## TIMELY RAIN HELPS WESTERN CROPS, BUT GRAIN NEEDS MORE OF IT

C. P. R. Report From Gereral Districts Gives Varied Outlooks.

Winnipeg, July 22-Liberal rainfalls juring the last week have brought retief to the grain crops in many sections of western Canada's crop area, but there are still districts in Sas-katchewan and Alberta where rain is urgently needed and in some instances the situation is critical, according to a crop report issued by the agricuitural department of the C. P. R. here today. Heavy rains in the province of Mani-

Heavy rains in the province of Manitoba have greatly improved prospects and the general outlook is now decidedly more encouraging. This province gives promise of an average crop.

Saskatchewan—During the week a fair amount of moisture fell over southern portions of the province and conditions are good except for portions in the southwest, which are still in need of more rain. Northern and central Saskatchewan did not experience sufficient to benefit the crops to any appreciable extent, with the result that the major portion of the crops in this

sufficient to benefit the crops to any appreciable extent, with the result that the major portion of the crops in this territory have deprecated anywhere from 35 to 50 per cent. and the best of growing conditions will have to prevail for the balance of the season to assure a crop of even those proportions. Even in these districts, though, there are some good fields to be seen, purticularly in the northeast.

Alberta—The outlook in Alberta has greatly changed since the last report. While rains have been more or iess general throughout the province during the week, these arrived too late to be of material benefit. In parts of scuthern Alberta the crop situation is considered very critical. It is estimated that the crop in the south will be 33 per cent. or less below last year, depending on rains from now on. In the balance of the province yields will be light and straw short.

—Completion of the first million-dollar endowment fund ever to be established at a college for negroes is announced by Dr. Fayette Avery McKenzie, president of Fisk University, which began its career in an army barracks in Nashville procured by General Clinton B. Fisk in January, 1866.

This fund has been made possible by matching a conditional offer of \$500,000 from the General Education Board of New York. Among those contributing are the Carnegic Corporation of New York which gave \$250,000; the John F. Slater Fund of Charlottesville, Va.; the J. C. Penney Foundation of New York and prominent individuals in New York, Philadelphia, Chicago, Cleveland and Boston.

Anticipating the successful completion of the \$1,000,000 endowment fund, the citizens of Nashville organized this spring to raise a supplementary fund of \$50,000 for Fisk. This is the first time that any such sum has been contributed by any southern city for any type of negro education. Among the leaders in this local campaign are bankers, business men, educators and clergymen.

The income of the endowment fund is to be expliced exclusively to teachers' salaries.



The union consists of representatives from the various League of Nations societies in nearly all of the leading countries of the world, including several that are not members of the league, such as the United States, Germany and Russia.

In addition the United States will have representation through several international organizations to which various American societies on behalf of the league belong.

Perhaps the most important of these is the Interparliamentary Union, which has been officially invited by the United States senate to hold its 1925 congress in the United States. The American member on the council of this organization for the present is Theodore E. Burton.

The Interparliamentary Union will begin its annual conference this year at Berne on August 22, but immediately following adjournment on the 28th, the entire conference will come to Geneva for an official visit to the secretariat and the assembly. A commission will then be appointed to remain at Geneva and follow the deliberations of the Assembly throughout its entire session.







During the past season, which closed yesterday in a burst of glory on the Seine with an Olympic victory, Yale proved that it had one of the greatest, most powerful and versatile crews that ever dipped an oar into the water. Regardless of weather conditions or distance, the Yale oarsmen measured up to the assignment before them. From the opening regatta on May 3, in which Yale won decisively over Pennsylvania and Columbia on the Housatonic River at Derby, Conn., until yesterday afternoon, Yale never tasted defeat. It was consistent at all times and never for an instant gave any indication of the slighest weakening.

It never can be said of the 1924 Yale crew under Coach Ed. Leader that it was not willing to meet the best that the rowing world offered. Sportsmen the world over cannot forget the sportsmanship of the Yale rowing officials in consenting to allow the Blue crew to interrupt training for the four-mile race against Harvard in order to take part in the Olympic tryouts at Philadelphia over the mile and one-quarter distance, against the greatest crews in the East, two of which were rated with the best in rowing, notably the Navy Officers, which won the Olympic honors in 1920, and the strong Navy varsity crew. In addition the winning Penn crew, which won the Childs Cup and the Navy Cup this year, also was listed among the crews in the Olympic tryouts.



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
