REPORTS received today tell of estern part of New Brunswick last ight, with trees blown down, barns verturned and other damage done. There was also an electrical demonstorm was not severe. Despatches from the U. S. report temperatures as high as 107, with scores of deaths and some cople driven insane. The Saint John temperature today, in contrast, ranged from 55 to 77.

While Saint John had a somewhat mild visitation from last night's electrical storm, other parts of the province were not so fortunate. The storm assumed cyclonic proportions in the northwestern part of the province and elsewhere, according to information received at local leadquarters of the N. B. Telephone Company, considerable damage to the lines in York and Carleton counties is reported. The wind storm has been reported from those districts to have been one of the worst in the memory of the inhabitants, though lasting only a short time.

On the road between Frederictor and Springhill, a distance of five miles, it large trees were blown down, carrying with them the telephone company's wires at different places along the highway. A crew of men were rushed to the scene late last night, and the system will be in normal working order by this evening.

A great deal of trouble was reported on the lines between the capital and Woodstock, but normal conditions had been restored this morning. In the vicinity of Florenceville, six poles and 28 spans of wire were down, and a special crew were kept busy all day getting the lines in order.

In the same district, it was reported that nine barns were blown down by the wind which assumed tremendous velocity and which has been described as the nearest approach to a cyclone ever experienced in that part of the province. Just prior to the storm there, the sky became as dark as ink and the clouds were so lowering as to appear to be almost touching the treetops.

One large cable was broken in Fredericton, but the local office reported this morning that this had been repaired and the entire system would be working in the usual way by tonight. Kingston peninsula came in for its share of the storm, the forked lightning display being described as very vivid and terrifying. The telephone company, however, reported only one line in rouble, and no reports have as yet been received as to any property damage or injuries to persons.

Two of the C. P. R. telegraph poles near Quispamsis were struck and one quite badly splintered by the bolt. Repairs were made this morning and at noon service was back to normal.

STORMS BRING RELIEF.

NEW YORK, July 28—Destructive storms brought weather relief today to New England and the Middle Atlantic States but increased by three-score the death toll from a heat wave that piled up new high temperature records.

Within 24 hours 57 deaths were added by heat and strom to Wednesday's toll of two-score killed in the east and mid-west. The mid-west got relief in rain and cooling breezes early yesterday, but the east sweltered until last night.

What Will The Rt. Hon. Mr. Meighen Say Tonight?

THE Premier of Canada, the Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, speaks

THE Premier of Canada, the Rt. Hon. Arthur Meighen, speaks tonight in the Imperial Theatre. He will have a great, an expectant, a vigilant audience.

What will he say, definitely and concretely, to meet the expectations, the hopes, the anxieties of Saint John, of New Brunswick, of the Maritimes at large?

To what definite lines of betterment for these provinces, to what measure of real justice, to what statesmanlike and courageous remedies for the Maritime situation will he commit himself and the party for which he speaks, so that we all may know what this general election holds for us in case Mr. Meighen and his supporters are in control of the next House of Commons?

These are questions to which tonight's meeting will furnish the answer. There is no disguising the fact that unless that answer is reasonably definite and satisfactory any party appeal for support, any analysis and arguments dealing with the Canadian political situation as a whole, will leave this public cold.

Whatever Hon. Mr. Meighen may say tonight, the city and province—and the whole Maritime division—will compare his

utterances with those to be made in this territory at a later date by the Rt. Hon. Mackenzie King, and the comparison will be close and exacting. For the people of the Maritime Provinces are asking today one question chiefly, and it is: "What Does this General Election Mean so far as These Provinces are? The people hereabouts know that the statements concerning the Maritimes made thus far in the campaign by both leaders have been vague and couched in generalities which by no means meet the case, and which are not marked by a true appreciation of the Maritime situation or by any real recognition of the Dominion-wide sentiment, so frequently and powerfully expressed, demanding that justice for New Brunswick, Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island which will give them the full fruits of partnership in this Confederation and that measure of contentment which is their due. utterances with those to be made in this territory at a later date

CHARLOTTETOWN RESOLUTIONS

AT CHARLOTTETOWN on November 6 last a highly representative conference, called together after much searching preliminary work, adopted eight resolutions dealing with the situation here under review. These resolutions set out the principal needs and demands of this division of Canada, specifying what we are asking from both political parties, in short from the Parliament of Canada. Let us summarize briefly:

briefly:

1.—That the Dominion Government should institute and finance an immediate and aggressive immigration policy specifically for the Maritime Provinces, continuing the same for not tewer than ten consecutive years; and that this policy involve adequate organization both overseas and in the Maritime Provinces.

2.—That in the opinion of this conference the Maritime Provinces should be conceded a revision in freight and express rates to modify the disabilities under which they labor in marketing their goods in other parts of Canada, detailed representations concerning which will be made to the Board of Railway Commissioners for Canada during the general freight rate investigation now being conducted by that body. (As to this matter, there is needed from the leaders of both parties a binding engagement that any beneficial judgments brought down by the Railway Commission will be implemented by Parliament under the leadership of the party which is dominant after September 14.)

3.—Resolved that in the opinion of this conference the equipment of the ports of the Maritime Provinces should not only meet present requirements but be well in advance of those of the future; and that in the interests of the whole country, and as a national undertaking, immediate steps should be taken by the Dominion Government to this end.

4—Resolved that in the opinion of this conference Maritime exporters and importers should, in order to compete in export markets, be granted a substantial reduction in existing rates to the nearest seaport, and the rates so established applied equally to and from Saint John, West Saint John, Halifax, Montreal and Quebec throughout

5.—That the federal Government be urged to make a much larger annual appropriation for the purpose of developing our fishery resources and for the expansion of export markets.

6.—That Canada should establish a much larger number of com-

petent trade commissioners to promote adequately her export and im-7.—That coking plants should be established at central points in

7.—That coking plants should be established at central points in Canada and render unnecessary the importation of American anthracite; and that legislation should be passed looking to an expansion of the markets for the coal of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick and Alberta.

8.—That the disabilities of Prince Edward Island with regard to trade and commerce should be modified by the erection of needed frost-proof warehouses and the construction of deep-water terminal facilities; that another car ferry steamer be built and put into service; that the C. N. R. service from Sackville to the Island points be brought up to date, and that the cost of the present and the enlarged ferry service be charged to the consolidated resure of Canada.

Commissioner Bullock Favors Frequent Conferences On Taxation Matters

COMMISSIONER T. H. BULLOCK of the Saint John harbor and ferry department is naturally gratified with the handsome total of taxes collected in the last few days under handsome total of taxes collected in the last few days under the five per cent. discount allowance, but is cognizant of the unrest in the public mind over recent large increases in the general levy. 



Why Do Parents Prefer Boys to Girls, When Daughters are Usually So Much More Dutiful Than Sons?—And Why, When an Adopted Child is Desired, Do Foster-Parents Specify a Girl Baby?

THE other day the newspapers told the story of a man who killed himself because the stork brought him a girl instead of the boy baby he had ordered.



And probably 90 per cent. of those who read it sighed sympathetically and murmured, "Poor fellow!" instead of exclaiming indignantly, "Fool! He didn't know a good thing when he got it!"

For there is no denying that most fathers and mothers prefer sons to daughters, and probably the reason that God still keeps the matter of sex determination a secret from scientists is to prevent the girl supply from petering out entirely.

INDEED, we are all so fully committed to the old superstition that the male of the species is more desirable in the family than the female that our congratulations to the parents on the birth of a son have a fervor and a warmth that are wholly lacking when the new arrival is a daughter.

It is easy to see why boy babies should be at a premium among the nobility in countries where there are titles to be kept up and entailed extension against girls in this land of the free, where all that most children inherit is the right to get out and hustle for themselves.

Of course, the old objection to daughters was that they were a liability to a family, whereas boys were esteemed an asset. The girls had to be supported, while the boys could help support the parents.

But modern conditions have changed all this. Girls go to work quite as early as their brothers in these days, and if they do not earn as much money, they contribute far more to the family purse than the boys do. Indeed, parents make greater demands upon their daughters than they do upon their sons.

IN THE great majority of families in which both the sons and daughters are wage-earners mother makes the girls turn over their entire pay envelopes to her and she gives them out of it only such a small allowance as she sees fit, whereas she is content to have the boys pay her a certain amount as board and grants them the privilege of keeping all the remainder of their money for their own pleasures.

More than that, it is invariably the grils who fix up the house, who buy a new carpet and better furniture and make things generally more comfortable. The boys take their pleasures away from home. They don't care whether mother has a new cooking stove or not, and it doesn't worry them any that the paper is hanging in festoons and there isn't a comfortable chair in the house.

BESIDE giving her money to the support of the home the daughter gives her personal service. She may work just as hard as her brother and have far less physical strength, but mother expects her to help with the dinner when she comes home at night and to keep her own room in order, do her own mending and lend a hand with the younger children.

But mother would not dream of such a thing as asking son to wash the dishes or even make up his own bed.

ALSO it is the daughters that parents have to depend upon to take care of them in their old age. No proverb is truer than that which says, "My son is my son till he gets him a wife; my daughter all of her life."

IT IS to the daughter that the forlorn old father and mother turn in their hour of need and it is she who gives them a place at her fireside, who nurses them and puts up with their peculiarities as no daughter-in-law would do and as few sons would have the patience to do.

A man gets absorbed in his work, in his ambitions, in his family, so that he often forgets his parents and does not even take the trouble to write to them; but it is very rarely that a daughter ever fails in affection or in her duty to her father and mother.

THERE was a time when ambition led parents to desire a son instead of a daughter because they hoped that the son would make great achievements that would reflect honor upon them. Today a girl baby is a better bet in the futurity races than a boy because she has a double chance of shedding luster on her family. She may gain distinction by her own efforts or she may marry fame and fortune.

A girl has just as good a chance of becoming a distinguished writer or actor or movie star or artist as a boy has. She has almost an equal chance of making money and she surely is quite as likely to marry a millionaire or the President of the United States as her brother is to become a millionaire or to be elected President.

PERHAPS, however, the most curious feature of this preference for boy babies is that it only exists when the boy is one's own begotten son. When it is a case of an adopted child, girls are in demand and boys are not wanted.

If the expectant father and mother could decide the sex of a child nine times out of ten they would choose a boy. But when they pick out the sort of a child they want they nearly always take a girl, as they will tell you in orphan asylums, where the demand for girl babies is always greater than the supply and where they have the hardest sort of time to get homes for boy babies.

Now, how do you explain that?

MONCTON, N.B., July 22.—Facing his first Maritime audience of the campaign, Premier Meighen tonight submitted his policies for the Maritimes. He summed up the difficulties of the Maritime Provinces as two-fold:

If not altogether."

Mr. Meighen asked what the King government had done to assist the Maritime served to the rest of the country. That
