# VALENCIENNES BOTTLED UP BY CANADIANS

Both Sides of City

MAIN ATTACK FROM SOUTH

Terrific Canadian Barrage to Crush Resistance Quickly and Save Lives of Allied Soldiers-Only Miracle or Early Retirement Will Save German Force

With the British Army in France and Belgium, Nov. 1—(By the Associated Press)—Valenciennes today was bottled up as the result of a lightning blow by the British on both sides of the city. Only immediate retirement from the place or something in the nature of a miracle can save the German troops, who at noon had only a narrow gateway open to them for retreat toward the east.

The main attack at Valenciennes was south of the city, just above Famars. The Canadians, who engineered the drive, were supported by one of the heaviest artillery bombardments of the war. The gunfire was terrific, and this made the going easy for the overseas infantry which followed.

#### Contracts For 31 Steel Steamers To Be Built In Canada

Ottawa, Nov. 2—Supplementary to previous announcements in connection with the government's shipbuilding programme, Hon. C. C. Ballantyne, minister of marine and fisheries, announced last night that a contract has now been placed with the several shipbuilding yards in Canada for the construction of thirty-one steel steamers, ranging in ton nage from 3,400 to 8,100 tons dead weight capacity. In addition to the types of vessels for which contracts have been placed, plans and specifications for a larger type of 10,500 tons are in course of preparation, and it is expected that contracts for the construction of several vessels of this type will be placed in the near future at Halifax and possibly at Vancouver.

Allies Laid Down Drastic Conditions and Ward Enemy Forced to Accept Them; No Secret Understandings

London, Nov. 1-The armistice accepted by Turkey amounts to "complete

This statement was made by Lord Robert Cecil, assistant secretary of state for foreign affairs, to the Associated Press tonight.

Lord Robert emphasized the statement of the foreign office to the Associated Press by saying that "no secret undertakings or engagements have been made with Turkey as far as the British government is concerned." He added that the armistice had been signed by Great Britain on behalf of

Discussing conditions in Germany, Lord Robert said the indications of the last day or two were that the Pan-Germans were losing their hold. He declared that no Bolshevism had been reported in Germany, but that it

was spreading in a part of Austria. With reference to rumors circulating here to the effect that the armistic with Turkey included clauses by which Turkey would retain sovereignty over Armenia and other provinces, the Foreign office authorizes the statement that there is no truth in the suggestion that any secret political agreement is annexed to the armistice with Turkey.

CONDITIONS OF TURKSIH SURRENDER.

The terms of the armistice granted by the Allied Powers to Turkey follow: "First—The opening of the Dardanelles and the Bosphorus and access to the Black Sea. Allied occupation of the Bosphorus forts.

"Second-The positions of all mine fields, torpedo tubes and other obstruc tions in Turkish waters are to be indicated, and assistance given to sweep or "Third-All available information concerning mines in the Black Sea is to

"Fourth-All Allied prisoners of war and Armenian interned persons and prisoners are to be collected in Constantinople and handed over unconditionally

"Fifth-Immediate demobilization of the Turkish army, except such troops as are required for surveillance on the frontiers and for the maintenance of in-

ternal order. The number of effectives and their disposition to be determined later by the Allies after consultation with the Turkish government, "Sixth—The surrender of all war vessels in Turkish waters or waters occupied by Turkey. These ships will be interned in such Turkish port or ports as

may be directed except such small vessels as are required for police and similar purposes in Turkish territorial waters. Eeventh-The Allies to have the right to occupy any strategic points in the

event of any situation arising which threatens the security of the Allies.

Eighth—Free use by Allied ships of all ports and anchorages now in Turkish occupation and denial of their use by the enemy. Similar conditions are to apply to Turkish mercantile shipping in Turkish waters for the purpose of trade and the demobilization of the army. "Ninth-Allied occupation of the Taurus tunnel system.

"Tenth-Immediate withdrawal of Turkish troops from northern Persia to behind the pre-war frontier already has been ordered and will be carried out. "Eleventh-A part of Transcaucasia already has been ordered to be evacuated by Turkish troops. The remainder to be evacuated, if required by the Allies after they have studied the situation.

"Twelfth-Wireless, telegraph and cable stations to be controlled by the Allies. Turkish government messages to be excepted. "Thirteenth-Prohibition against the destruction of any naval, military or

"Fourteenth-Facilities are to be given for the purchase of coal, oil, fuel, and naval material from Turkish sources, after the requirements of the country

have been met. None of the above materials are to be exported. Fifteenth-The surrender of all Turkish officers in Tripolitania and Cyrenaica to the nearest Italian garrison. Turkey agrees to stop supplies and communications with these officers if they do not obey the order to surrender.

"Sixteenth-The surrender of all garrisons in Hedjaz, Assir, Yemen, Syria and Mesopotamia, to the nearest Allied commander, and withdrawal of Turkish troops from Cilicia, except those necessary to maintain order, as will be deter-

Seventeenth—The use of all ships and repair facilities at all Turkish ports

"Eighteenth-The surrender of all ports occupied in Tripolitania and Cyrenaica, including Misurata, to the nearest Allied garrison. "Nineteenth-All Germans and Austrians, naval, military or civilian, to be cuated within one month from Turkish dominions and those in remote

icts as soon after that time as may be possible. Twentieth-Compliance with such orders as may be conveyed for the disposal of that portion of the Turkish army which is demobilized under class five, "Twenty-first-An Allied representative to be attached to the Turkish min-

istry of supplies in order to safeguard Allied interests. This representative to be furnished with all aid necessary for this purpose. "Twenty-second-Turkish prisoners are to be kept at the disposal of the Allied powers. The release of Turkish civilian prisoners and prisoners over

military age is to be considered. "Twenty-third-An obligation on the part of Turkey to cease all relations with the Central Powers.

"Twenty-fourth-In case of disorder in the six Armenian vilayets the Allies reserve to themselves the right to occupy any part of them. "Twenty-lifth-Hostilities between the Allies and Turkey shall cease from noon, local time, Thursday, October 31, 1918."

# MAY BE A NAVAL FIGHT IN BLACK SEA

Old Russian Fleet Believed Effective Under German Ownership; Sweeping of the Dardanelles Begun

London, Nov. 1—(By the Associated Press)—A large fleet of the latest types of British mine sweepers today began the tedious task of clearing the Dardanelles of mines and other obstructions. This work, together with other safe guards which the Allies consider to be necessary before the Allied fleet enters the tortuous waterway leading past Constantinople and through the Bosphorus to the Black Sea, will take several days in the opinion of the British admiralty. A fortnight ago the Allied fleet tested the efficiency of the forts inside the Dardanelles by dropping a few shells on them. The reply of the Turks was quickly and fairly accurate, showing that the fortifications are still probably in good shape. The fifty mile passage through the waterway is a veritable sea of mines and other obstructions, which it

will require some little time to remove. Deposits by the public in the banks at the close of August amounted to \$1,569,618,382, or \$177,031,302 more than a year ago. The available funds of other financial institutions are somewhat larger than they were prior to the last loan. These resources are larger than ever before in the financial history of the country and if our total subscriptions last year exceeded \$420,000,000, the people are much better able this year to furnish the sum required.

"The news from the front is of a very encouraging character, thanks to the supreme efforts being made by our men, efforts, however, which may have to be sustained for an indefinite period until the foe is absolutely conquered. While over here we place our trust in the men the battle line, a trust that we have revery reason to know has not been misplaced, on the other hand our men and their leaders over there depend on us for effective and adequate support in such matters as the Victory Loan. Cooley and was the first woman to be selected superintendent of schools in one of the largest American cities. As head of the public schools of Chicago she was intrusted with the education of 300,000 children.

She inaugurated many important reforms, among these being the teaching of sex hygiene, the enlargement of the kindergarten course and increase in the scope of the vocational training department and simplification of the serviculure of the primary grades.

She was aggressive and possessed great executive ability. She insisted upon the complete divorce of politics from the public schools and fought many successful battles in support of this principle.

In 1913 a faction of the Chicago school board planned to oust her from her position as superintendent. She anticipated the move by suddenly resigning. Mayor Harrison was appealed to by the public to have her withdraw her resignation and return to her official duties although she was nearly 70 years old at the time.

Mrs. Young declined to return unless her enemics on the school board retired. Mayor Harrison was obliged to accept the resignation of five trustees before Mrs. Young would again assume her official duties. She triumphed in every clash she had with the politicians in the school board affairs.







# Allied Troops Violently LAPP'S TRIBUTE Attacking The Enemy

New York, Nov. 1—The Associated Press tonight issued the following: From the mountain regions of northern Italy to the plain of Venetia and on salient sectors in Belgium and France the armies of the Teutonic Allies are being violently attacked by troops of the Entente.

In Italy, except on several sectors in the hill country, the enemy is fast being overwhelmed; in both Belgium and France additional splendid gains have been recorded in favor of the Entente.

In Serbia the Austrians and Germans are fast making their way out of the little kingdom, many of them already having crossed the Danube. French and Serbian cavalry have reached Belgrade, from where a fast turning movement westward along the Save river is likely to work havoc with those of the enemy forces coming northward in wester n Serbia and those who are struggling northward through Albania.
