Dun's Trade Review.

The trade movement at Montreal as a whole continues moderate in extent. In dry goods, wholesale business is of a "between season" character, with retailers complaining of somewhat slow sales. British cables advise an advance in Bradford dress goods, but the unfavorable conditions in the domestic woolen manufacturing trade are unrelieved, with the result that dealers in raw wool report a very hand-to-mouth demand. Owing to comparatively limited offerings the hide market is firmer, with moderate enquiry reported, but leather still rules on the dull side. The only feature of interest in the grocery line is a further decline of ten cents a cental in refined sugars. It is expected that the existing good demand for structural iron, contractors' hardware, paints, etc., will be fairly maintained during the summer owing to the activity in general building operations, Butter and cheese are easier than a week ago under increasing receipts, but business in these lines is of a satisfactory character, 58,000 boxes of cheese having gone forward to Britain last week. Collections are fair. Money is easy with the call rate at 4 to 4½ per cent.

General wholesale trade in Toronto shows little change this week, There has been a moderate movement only, and the feeling is hopeful owing to bright outlook, for crops. Prices of the leading staples in dry goods are without change, and in consequence of the continued strength in raw cotton and wools there are not likely to be any recessions in prices of manufactured goods, but even firmer quotations may be expected. There is a good demand for building material, and metals are firm at unchanged prices. In groceries the demand for canned goods is active with supplies small. Lawyer Shepley Will Argue in Rebuttal To Day and Decision of Judge Anglin is Expected Soon.

corpus James G. Gilhula, despatcher, and Everett E. Cain, trainmaster of the Pere Marquette Railway, appeared before Justice Anglin in chambers at Osgoode Hall yesterday. This is a test case brought by the attorney-Thirteen officials were found by the commission, appointed for that pur-pose, to have been employed contrary to the provisions of the act; but only these two cases have been prosecuted. J. A. Robinson of St. Thomas, on behalf of Jas. G. Gilhula, advanced the plea that where the brain is used, such employment does not come under the provisions of the Alien Labor Act. There must be some muscle used in the work. The employment of his client, therefore, dld not come under the act. The court had no jurisdiction the act. The court had no jurisdiction in this case. There had been no hearing before the attorney-general, nor had any notice to be heard, as to whether his client comes within the act or not, been received by him. It was contrary to the habeas, corpus act for a man to be condemned unheard. He must be brought in to answer the charge and be prejudged according to law. Notice must be given to the parties, and the attorney-general must be satisfied that there is a breach of the law before he can act. This is a question of whether the law is not calculated to make a breach between the two countries, and the power sought in this act could only be vested in the sovereign power, Great Britain. Mr. Robinson also objected to the arrest as irregular. Col. Sherwood was a justice of the peace as well as chief of the Dominion police, and quoting Dalton as an authority read, that "a justice of the peace cannot act as constable."

J-B. Mackenzie, counsel for Mr. Cain, addressed the court for two hours, and quoted copiously from a long list of legal volumes before him. His main arguments were that the alien labor law is ultra vires, and the Dominion parliament had no power to pass it because it is an invasion of the sovereign power. There was also the possibility that the United States might refuse to receive these persons. If Canada passed a law to deport all Americans it might lead to war.


