MARVELOUSLY RICH.

Colorado Mining Man's Estimate of the Great Kestons.

A special from Aspen, Col., to The Denver News says: D. W. Brunton, one of the best known mining engineers of the State, returned yesterday from a trip to the Kestons mining district. Mr. Brunton stated that the country is a wonderfully interesting one and is marvellously rich in precious metals. What is known as the Sloan district, which New Denver is the principal town, interested the visitor most. This is the silver section of the Kestons, and Mr. Brunton said that in a general way it is much like what Aspen was in '80.

BACK FROM THE LILLOOET.

An Interesting Talk With Mr. J. W. Tyrrell of Hamilton.

Mr. J. W. Tyrrell, Civil and Mining Engineer of Hamilton, has just returned from a six weeks' trip to the Lillooet district, British Columbia. He went out in the interests of the Bridge River Gold Mining Company, which is composed of Hamilton people. Mr. Tyrrell went directly to Lillooet, which is a mining camp with a population of 900, situated 60 miles north of Ashcroft. There was four feet of snow on the level when Mr. Tyrrell left and ten feet on the mountains. It took three days to make the trip from Ashcroft to Lillooet. To a World reporter yesterday Mr. Tyrrell said: "It is a country going to be a great boom in mining. The country is very rich in silver and local men as quickly as it is offered. All the way from \$200 to \$2,000 per day are being paid for claims. During the few days I was there as many as five or six properties changed hands. I was impressed with the mine. Mine chasers have been panning the gravel bed during the summer. They are getting an average of \$10 a day, which shows that the mine must be remarkably rich. The country is covered with auriferous gravel. There is an ample supply of water four miles distant from the mine. It has a head of over 100 feet so that we can install our hydraulic plant at comparatively little expense. Probably \$75,000 will be all that is required to put the mine on a dividend-paying basis. The mine is only a few miles from the Golden. I believe the Hamilton company has one of the best mining propositions in British Columbia."

SUBURBIAN COAL.

People Expect to See It Burn and Take Stock in the Mine.

All day yesterday the people, men and women, continued to crowd into Campbell, Currie & Co.'s offices to view the Ontario coal from Chelmsford glow in a base-burner and give off a splendid heat. PROSPECTORS' CLASSES.

Large Number of Port Arthur Taking a Course in Mineralogy.

The fact that a prospectors' class was held at Port Arthur a year ago might have seemed a very reasonable proposition why there was no necessity of having the experiment repeated so soon again. The attendance this year again, however, would seem to point to the fact that in a mining centre like this there is every justification for an annual prospectors' class. The attendance this year, Mr. Merritt informs us, has exceeded that of any class yet held, nearly seventy persons having already availed themselves of the course of instruction. The ordinary routine class work does not commend itself to the average prospecter, but from his own experience in the field Mr. Merritt is able to make the course of instruction so entirely practical that the most ardent admirer of the rough and ready ways of the "wild woods" and rugged mountain tops must feel satisfied that he is not selling himself as a shrew to theory. The Kingsford School of Mining and the Government have both the thanks of those interested in mineral development in Port Arthur and Port Williams who wisely laying the best sort of foundation to mineral discovery and development by assisting the prospectors. In a conversation with Mr. Merritt it was stated that he had recently returned from a visit to the mining districts. He is gratified by the interest the public are at last taking in mining matters, but he deplores the lack of caution that is being shown. The investing public, and therefore the great loss they are incurring through "wild cats," which species is getting very numerous.

CROWN'S NEST RAILWAY.

Regina Business Men Don't Want the C.P.R. At a Meeting of Regina Business Men the following resolution was adopted:

"Whereas the Crown's Nest Pass is the only available railway pass through the Rocky Mountains in Canadian territory south of the C.P.R. Railway; and whereas it is desirable that railway competition should be encouraged and promoted; therefore, be it resolved, as the opinion of this meeting, that the proposed Crown's Nest Pass Railway should be built as a Government railway; or, if that be impracticable, by a private company other than the C.P.R. Co., with a guarantee of running powers to other roads through the Pass, and power as to the rates and the regulation of rates and the perpetual maintenance of unrestricted competition.

Speaking to the resolution Mr. Geo. W. Brown stated that it is a commendable one; it is a commendable one, even if they did not benefit by it as proposed; it would be a great accomplishment.
