### ALUMINUM RECTIFIER

A rectifier, of electrolytic type, used for converting alternating current into direct current. A single cell consists of two plates, one being of sheet lead and the other of sheet aluminum, these plates being immersed in a maturated solution of borax. To regulate the potential of the alternating current applied to the rectifier a transformer is connected between the power line and the rectifier. The operation of the rectifier is dependent upon the formation of an insulating film on the plates which allows current to flow from the lead to the aluminum plate, but not in the other direction. This type of rectifier may be used for charging storage batteries and when operated in conjuction with a filter may serve as a source of plate power supply or to furnish power for the operation of a loud speaker.

STATOR

The stationary member of an electrical device which possesses in addition rotating element; for example, in the vario-coupler, the primary, tapped, coil wound either on a tube or on a spherical form, is stationary and is known as the "stator." The secondary coil which may be rotated on a shaft in inductive relation to the primary coil, is known as the "rotor."

ETHER

An invisible elastic fluid which is said by scientists to pervade all space and through which vibratory disturbances are transmitted. These vibrations may be heat, light or radio waves and the extreme elasticity and conveying power of this medium permits these waves to be transmitted through it at the rate of speed of 186,000 miles per second or 300,000,000 meters per second.

### "C" BATTERY

A low voltage battery usually consisting of a number of small dry cells of the flashlight type. This battery is used for the purpose of maintaining the grid of the vacuum tube at a negative potential with respect to the flament. The battery is inserted in the grid current with the negative terminal connected to the grid and the amount of blasing potential impressed upon the grid may vary from 1.5 volts to 20 volts depending upon the operating conditions. This type of battery has a service life of six to ten months as it is not used as a source of current supply but merely as a means of obetaining a proper value of negative potential on the grid. When used in conjunction with amplifier tubes the "C" battery by preventing the gird from becoming positive at any time, secures amplification of the radio signal without distortion.



An electrical device for converting alternating current into direct current or vice versa. 





POEM IDENTIFIES SOLDIER. He Had Previously Lain Unknown in a French Grave. A typewritten poem, found on the body of an American soldier killed near Binarville, France, proved recent-ly the means of identifying the body as that of Thomas O'Keefe, Company D, 806th Machine Gun Battalion, Sev-enty-seventh Division. By tracing the poem to its author and checking over the lists of the Twenty-seventh Divi-sions, searchers ultimately found the widow of the missing soldier, who posi-tively identified other articles found on the body. Records of the Graves Registration Service show that when the body was taken from its battlefield resting place it was believed to be that of Corporal Logan Wheeler, Company D, 364th In-fantry, known to have been killed near the spot. The poem, however, bore the name of the author, Charles Scott, and he was located in New York City. He had written it, he said, while with the New York National Guard on the Max-lcan border, in 1916, but he did not know how a copy might have reached France. 




