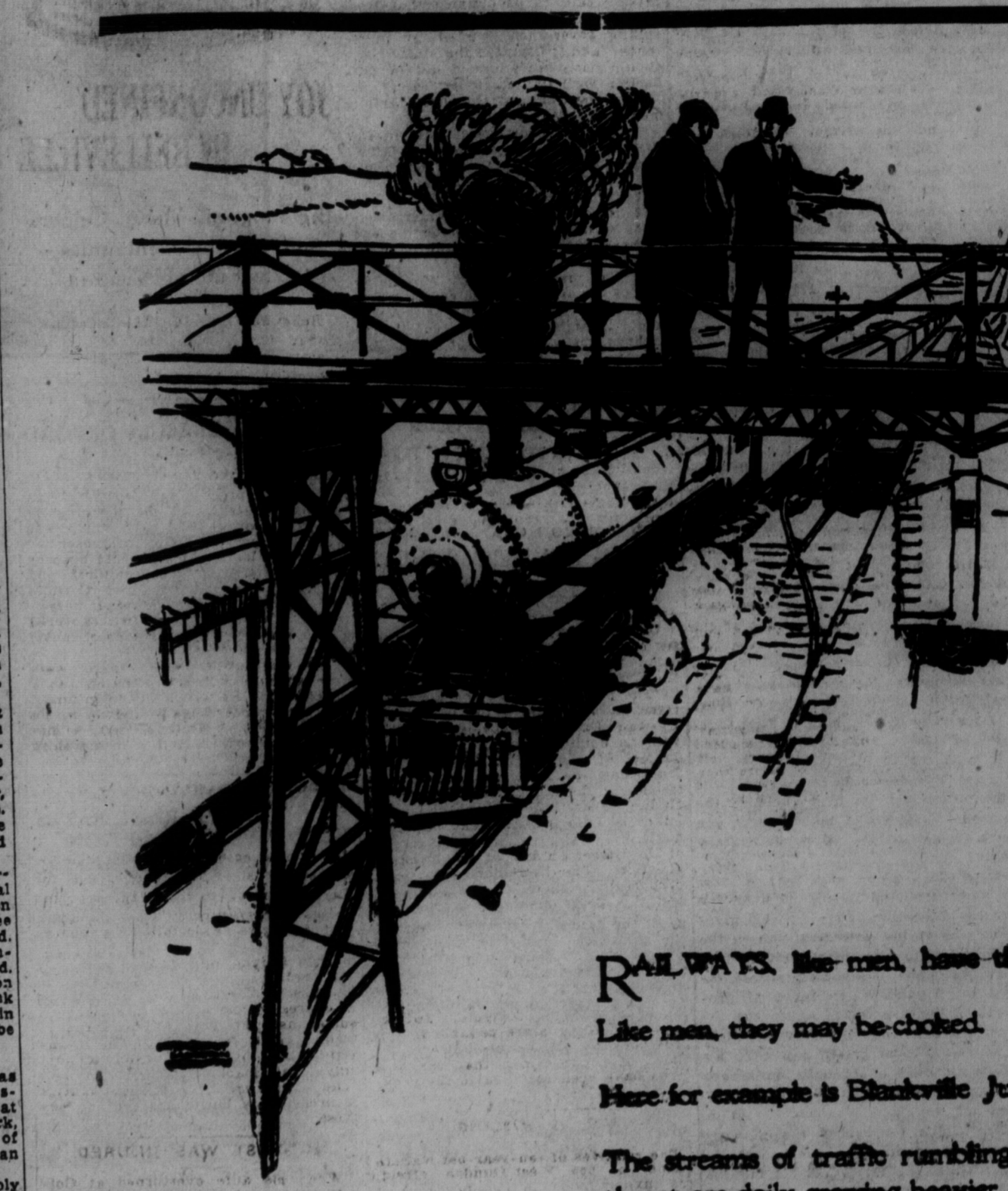
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RAILWAYS. Men, have throat Like men, they may be choked. Here for example is Blankville Junction.

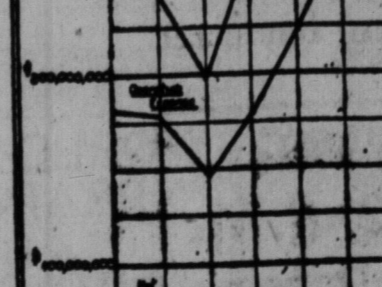
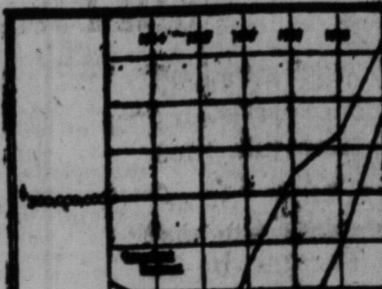
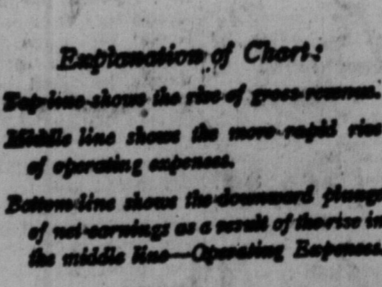

Up to the Drury Government

If the laws of Ontario are being openly violated along the Detroit frontier without effective check or hindrance from the municipal authorities, it is up to the provincial government to enforce these laws and summarily punish the offenders.

Shipping whiskey to Detroit may at first blush seem to be something which the United States authorities should deal with. But bootlegging is an offence under the Ontario temperance act, and, if we are to believe half we hear, amounts in Essex county to a public scandal.

But the fact that we have a license board in no way absolves the attorney-general of the province from enforcing provincial law. It is the duty of Mr. Raney to see that the laws are obeyed in every county and corner of Ontario.

There is a lot of money in the bootlegging business along the Detroit River and powerful influences stand ready to protect it on either side. The local authorities in Detroit probably think it is up to the federal authorities to check unlawful importation.

Do the Liberals Really Want an Election?

The revolving globe, which has been a Liberal, a Unionist and again a Liberal newspaper within less than three years' time, editorially echoes the recent deliverance of its present leader, Hon. Mackenzie King, and demands a general election.

The Union government was elected upon a platform with many planks, and had a mandate to carry on long after the war was over.

Strictly speaking, the people do not elect a government but a parliament, and the members of the present parliament were elected for a five-year term in December 1917.

Does The Globe believe that outside of Quebec the Liberals could carry 25 seats? Does The Globe believe that the election should be held before the census is taken and before there can be redistribution of parliamentary seats?

Does The Globe believe that a new parliament should be elected upon the present allocation of seats which gives twice the voting power to men in the country as to men in the city?

The Globe reproaches the government for organizing a commission to inquire into the tariff. Yet six months ago the government was reprobated for not having appointed such a commission.

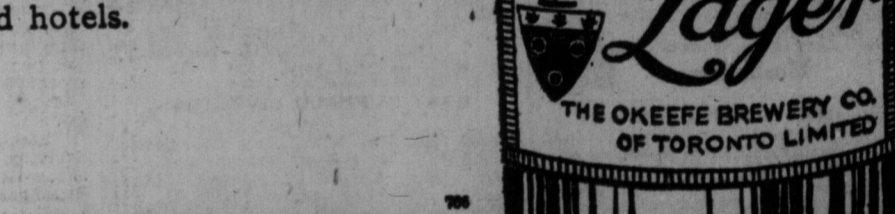
