New York, Feb. 24-Morning newspapers here, commenting on the speech of Premier Lloyd-George, view his programme as another indication that Great Britain has stripped to bring the war to a successful conclusion. "It is a test of the nation's grit," says the New York Tribune, "nor is there any reason to doubt that the nation is with him."

Discussing the prime minister's suggestions, the New York World says: -Freat Britain will feed on no illusions. If his economies are carried out, and if they were not to be they would not have been announced, Great Britain will at last have stripped with grim Germanic thoroughness for a war which is to go ANERICAN LINE NOW on to the bitter end."

German Raider Was Blown Up By The Cruiser Glasgow

New York, Feb officer in the Brit New York, Fe According to an officer in the Bri Aval reserve, who arrived in New ark today from St. Lucia in the West indies, the German raider Vineta was sunk four weeks ago by the British cruiser Glasgow, following a fight between the raiders Vineta and St. Theodore, with the cruiser Amethyst off the Island of Fernando de Noronha, 125 miles from the coast of Brazil.

The report was given him by an officer of the Glasgow, who said that there were three vessels cruising in company when the Amethyst approached and that only two appeared to take part in the fight. The third vessel did not fire, but sheered off.

The smaller of the raiders, probably the St. Theodore, was reported by the officers of the Amethyst to have been near to sinking, when might fell and hid the vessels from the view of the cruiser.







The war goes on, but Belgium stands still, or rather slips back a little deeper into her misery! German rule grows harsher and more vindictive as certain defeat looms up ahead. Belgian reserves of money are steadily dwindling, and now fully half the population must be fed by charity or starve.

To make the situation worse, the great sympathetic public of Great Britain, Canada and the United States is beginning to look upon Belgium's need as an old story, and to be less generous in their giving. Meanwhile prices of food are soaring and the money given does not go as far as it did.

As it is, the Belgian Relief Commission has been compelled to cut down rations to what seems the absolute minimum—the smallest amount that will support life. If further reductions have to be made the weaker must go under, and the children, on whom Belgium's future depends, must be permanently stunted and weakened by want.

London, Feb. 23-Premier Lloyd George today presented to the house of commons, in a speech lasting an hour and a half, his programme for coping with the problems of shortage of shipping space. The speech was a serious and grave effort, the prime minister giving his audience little opportunity for applause, and endeavoring to concentrate attention on the serious situation with which the nation is faced owing to the shortage of food stocks, and the German sub-

Under the first head Mr. Lloyd George outlined a scheme for speeding up the farmer by guaranteeing him good pay for his commodities over a period of years, thus inviting him to plow and sow every inch of available land. This he supplemented by the announcement that the land owner would be actually forced to culitvate his land. The speeding up of the British farm laborer in England was provided for by the premier by guaranteeing him a minimum wage of 25 shillings per week, instead of the present 14 to 18 shillings.

Under the head of curtailment of imports Mr. Lloyd George said he expected to reduce the demands on cargo space by several million tons. Foodstuffs, of which 16,000,000 tons were imported last year, will be cut down nearly one million tons by lopping off certain luxuries. Paper users, who already have been considerably curtailed, must henceforth get along with only half the supply they are now receiving, thus saving 640,000 tons. Certain savings also will be effected in the import of ore, which now amounts to 8,000,000 tons annually, and kumber, which at present is 64,000,000

pusiness—the manufacture of explosives—which revolutionized modern industry, Alfred Nobel acquired a fortune which was estimated on his death at £2,000,000 He entertained views as to the unwisdom of leaving large sums to heirs, and in order to carry out his ideas concern-ing the distribution of wealth, he made a will in which he left the whole of his fortune to form a fund, the annual interest of which was to be divided into five annual prizes of £8,000 each. These prizes were to be awarded equally among the men who made the greatest scoveries, in the demands of physical science, chemistry, or medicine, the writer "who produced the greatest work of literature of an idealistic tendency," and, finally, to the man "who shall have done the most or the best work for the fraternity of nations, the suppression or reduction of standing armies, and the ormation and propagation of Peace

Needless almost to say, it is the Peace Prize which has attracted by far the most attention throughout the world. It was intended to be a lasting monument to Nober's devotion to the cause of in-ternational peace. At one time, indeed, he is said to have remarked that he tune to founding this prize. In his will, however, it ranked last of the five obects among which his fortune was equal-Nobel's Ideal.

His idea was thus expressed:—"I would like to dispose of most of my fortune in founding a prize to be given to whoever had made Europe make the greatest advance towards the idea of uni-
