Civil Action To Recover Valley Railway Money

Bill Introduced in Legislature by Hon. Mr. Byrne—The Game Law and Other Matters

Fredericton, N. B., April 22—The first step towards the recovery of the hundreds of thousands of dollars which went via the Valley railway route to private pockets was taken by the government today when a bill relating to this matter was introduced into the legislature.

The bill introduced today is described as "an act to assist and enable his Majesty the King to recover monies illegally or improperly withheld or retained."

This result is made easier of achievement as a result of the provisions of the bill which remove any doubt which might exist as to the interest of the province in the monies involved.

Hon. Mr. Byrne introduced a bill entitled "An act to assist and enable His Majesty the King to recover money illegally or improperly withheld or retained."

Hon. Mr. Foster presented the report of the committee on the bill. He stated that the bill was introduced on the 15th of April, 1917, and that it had been referred to the committee on the 16th of the same month.
