The brilliant light of the electric arc is found to be much less dangerous to the eyes than was for some time believed. So high a medical authority as the London Lancet reports that but one case of serious injury from expo-sure to the dazzling light has come under its notice, and in that instance the exposure was unusually severe and

In St. Petersburg use has been made of electricity in pumping water, with a view of making it serviceable, in putting out fires. The experiments seem to have been satisfactory. The same current used for lighting a building may thus furnish power for throwing water on the flames in case it should take fire. Such an application ought to be especially valuable in the case of theatres and other buildings where large numbers of people assemble, and where the prompt introduction of a stream of water might be the means of averting a great loss of human life.

Enthusiasts who make a special study of sun-spots and attendant phenomena believe that the corner-stone of a new science is now being laid by the discovery of an intimate connection be tween terrestrial storms and activity of the heated gases surrounding the sun. Just what the connection is they are not yet able to clearly define, although electricity is suspected of being the agent through which the effects are nanifested upon our planets. It is known that the gaseous envelope of the sun is affected by eruptions of such prodigious magnitude as to be utterly beyond our power of conception, these disturbances appearing to us in the form of rapidly changing spots on the solar disk. The spots come and go at remarkably regular intervals, a complete cycle of the various stages of activity from maximum to minimum and again to maximum being performed in about eleven years-the so-called "sun spot period." The present year has been one of great solar convulsions, and sunspot physicists have been taking measures to vertify theories that sun-storms produce a marked effect upon the earth and its inhabitants. Their views seem to be strongly confirmed. While the present has been a year of violent terrestrial storms and earthquakes, these scientists claim to have proven by simultaneous observation, a correspondence between minor meteorological phenomena and changes upon the sun. The eminent meteorologist, Prof. Piazzi Smith, Astronomer Royal for Scotland, with many others, are of the opinion that the state of the sun will some day become an important factor in weather

forecasts and similar calculations.

One of Proctor's most interesting lectures treats of astronomical time and the ages of the planets, commencing with the earth. From the different geological features of the earth's surface, it has been computed that the formation of its crust must have alone occupied 100,000,000 years. Such is the estimate formed by Crowe and forecasts and similar calculations. the estimate formed by Crowe and accepted by Sir Charles Lyell. From the investigations of various physicists and experiments by Bischaff, it is found that 350,000,000 years must have elapsed while the earth was cooling from 2000 degrees to 200 degrees of temperaexisted for a long period in a nebulous DOORS, condition. The earth may, therefore, be fairly assumed to be 500,000,000 For In years old-and this is considered as erring to the side of deficiency rather than to excess. Comparing this planet with Jupiter, on the principle that the larger a body is, the longer must be its time of cooling, it is calculated that it will be 3,500,000,000 years before Jupiter reaches the stage our planet has now attained. Ten times as long a period must pass before the sun arrives at a similar condition. The moon was in this relative period of her existence 420,000,000 years ago. If any planet is of nearly the same age as the earth it is Venus. Mars is older, Mercury is older still; the moon, the oldest of all. The features of Venus must nearly resemble those of the earth. Mars is about equally divided into land and water, and must have an atmosphere. The moon bictures the earth's future condition. It is a dead world. It has neither water, clouds, nor atmosphere.

But, as the earth is \$1 times larger than its satellite, while it has thirteen times as much surface, about 2,500,000,-000 years will be required for it to arrive at the moon's present condition. Following out this theory, we greatly reduce the number of planets on which life is possible. In our solar system we have only the earth, possibly Venus, and, it may be, some of the satellites.
