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REPORT

OF THE COMMITTEE OF THE HALIFAX PROTESTANT INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL, FOR 1878.

In the department of philanthropic effort in which the Committee of the Protestant Industrial School are charged with important responsibilities, the review of another year's operations affords pleasing evidences that their work has not been in vain in the Lord. In the firm conviction that the Institution they represent, meets a want growing out of the conditions of a class of our population, it has been the aim of all connected with the School to use those means and appliances which with the blessing of God are calculated to foster habits of thrift and honesty, and under the ennobling influences of christianity, mould for usefulness in the world, those who would otherwise exert an influence prejudicial to themselves and society generally.

GOVERNMENT.

The Institution is controlled by a committee of gentlemen representing different protestant denominations, and all its affairs are submitted to and carefully considered at the weekly

meetings held for that purpose.

The Superintendent—Mr. Abner Hart—acting under the direction of the Committee, has been indefatigable in his efforts, and by an admirable blending of the "suaviter in modo with fortiter in re" has secured not only the confidence and respect of the boys, but also to a marked degree their affectionate esteem. The contract with Mr. Bliss by which the labor of some of the boys is utilized, serves to secure not only a fair remuneration, but also tends to keep their minds engaged, their time employed, and leads them to an appreciation of the practical and material in life. It serves also to secure for them a good trade—shoemaking—thus enabling them to gain a respectable living when they leave us. In the

Kindling Wood and Carpet Cleaning departments, those who are not otherwise engaged, are employed from time to time. The employment which all in the Institution have, helps in the internal government inasmuch as it furnishes guards which are not thrown around the lawless and lazy. Four evenings in the week are devoted to mental improvement of the boys under the direction of Mr. Halls, and on Sabbaths all attend church morning and evening and Sabbath School at home in the afternoon.

ATTENDANCE AT THE SCHOOL.

At the close of the year 1877, there were 29 boys in attendance at the School. During the past year 15 boys were admitted and 14 left—the attendance at the close of 1878 was 30 boys, an increase of one on the previous year. Of the 14 boys who left the institution during the year past, the term of service of six had expired, five went to places provided for them with the consent of the committee, two ran away, leaving the city and we believe the country, and one was released by order of the Stipendiary, after being in the institution seven days, a promise having been given that he would leave the city.

CHRISTMAS AT THE SCHOOL.

In an appropriate notice, one of the Halifax papers thus refers to the School:—

The Industrial School.—Among the Christmas festivities the enjoyable time spent at the Halifax Industrial School is worthy of special mention. At the usual Christmas dinner for the boys, the following managers of the Institution were present:—The Hon. P. C. Hill, J. S. Maclean, W. H. Neal, S. M. Brookfield, E. D. Meynell, wood, Major Mainguy, R. E., &c. The scene at dinner time was very pleasing. The dinner room was beautifully decorated—the work of abundance, and certainly the lads evidenced their appreciation by doing full justice to roast goose and plum pudding. After dinner the Rev. W. H. Heartz and Dr. Dashwood. The last named gentleman presented two prizes—to the best and second best boy in the Institution. The selection for the prizes having been left to the boys themselves—the Superintendent concurring in the choice—the fortunate

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ones received the gifts amid the applause of their companions. All the boys looked healthy, and we understand that the Institution is in a flourishing condition under the able management of Mr. Abner Hart.

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ENCOURAGING FEATURES.

The Superintendent is very thankful for kindly enquiries after the boys, made from time to time, and for good wishes expressed by many friends of the Institution. A letter from W. G. Pender, Esq., who is prominently identified with the St. Andrew's Church, of this city, whose Sabbath School supports a boy at the School, expresses complete satisfaction with the improvement and condition of the lad whose well-being has been greatly promoted. Another gentleman who has one of the boys reposes the greatest confidence in him, and has the utmost satisfaction in entrusting him with important business concerns. Just now at the Institution a gracious spiritual influence is being realized, and hopeful indications of the presence and operation of the Lord the Spirit, encourage the committee in the work in which they are engaged.

FINANCIAL.

The financial depression which prevails is unhappily felt to a large extent in the ordinary contributions, whilst the death and removal of several of the supporters of this Institution have rendered the greatest care necessary in the disbursement of funds. Extra expenditure has been required to keep in repair the building and the munificence of "the now departed ones" has served us well in this emergency. As will be seen by the financial statement, legacies from the late N. L. West, \$800, W. L. Black, \$250, and C. Roche, \$190, have been expended in painting our buildings, putting them in excellent repair, and freeing ourselves from the debts of former years. The debt incurred on the operations of 1878, as per statement of the Treasurer's account, is \$88.25.

CONCLUSION.

The committee very urgently invite all interested in the reclamation of the youth from the ways of sin to visit the School at any time convenient for them. On Sabbath after-

noon, on Wednesday and Saturday evenings, particularly when religious exercises are conducted by the Superintendent, able.
