange periodicals from the United States free of Canadian postage.

Canadian Periodicals, posted for United Kingdom by Canadian Packets :—

6.—Periodicals, printed and published in Canada, may be posted, addressed to any place in the United Kingdom *by Canadian Packet*, on prepayment by postage stamp of 2 cents each number.

7.—This rate will be applicable to all classes of Canadian periodicals posted as above for the United Kingdom, the exemption to which certain classes of Canadian periodicals are entitled, extending to such numbers only as are addressed from the office of publication within the Province.

Postage Stamps.—Postage Stamps, of the respective values of 1 cent for newspapers; 2 cents for prices-current for the United Kingdom; 5 cents for ordinary Provincial letters; 10 cents for United States rate; 12½ cents for Canadian Packet; and 17 cents for Cunard packet,—are provided for sale to the public.

Letter Envelopes, impressed with Medallion Stamp, and equivalent to the prepayment of postage, to the amount of 5 and 10 cents respectively, are furnished for sale to the public at the following rates :—

The 5-cent Envelope, at \$5.50 per 100, or 66 cents per dozen.

The 10-cent Envelope, at \$10.50 per 100, or \$1.26 per dozen.

Penal Clause.—The Act contains the following penal clause :—
To inclose a letter, or letters, or any writing intended to serve the purpose of a letter, in a parcel posted for the parcel post, shall be a misdemeanor.

To inclose a letter, or any writing, or make any written marks to serve the purpose of a letter, or to enclose any other thing in a newspaper, posted to pass as a newspaper, at the rate of postage applicable to newspapers (except in the case of accounts and receipts of newspaper publishers, which are permitted to pass folded within the newspapers sent by them to their subscribers), shall be a misdemeanor.

MONEY ORDERS.

Money Orders on Canada.—All the Money-Order Post Offices in Canada are authorized to draw Money Orders on each other for any sum up to \$100, and for as many Orders of \$100 each the applicant may require, upon the following terms, viz. :—

On Orders up to \$10.....	5 cents.
On Orders over \$10, and up to \$20.....	10 “
On Orders over \$20, and up to \$40.....	20 “
On Orders over \$40, and up to \$60.....	30 “
On Orders over \$60, and up to \$80.....	40 “
On Orders over \$80, and up to \$100.....	50 “

Money Orders on the United Kingdom.—The Canadian Money Order Offices also draw upon all the Money Order Offices in England, Ireland, and Scotland, and the Channel Islands, for any sum up to £10 sterling; and grant as many Orders for £10 sterling each, as may be needed to make up the amount to be remitted. The terms are as under:—

On Orders up to £2..... 25 cents.

On Orders over £2, and up to £5..... 50 “

On Orders over £5, and up to £7..... 75 “

On Orders over £7, and up to £10..... \$1.00

Money Orders on the Lower Provinces.—The Canadian Money Order Offices draw also upon all Money Order Offices in Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland. The Orders, like those of the United Kingdom, are made payable in Sterling money, and for sums up to £10 sterling. The terms are:—

For Orders up to £5..... 25 cents.

For Orders over £5, and up to £10..... 50 “

The Money Order Post Offices are furnished with lists of all the Money Order Offices in Canada, the United Kingdom, Nova Scotia, Prince Edward Island, and Newfoundland; and the postmasters are instructed to afford every information in their power, in respect of the places upon which they draw, together with any other information relating to such issues as the intending remitters may desire.

The following articles are also permitted to be entered FREE, in certain circumstances or conditions, viz. :—

Agricultural Societies' seeds of all kinds, farming utensils and implements of husbandry, when especially imported by, for the encouragement of agriculture.

Apparel, Wearing and other personal effects, and implements of husbandry (not merchandise) in actual use of persons coming to settle in the Province, and accompanying the owner.

Arms for the Army and Navy and Indian Nations, provided the duty otherwise payable thereon would be paid or borne by the Treasury of the United Kingdom or of the Provinces.

Books, Maps, and Charts, imported not as merchandise, but as the personal effects of persons arriving in Canada to become *bona fide* residents of the Province.

Clothing for Army or Navy, or Indian Nations, or for gratuitous distribution by any charitable society.

Houshold Furniture and Effects, that have been in actual use for one month or more, of persons coming to settle in this Province, and in charge of the owner.

Household Effects, Personal, not merchandise, of subjects of Her Majesty, domiciled in Canada, but dying abroad.

Machinery, Models and Patterns of, provided the same be not put to actual use.

Military Clothing, for Her Majesty's troops or Militia.

Military Stores, and Material for Military Clothing, imported for the use of the Provincial Militia, under such restrictions as may be passed by the Governor in Council.

Packages containing *free goods*, in which they are usually imported.

Packages; viz. : bales, trusses; cases covering casks of wine or brandy, in wood, cases and casks, containing dry goods, hardware, and cutlery; crates or casks containing glassware or earthenware; cases, containing bottled wine or spirits; and

other packages, in which goods of the kind imported in them are usually imported, and which do not necessarily or generally accompany such goods when sold in the Province.

Packages, of all other kinds, to pay same *ad valorem* duty as the goods they contain, unless the duty exceeds 30 per cent; in which case, the duty on the packages to be 30 per cent.

Packages containing specific goods, 20 per cent. *ad valorem*.

Tools and Implements of Trade of handicraftsmen arriving in Canada, when accompanied into the Province by the actual settler, and brought in by such settler for his own use, and not for sale; machinery excepted.

In addition to the *ad valorem* duty of Customs payable thereon, there shall be imposed, levied and collected, on the several descriptions of manufactured Tobacco hereinafter mentioned, the specific duties of Customs following, that is to say :

On Cavendish, Plug, Twist, and all descriptions of manufactured Tobacco, sweetened, except those hereinafter specially mentioned and otherwise charged with duty, for every pound 10 "

On Common Cut Smoking Tobacco (*tabac frise*) made from unpressed Tobacco, whether from stems; and on shorts or other refuse separated from fine cut Tobacco in the process of manufacture, for every pound 5 "

On Tobacco, Fine Cut, manufactured to be sold or delivered loose, in bulk or in packages, papers, wrappers or boxes, for every pound 15 cts.

On Canadian Twist, otherwise called *Tabac blanc en torquette*, being the unpressed leaf rolled and twisted, for every pound 2

Table of Prohibitions.—The following articles are prohibited to be imported, under a penalty of fifty pounds, together with the forfeiture of the parcel or package of goods in which the same may be found :—Books, Drawings, Paintings and Prints, of an immoral or indecent character; Coin, base or counterfeit.

Free for Use of Her Majesty's Army in Canada.—Silver or plated Ware, Glassware, China Ware, Table Linen, and Cigars, for the use of any regimental mess of officers serving in Canada.

The phrase, "All importations for the use of Her Majesty's Army and Navy, or for the public uses of the Province," is by the last Act, interpreted to mean, that such importations are only free when the duty, otherwise payable thereon, would be borne by the Treasury of the United Kingdom or this Province.

All goods not hereinbefore enumerated, subject to 20 per cent. duty.

For each close carriage, or corresponding winter vehicle, £5; four-wheeled half-covered carriage, or do., drawn by two horses 60s.; four wheeled half-covered carriage, or do., drawn by one horse, 50s.; double dennet, &c., or do., 40s.; gig, caleche, spring cart, or do., 30s.; waggon or vehicle, not above specified, or winter vehicle, adapted for draught of two or more horses, 20s.

Dogs, 7s. 6d. each. (Sheltering or permitting to resort, is keeping a dog.)

TAXES COLLECTED BY THE CHIEF OF POLICE:

For licences issued to carters and others using hackney carriages or vehicles for the conveyance of passengers or transport of goods, wares, merchandise, building materials, produce or other articles, in the City of Montreal.

Hackney Carriages.—For every Cab, Caleche or other two-wheeled vehicle \$5; for every four-wheeled carriage drawn by one horse, \$7; for every coach or four-wheeled carriage drawn by two horses, \$9; for every omnibus or stage coach, \$16.

Carts, Trucks, Waggon and other Vehicles.—The licenses for carts, trucks, and other vehicles used for the conveyance of goods, wares, merchandise, &c., shall be divided into three classes:

The first class shall include all carts, trucks, waggons and other vehicles running within the city for hire or reward not otherwise expressly provided for, and shall pay:—For every cart, truck, or other two-wheeled vehicle, \$2; for every waggon or four-wheeled vehicle drawn by one horse, \$6; for every waggon or four-wheeled vehicle drawn by two horses and made to carry a load under 4,000 lbs. weight, \$7; for every heavy waggon, float or other four-wheeled vehicle drawn by two or more horses and made to carry heavy articles or materials weighing 4,000 lbs., or upwards, \$9; for every Double, \$4.

The second class shall include all carts, waggons or other vehicles used by merchants, traders, manufacturers, contractors for the conveyance or delivery of the articles or effects dealt in, manufactured or made use of by them, for each of which there shall be paid, in addition to the rates charged for in the first class, \$2.50.

The third class shall include all carts, waggon or other vehicles used by expressmen, bakers, brewers, distillers, farmers or gardeners, for each of which there shall be paid, in addition to the rates charged for in the first class, \$5.

Parties obtaining licenses, as aforesaid, shall moreover pay the annual assessment on all working horses employed in drawing the above mentioned vehicles or carriages, at the rate of \$2.50 each, and also twenty-five cents for each number granted by the chief of police.

Firewood, green or from rafts, half a cord 3 feet long, 20c. Furniture or Luggage, per load, 20 cts. Lumber, green or hard from rafts, 500 feet board measure, 20c. Molasses, Sugar or Oil, one puncheon, hogshead, or load, 20c. Pig Iron, Lead, Copper or Tin, one ton, 25c. Bar Iron or Steel, 1 ton, 30c.

For every additional $\frac{1}{2}$ mile for above description of goods, 10c.

And from any of the Harbour wharves to any place in the 2nd or 3rd division within $\frac{1}{2}$ mile distance from the boundary line of the 1st division and *vice versa*, or from any place (exclusive of the wharves) to any other in the city and *vice versa*, provided the distance do not exceed $1\frac{1}{2}$ mile,—instead of 15, 20, 25, and 30 cents, the rates shall be 25, 30, 35, and 40 cents.

From any place in the Western Section of the First Division :

The Factories, &c., at and above St. Gabriel Locks north of Lachine Canal, 30c. The St. Bonaventure Street Railway Station, 20c. The St. Bonaventure Street Station from the lower wharves of the Harbour, 25c. And *vice versa* for one load.

And from any place in the Eastern section of the 1st division, instead of 20, 25, &c., the rates shall be 5 cents additional. For any excess over the weight fixed for a load, additional, *pro rata* rates shall be paid. If delay is caused to the carter by the employer beyond the usual time, the carter shall be paid *extra*, at the rate of 5c. for every quarter of an hour. If a carter is called, and there be no load ready for him, or if unable to load without assistance, he shall be paid as if he carried a load the distance thus unnecessarily travelled.

DIVISIONS REFERRED TO ABOVE.
