Amherst, N. S., Jan. 6—(Special)—Patrick Kennedy, a well known resident of Springhill, met his death on Tuesday last under sad circumstances. In the afternoon he went to Joggins Mines to get work. The company, however, did not furnish him with employment. Kennedy then determined to return to his home in Springhill. He waited for some time about River Hebert with the expectation of catching the train to Maccan. His expectations were not realized, as the train was delayed longer than he anticipated, so Kennedy,

Soon after he left the train assed through River Hebert, and it is resumed that he attempted to board the rain while in motion near Pugsley's rossing, thereby receiving injuries which indered him unconscious.



Montreal, Jan. 5-When Principal Robertson, of Macdonald College, requested leave of absence for the winter, it was remarked that it might be a first step towards a wider field of service for Canadian agriculture, and the betterment of conditions of rural life generally. Dr. Robertson now confirms that expectation by stating that he will leave in January for Switzerland, France and Denmark, to study at first hand the rural economy of those older countries where notable progress has been made through agricultural education and co-operation.

Incidentally he desires to acquire an easier command of the French language, for use in the province of Quebec. It will be remembered that he was one of those appointed by the Commission for the Conservation of National Resources. The Professor intends to devote a large part of his time and energies to his duties as a member of that commission. After visiting Europe, le will come back to Canada for a few months in summer, and after a period in Newfoundland will go on to Australasia, South Africa and India.

About a year will be occupied in these travels and investigations. In the several countries, Dr. Robertson will take opportunities of giving to various public bodies information on the enormously, extensive and valuable resources of Canada, and also on the wonderful developments by its people. His long experience as commissioner of agriculture for the Dominion, gave him an intimate and comprehensive knowledge of Canadian agriculture, such as is possessed by few other citizens, while his work at Macdonald College has brought him into close touch with what is foremost and best in education for the building up of the country in its children, its teachers, and its homes. RAISING OSTRICHES.

(From the Scientific American.)

The first attempt to raise ostriches in Australia was made by a Mr. Malcolm, who in 1880 brought one hundred young birds from South Africa to South Australia. In the following year the parliament of South Australia enacted a law which granted to the first person who should exhibit 250 ostriches more than one year old about 2,400 acres of land suited for ostrich farming. The conditions were satisfied by the South Australian Ostrich Company, which was founded in 1886 with a capital of \$75,000. The company received land near Port Augusta on Spencer Bay, but in spite of this assistance, the company has never paid a dividend, although it now possesses eleven hundred ostriches, all of which were imported from South Africa. RAISING OSTRICHES.

SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NORTH-WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

Any person who is the sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. The applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the district. Entry by proxy may be made at any agency, on certain conditions, by father, mother, son, daughter, brother or sister of intending homesteader.

Duties—Six months' residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres solely owned and occupied by him or by his father, mother, son, daughter, brother, or sister.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section alongside his homestead .Price \$3,00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of six years from date of homestead entry (including the time required to earn homestead patent) and cultivate fifty acres extra.

A homesteader who has exhausted his

A homesteader who has exhausted his homestead right and cannot obtain a preemption may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate fifty acres and erect a house worth \$300.00.




