

Reports coming in from several reliable sources indicate that business is improving. Not in a spectacular way, but gradually. One of the best-known furniture manufacturers this week that their plant was operating on a ten-hour perday basis, and that work had been quite steady since July. Prospects for the 1922 trade were quite satisfactory, judging from the volume of orders that were in sight now. Another firm, this one in London, making a number of metal and enamel lines, state they are trying right now to so shape their 1922 programme so that they can bring their costs down to the consumer. This firm claims that manufacturing costs are not appreciably less than they were in the last year, although it is easier to buy raw materials at a lower figure. Then there is the uninterrupted supply of material, which is quite an item, as it allows of planning for work in advance and also for quantity production. The real reason behind the effort of this company to get its selling prices down is that it wants to keep its customers coming into the market instead of staying out. The firm has a big business in Western Canada where low prices for high cost crops and crop failures have helped to reduce for the present the buying power of many of the people.

The firm that takes this view of the situation is building for the future. It is convinced that its goods are needed in Western Canada, and realizes as well that many who would buy are not doing so because their purchasing power is low. The nearer a company can come to meeting the buying possibilities of its clientele the nearer it is to actual sales and a retention of the customer's confidence.



City Council Approves of the Water and Sewer Renewals.

Cost will be About \$33,000-No Action on Mill Pond only three marriages. Matter—Delay in Renewal of Carmarthen Street Main -City Forester's Report.

were approved at a special committee meeting of the common council today, as part of the city's emergency efforts to relieve the unemployment situation here.

The work is scattered about the city and it is planned to make a start on some of the interval of the local British export trade. On account of the frost danger, it was decided to abandon for the present the work of renewing the 16-inch water main in Carmarthen street and King street east. The matter of building a trunk sewer through the Carleton mill pound and the filling in of the pond was reported on but no action taken. The mayor and all the commissioners were present.

"Owing to the dangers arising through frost getting to the gates and pipes, the freezing of services, the chilling of lead in the joints and the disruption of the system, through the cutting out of a main in zero weather when every pipe is needed to supply the excessive demands made upon them by the citizens in allowing water to run to waste, it would seem unwise to undertake the renewal of any water main such as King and Carmarthen streets during the months of one each.

"The renewal of some of our old wooden sewers which are in bad shape, the laying of a new eight-inch water main along the south side of King street east between Carmarthen and Wentworth and the new eight-inch main, in conjunction with a sewer in Moore street and Millidge street, could be undertaken at once as a measure of relief for the unemployed, and at the same time be of value to the department.
