



Now we hear urgent and wheat crops. Now we hear urgent appeals from the food controllers in Engnd, the United States and Canada to

land, the United States and Canada to save both meat and bread.

It is most probable that further and drastic restrictions will be placed on the consumption of foods this year, and it therefore becomes necessary for all to give serious thought as to how they can produce food products.

The farmers are doing their utmost with the limited labor available to make the farms produce as much as possible; the backyard and town lot gardeners are well organized, but business and professional men in cities, towns, and villages might possibly do more, by helping direct and finance specific efforts at production.

production.

Any staple food that has keeping qualities is desirable. Probably the best is beans. The bean combines the qualities of meat and vegetables. It is 24 per cent proteid, or higher in that essential quality than beef. It will not freeze as will potatoes and other vegetables. It will not sprout, as will onlons, and it will not rot. If kept dry it will keep for a year or more. The price of beans will remain high as long as prices of meats are high, for it is the best substitute for meats. Beans can always be exchanged for other foods:

Liquor, Beer, Tobacco, Matches and Sugar to Pay More; Increase in Demand from Incomes; Nation Backs Chancellor

London, April 23-The most stupendous budget in British history was received yesterday by the House of Commons and new taxes were greeted there without a murmur. to £800, instead of £700, as at present.

According to the new taxation, the supertax would be four shillings six pence in the pound instead of three shillings six pence and would begin with incomes amounting to £2,500 instead of £3,000. The chancellor said that farmers would be taxed on the assumption that their profits are twice their rentals. The present law assumes that a farmer's income is exactly equal to his rental.

The spirit duty would be increased from fourteen shillings, nine pence a gallon, to thirty shillings, bringing in £5,500,000. The beer duty would be raised from twenty-five to fifty shillings a barrel and would bring in £9,700,000. He had no doubt that at the prices to be fixed by the food controller, the trade could bear the burden and still make a good profit.

The tobacco duty would be raised from six shillings five pence to eight shill-

Tobacco was under the control of the tobacco controller and the result of the increased tax would be that the retail price would be fixed at two pence more an ounce, not all of which, however, would come out of the consumer. Under this new scale the import of 6,000 tons of tobacco would give a revenue of £5,500,000 this year. There would be a small additional duty on matches, bringing in £600,000. The surar tax would be increased by eleven shillings eight pence a hundred weight, which would bring in this year £12,400,-000 and in a full year £18,200,000.



DEFECTS IN FLIERS

That a startling percentage of men now being accepted for air service have hidden physical weaknesses that may prove their undoing, is indicated by new scientific tests that have been made on a large number of newly enlisted airmen, says John Anson Ford in the May Popular Mechanics Magazine. These tests, which reveal so much of vital import for our armies, have been made by a Chicago specialist, Captain Charles Moore Robertson of the Medical Reserve Corps, who has fitted up for the purpose a cabinet in which each filer-to-be was placed and subjected to atmospheric conditions identical, so far as pressure is concerned, with those obtaining in flying, the

air being rarefied by means of a power-ful pump.

Each man was examined both before Each man was examined both before and after being confined in the cabinet, each examination consisting in taking the blood pressure, ascertaining the muscle tone by measuring the duration of one nerve impulse with a dynamometer and stop watch, and in revolving the subject in a pivoted chair.

The records show that the first exami nations gave no indication of the condi-tion that would exist after the "flight," over 25 per cent of the men proving un-fit, according to these tests. For this reason, it is strongly contended that a most serious mistake is being made in accepting men for air service merely on the basis of a physical examination made without taking into account the effect of sudden changes of air pressure.


