THE NEW RUGBY UNION

The Canadian Inter-Collegiate and was Formed Yesterday at Kingston. Kingston, Nov. 24.-The preliminary meeting of the delegates to the proposed Inter-Collegiate Football Union took place this afternoon. Delegates were present from the colleges and matters were enthusiastically discussed, the proposed union being favorable from every standpoint.

The delegates who presented credentials were: Osgoode, J. M. Mowat, T. R. Binyon, Queen's; J. M. Parker, W. H. Nickle, Trinity; J. Inkster, Trinity; H. C. Osborne and Cadet Carr Harris; Royal Military College; G. S. Sherwood and Rogers; McGill; G. T. Alley, N. Grace. The first business taken was the election of officers pro tem. John Inkster, manager of Varsity football team, was elected hockey manager and N. Grace, McGill, secretary.

J. M. Parker submitted a letter from the secretary of the Ontario College team, regarding the inability of the college to send delegates. The only man present who delegates were engaged in the Dominion championship games at Montreal. He said the college could not consent to not playing graduates.

After conversation it was decided to form a Union to be known as the Canadian Inter-Collegiate Football Union. The delegates to be invited to form the Union from players who were not bona fide students. First, they asked for students who were bona fide standing, but Osgoode had delegates objected. It was not compulsory that the students be bona fide. Finally, it was agreed to allow a clause to read: That no person be eligible to play on any college team who is not a bona fide registered student, regular in attendance, and who is not a bona fide member of the college, or in the case of Osgoode, a resident of Toronto, and a member of the Ontario Law Society, and who is also accepted after discussion to allow graduates of one year's standing to play. The question of adopting rugby was discussed, but was not taken up.

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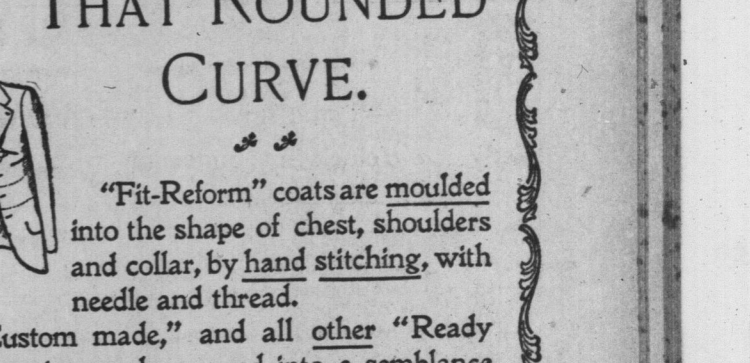
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THAT ROUNDED CURVE.

BERTRAM ENDORSES THE GANG.

Mr. Clarke Wallace made a powerful indictment against the Government in his speech at the Temperance Hall last night. His recital of the facts in regard to the Crow's Nest and Drummond Counties Railway deals was a convincing arraignment of the extravagant and corrupt of the Government. As he pointed out in the course of his remarks the C. P. R. and Grand Trunk have each an independent line between Montreal and Quebec, while the business is insufficient to support one of them decently. The need for a third line between these two cities is about as necessary, as Mr. Wallace aptly stated last night, as two tails are on a dog. The Drummond Counties Railway has been leased for \$64,000 a year, which has been capitalized represents a valuation of \$2,500,000. The amount of money spent by the owners of the railway, independent of the business received, was not more than \$100,000, and it will not require more than \$500,000 to complete the line. The difference between the \$2,500,000 and this \$500,000 was, or is to be, as Mr. Wallace stated, divided between a gang of thieves, Hon. Mr. Farrow is implicitly associated with this deal. Mr. Greenfield, the President of the Drummond Counties Railway, gave a cheque of \$30,000 to Mr. Farrow's sons to purchase the newspaper which they now own. Without making any specific charge against Mr. Farrow in connection with this transaction, the public may be safely left to draw their own conclusion, which certainly will not be favorable to Mr. Farrow. The Minister of Public Works is the sponsor of Mr. Bertram in Centre Toronto. He it was who vouched for Mr. Bertram's loyalty to the Liberal Government on the occasion of this transaction, and the Minister of the latter's nomination for the Liberal party. While the Drummond Counties Railway has been leased by the Government, the deal has not yet been sanctioned by Parliament. Mr. Farrow's approval of Mr. Bertram's candidature and the latter's acceptance of it is evidence in itself that the deal is Mr. Bertram has surrendered to the Farrow influence and that he will support the Drummond Counties deal when it comes up in Parliament for ratification. Has Mr. Bertram denounced the deal in the House of Commons? Not at all. Has he denounced the Crow's Nest or the British Columbia Southern plunderers? Not a word has he uttered against any of these corrupt acts or against the individuals concerned in them. The Liberal candidate, by his silence, endorses several shifty, if not corrupt, transactions of the Government which has been avoided. Mr. Bertram is hand and glove with the gang of plunderers whom the Government has already allowed to rob the country of several millions of dollars, as well as millions of acres of valuable coal and mineral lands.

ELECTRIC POWER PROJECTS.

It may be possible to transmit power economically from Niagara Falls to Toronto. It may be possible to develop power from the Humber River at a less cost than to develop it by steam in Toronto. While admitting this, we do not see why the city of Toronto should make itself a party to any scheme for determining whether these possibilities, or either of them, can be realized. It is outside the duty of a municipal corporation to deal with hypothetical problems. A municipality should confine itself to facts, not theories. In regard to electric power, we know what it costs to develop it from an up-to-date steam plant. We also know what it costs to purchase electricity from the company that develops it. It is not our business to ascertain what we would save by producing the current ourselves instead of buying it from the Toronto Electric Light Company. These data are reliable and will enable us to come to a correct decision on the advisability of installing our own plant. But as to the alleged Humber power, we have no definite facts, and it is not within the province of the Council to waste its time or resources to obtain the facts. Those who have faith in the Humber project must go to work and develop their power on their own responsibility, just as was done on the American side of the Niagara River, and as will be done ere long, we hope, on the Canadian side. It is time enough for those prospective companies to approach the city when they have power to sell or when their power is within sight. Until that period arrives the Council should refuse to negotiate with them or to become silent partners in their projects.

SHIRKING AN EXPLANATION.

It is a pity Sir Wilfrid Laurier has decided not to come to Toronto and address a Centre Toronto audience. The electors are anxious to have the real explanation of his refusal to consider Hon. Mr. Chamberlain's proposal for the establishment of an Imperial Zollverein. No satisfactory explanation of his attitude on this question has yet been given to the public. The Globe has ventured to defend Sir Wilfrid by stating that Mr. Chamberlain's offer involved the establishment of absolute free trade between the Mother Country

and the colonies. We have quoted from Mr. Chamberlain's speeches to prove that no such condition was imposed as The Globe states. Mr. Chamberlain's idea of an Imperial Zollverein is not that free trade should prevail within the British Empire, but that protection should be abolished. The abolition of protective duties is not synonymous with a free trade tariff. The Globe's explanation has been proved to be false. The electors of Centre Toronto would like to learn from Sir Wilfrid Laurier just what Mr. Chamberlain's offer was and why he refused to consider it. Sir Wilfrid is the only Canadian who has a personal knowledge of the negotiations, but he has studiously avoided giving details of what actually transpired between him and Mr. Chamberlain. The latter has not taken any interest in the matter. Why should Sir Wilfrid hesitate to disclose his side of the case, when the Secretary of State for the Colonies has given us the leading features of the negotiations as they appeared to him? An official explanation from the Canadian Premier is anxiously awaited, not only by the electors of Centre Toronto, but by the people of the whole Dominion.

RESURRECTING THE CORPSE.

The Globe has all along claimed credit for the Liberal party for having settled the Manitoba school question. Now, however, it appears that the contrary is the case. The Manitoba school question is about to break out afresh and the battle will have to be fought over again. According to The Globe, a policy of discrediting the Public schools in Manitoba has been going on at the very time when the Premier was in the Pacific. We are further told that "the Pope's pronouncement will, it is to be feared, be taken as a warrant for still further assailing the Public school system and embarrassing its operation. In fact, there is too much reason to believe that even in the Federal arena we are not yet done with the Manitoba school question." If any question was ever settled for good that question is undoubtedly the Manitoba school question. The consensus of public opinion from the Atlantic to the Pacific has relegated the issue to oblivion. On the very day the Premier announced that a compromise had been effected discussion of the subject ceased. The whole country and both political parties were only too glad to get rid of what was the political bete-noir of the decade. The settlement came as a relief to the whole country. No one ever dreamed that the question would ever be resurrected. To the surprise of everyone, The Globe yesterday dragged the corpse from its resting place and exposed it to the public gaze. The Manitoba school question is too good a thing to let die. It was the Manitoba school question that gave the Liberal party its victory last year, and The Globe is trotting the corpse out now in the hope that it will elect Mr. Bertram in Centre Toronto. It is highly discreditable to The Globe and those who are conducting the Liberal campaign in this constituency to play upon the religious feelings of the people in the hope that the strife that has divided them during the past few years may be revived and made the central issue in the present election. There is only one way for peace-loving and patriotic citizens to treat the Manitoba school question, and that way is to regard it as dead, buried and decomposed. Anyone who says that it is not dead, anyone who hopes to nurse it back to life, is an enemy to the cause of peace and harmony among the people of this country. No one would ever have heard of the question in this campaign had The Globe not gone out of its way to introduce it.

THE TOTAL OF MARTIN THORN

More Rapid Progress Being Made Than the Lawyers Anticipated.

RELATIVES OF THE PRISONER IN COURT.

O'Hanlon had a Portion of Guldensuppe's Body as an Exhibit and Lawyer Have Had Not to Inspect It.

New York, Nov. 24.—The second trial of Martin Thorn, charged with the killing of William Guldensuppe, is progressing much more rapidly than the lawyers on either side had anticipated.

When Thorn was brought in by Capt. Miron he was told of his sister and brother-in-law's location in the room. The prisoner looked up and nodded a greeting to them.

Opening of the Court. Judge Maddox opened court at 9:30, but before any witness were called he informed the jury that if they wished to communicate with their families on any subject other than the case they were to write to him and he would see that they were given every opportunity to do so.

Thorn is said to have told one of his cellmates that his brother-in-law, Minkler, had disposed of the head of the man who was thrown from the window from a fishing boat, off the Jersey coast. Whether Minkler will be called as a witness could not be ascertained.

The first three witnesses called this morning were both employees, and the testimony of the first witness to the identity of the parts of Guldensuppe's body.

Dr. O'Hanlon had an Exhibit. Dr. Philip F. O'Hanlon, a deputy coroner of New York, was then called. Prior to the examination of the witness a court attendant carried in a small glass jar, which was placed in front of the witness. It contained a portion of Guldensuppe's body and, as soon as it had been placed in front of the witness, Dr. O'Hanlon stated that he had cut away a portion of the right of the dead man's head, and it is now in that jar.

As he said this he picked up the jar. It was about eight inches high and four in diameter and filled with a whitish liquid. Dr. O'Hanlon seemed to be about to take the jar in his hand, when Mr. Howe said: "Your Honor, I don't think it is necessary for the witness to open this jar and give such a gruesome exhibition. I am quite willing to accept the testimony of the witness."

A New Witness. A new witness appeared in Marie Hafsten, who lives next to the Woodside cottage, and had charge of it. She was sworn to and called. She testified that on June 23, 1897, she saw a man, whom she identified as Thorn, called on her to inquire about the vacant house in front of her. The next day the man returned with a woman, dressed in a very showy style, got the hat and looked between them a bundle from the house to a surrey standing in front. On June 28 the man returned alone and talked to her about the house.

Mr. Howe demanded the production of Mrs. Nack in court, to be identified by the witness as "the showy dressed woman."

Justice Maddox seemed to be very doubtful as to whether he had the right to compel the attendance of an accused person for such a purpose. Finally it was agreed that Mr. Howe should apply for a writ of habeas ad testificandum and that the witness should be reserved to be recalled to identify Mrs. Nack.

Bernard Buaia, the owner of the Woodside cottage, was then called. He testified that on the evening of June 23 he saw a man, whom he identified as Thorn, call on him and ask for a photograph of Guldensuppe as that man was in the light suit. She did not see the woman again that day, but recognized her since as Mrs. Nack. About a week after the trial the witness saw a man open a window on the second floor of the cottage, next to the bathroom. "Do you see that man, or can you identify him?" asked Surrogate Weller, who is one of the prosecuting attorneys.

The witness stood up and, after carefully looking around her, said: "I have never seen that man, or do I know him at the slightest degree."

Mr. Howe cross-examined Mrs. Numbauer, and she said that she only noticed Guldensuppe's nose and blonde hair
