1. A partial Eclipse of the Moon, March 31st. Opposition in right asceusion, 35 minutes past 4, afternoon. Invisible throughout Canada.
2. A total Eclipse of the Sun, April 15ih. Conjunction in right ascension, 42 minutes past midnight. Invisible in America; total to parts of Australia and the Indian Ocean.
3 A partial Eclipse of the " oon, September 24th. Opposition in right ascension, 49 minutes past 9 , renoon. Invisible throughout Canada.
3. An aunular Eclipse of the Sun, October 9th. Conjunction in right ascension, 33 minutes past 3 forenoon. Invisible throughout America. Central and annular to the Southern paris of Ireland and England, parts of France, Spain, Austria, Turkey, Italy, Syria, Persia, Hindoostan, Birmah.

In 1842 , there were produced, in the United States, $100,000,000$ bushels of wheat, and $140,0000,000$ bushels of Indian corn ; which, at the rate of one dollar per bushel for the former, and twenty five cents for the latter. were worth one hundred and thirty-five million, five hundred thousand dollars. Fifteen per cent, clear of the interest of the capital invested in lands, implements, hired and personal labour, is a liberal estimate of the profit accruing to the wheat and corn grower. Then the profit of this amount of grain would be twenty million, three hundred and twenty-five thousand dollars. The appropriation to the army and navy, during the same year, was twenty million, one hundred and fifty thousand, five hundred and one dollars. In other words, the army and navy ate up the whole harvest of wheat and corn thronghout the Union! Will not the hard-working farmers think on this fact?

From March 4th, 1789, to June 30th, 1844, the United States government expended on the War Department six hundred and sixty-three million, four hundred and thirty-eight thousand, eight hundred and fifty-one dollars. The interest of this sum, at six per cent, would build Whitney's great railroad from the lakes to the Pacific, of 2500 miles in length, at fifteen thousand dollars per mile; and thus erect a highway for the commerce and communion of the family of nations, which should be reckoned in all coming time as one of the greatest enterprises that ever blessed the race.

Calicoes were first printed in London in 1676.
The quantity of Lead shipped from Galena in 1844 was about $43,000,000$ pounds. This year it is estimated that the amount will be $60,000,000$ pounds.


The mercantile shipping of the civilized world amounts to abont $8,000,000$ tons, which is worth, new and old, thirty dollars per ton, and nets, clear of interest, insurance, \&c., ten per cent, or twenty-four million dollars per annum. The appropriation to the British Navy for the current year, is thirty-three million, six hundred and twenty thousand, two hundred dollars ! Is not this a sober fact, that the annual expense of one nation's navy exceeds the net profit of all the mercantile shipping owned by the civilized world ?

The war debts of the European nations amount to ten thonsand million dollars, (ten billions). It would require the labour of four millions of men, at one hundred and fifty dollars per annum for each man, to pay the interest of this sum at six per cent. To pay the principal, it would be necessary to levy a tax of at least ten dollars on every inhabitant of the globe!

The debt of the Netherlands, contracted, as all national debts are, to meet the expenses of war, past or prospective, amounts to $\$ 665,000,000$. To liquidate this debt would require a tax of three dollars and twelve and a-half cents on every inhabitant of Europe, and seventy-five cents on every individual on the globe. Divided among the population of Holland, the share of each inhabitant would be \$266. The wages of labouring men, throughout the world, probably do not average twenty cents a day. Then, at that rate, three thousand three hurdred and forty millions of hard-toiling sons of labour would have to work one day in order to foot this war-bill of little Holland!

The annual loss to Great Britain by shipwreck, is 610 ships, 15,000 lives, $£ 2,000,000$ sterling !

Prioted votes were first introduced into the British Parliament in $\mathbf{1} 681$.


England granted $\$ 4,000,000,900$ to replace the Bourbons on the throne of France. The interest of this sum, at 5 per cent, would be $\$ 200,000,000$ annually; which would go so far to place the Saviour on the throne of this alienated world, as to support a standing army of 400,000 missionaries of the Gospel in Pagan lands and Cbristian lands paganized by systems of grinding oppression and moral degradation. The interest of the money would build 10,000 miles of rail-road every year, until the habitable globe were intersected by the iron highways for the nations. The amount or principal, if divided among the $314,000,000$ inhabitants of Europe, would put $\$ 1869$ cents into the hands of every individual!

In Italy there is one insane man to 4879, in France one to 1000, Wales one to 800 , England one to 862 , Scotland one to 574 , Russia one to 666, United States one to 500 . Amongst the Chinese, insanity is almost unknown.

In 1816 the British Government, in perfect peace, victorious, and tranquil, spent $£ 86,000,000$ sterling, no part of which was applied to the extinction of the National Debt. In 1824 its expenditure exceeded $£ 67,000,000$. In 1844, the latest period to which the accounts have been completed, its expenditure was reduced to $£ 55,000,000$.

In 1816 the interest of the National Debt amounted to $£ 33,500,000$; it is now reduced to $£ 26,000,000$, and $£ 4,000,000$ on temporary annuities, which are gradually disappearing yea by year. Whilst Great Britain was achieving these splendid results, she was effecting a vast reform in the manner and extent of her public burdens.

Between 1815 and 1841, a balance being spruck between taxes increased and taxes diminished, this power bas abolished an amount of $£ 24,000,000$ of taxation, and in 1845 suppressed a further sum of $£ 6,000,000$.


The taxes abolished are those especially which paralyse industry, and oppose obstacles to the superiority of British commerce over other nations.

In effecting this, do not imagine that England has abstained from carrying out gigantic enterprizes, sustaining mighty struggles, and defending her wide spread dominions with an armed hand. She possessed, in 1816, $80,000,000$ of subjects ; she now numbers $100,000,000$. Canada revolted; the revolt was suppressed by force. Her will was contested in the Syrian question ; her ships deoided the matter. China resisted the odious commerce in opium ; an expedition after the manner of Cortes subdued the Celestial Empire. Two seas existed, the entrance of which was not under the command of England, the Chinese Ocean and the Red Sea. Aden and Singapore have completed the chain of forts which bind the commerce of the world.

## EXTENT OF LAND CONTAINED IN OUR NORTH AMERICAN COLONIES.



The whole area of our North American Provinces alone is more than twice as great as that of all France, which is $130,370,840$ acres ; but while France has a population of $35,000,000$ of people, these provinces have only an united population of $2,000,000$ by the largest computation that can be made. Of this vast area there are not more than $30,000,000$ of acres granted, and of these not more than $5,000,000$ cultivated.

This immense inland ocean is four hundred and ninety miles in length, and is seveuteen hundred in circumfereuce-being the largest body of fresb water in the globe. It contains many islands-one of them, the Isle Royale, is one hundred miles in length, and forty in breadth. Upwards of thirty rivers empty themselves into it, and one curious fact in relation to it is well ascertained, that the quantity of water disebarged through the Sault Ste. Marie, is not one-tenth what it receives from its tributary streams. Evaporation must, therefore, be the principal agent in keeping the lake down to its usual level.

## POPULATION OF CANADA.

According to the latest census, the entire population of Lower Canada is 690,782 . Natives, of Freuch origin, are in number 524,307 ; of British origin, 83,860 ; of the Continent of Europe, 1,326. The number of natives of England is 11,859; of the United States, 11,946; of Ireland, 43,982; aud of Scotland, 13,393.

The population of Upper Canada is estimated at 632,570.

## MANY FACTS IN FEW WORDS.

A legal stone is $\mathbf{1 4} \mathrm{lbs}$. , or $\frac{1}{8}$ of 100 in England, and 16 lbs . in Holland. A fathom, 6 feet, is derived from the height of a full grown man. A band, in horse measure, is 4 inches. An acre is 4840 square yards, or 69 yards ; 1 foot $8 \frac{1}{2}$ inches each way. A square mile, 1760 yards each way, contains 640 acres. The human body consists of 240 bones, 9 kinds of articulations, or joinings, 100 cartileges or ligaments, 400 muscles or tendons, and 100 nerves, besides blood, arteries, veins, \&c. Potatoes planted below three feet do not vegetate; at one foot they grow thickest; and at two feet they are retarded two or three months. There are no solid rocks in the Arctic regions, owing to the severe frosts. The surface of the sea is estimated at $150,000,000$ square miles, taking the whole surface of the globe at $197,000,000$ square miles. Its greatest depth is supposed to be equal to the height of the highest mountain, or four miles. Fresh water begins to freeze at 32 degrees, called the freezing point; but salt water does not freeze till $38 \frac{1}{2}$ degrees. Of 100 parts into which the surface of the earth may be divided, Europe contains 7, Africa 21, Continental Asia 33, New Holland, \&c. 8, South America 15, North America 16. A cylinder of water may be converted into ice by placing in it 5 lbs . of sulphate of soda, and 4 lbs . of suiphuric acid, at 36 degrees, well mixed. The ice is extracted for use by putting the cylinder into hot water. Extreme cold produces the same perception on the skin as great heat. When mercury is frozen at 40 degrees below zero, tho sensation of the skin is the same as that of tonching red hot iron.
