WINTER PORT TRADE BOOMING

Three Million Dollars Increase Over Last Year.

Nearly \$16,000,000 Exports This Year—Tonnage has Increased by Over 50,000 Tons.

An unofficial statement of the winter port business done during the season just closed shows an increase of nearly three millions dollars in the value of the exports over last season's. During the season ninety-eight steamers arrived at this port with a net tonnage of 350,188 tons, a gain of 50,116 tons over last year.

Of these, two steamers left port in ballast, the Dalhousie for Brunswick, Georgia, and the Nordbeon to Hopeville Cape. The others took out local cargo for a total valuation of \$15,878,189 of which \$10,155,313 was the value of Canadian goods. The valuation of outward cargo for the season of 1903 and 1904 of \$2,735,711.

Four steamships went to Cape Town, South Africa, viz., Orleans, Gulf of Venice, Canada Cape and the Wyandotte, their cargoes were worth \$72,727.

The steamship Montezuma carried away the most valuable cargo of the season, \$468,000. The next in value was one which went on the Lake Manitoba, \$469,107.

During the whole season not a hitch occurred nor an accident of any kind to any of the steamers. The harbor was all the time as open as in summer, while Boston and Portland harbors were at times almost choked with ice. With the provision of the new facilities provided for next year, St. John looks forward with confidence to beating even this splendid record.

A DAY'S MURDERS.

Two Men Killed by Police—Prominent Merchant Shot and Killed by a Woman.

SHERIDAN, Texas, May 5.—John Stevenson, proprietor of the Prince Club, of this city, and Mr. R. White, an employee, were killed in a shooting affray yesterday with Deputy Sheriff Burris and Foreman Oscar Kirk and Bob Parsons. The officers had entered Stevenson's place in search of two negroes, for whom a prominent merchant, last night in the street. The cause of the shooting is not known.

17,000 KILLED.

Another Big Battle at Kiu Kien Cheng --- 10,000 Japs and 7,000 Russians Killed.

LONDON, May 5.—4.02 p.m.—A despatch to the Central News from St. Petersburg, says a rumor is current there that a second battle has been fought at Kiu Kien Cheng, in which the Russians lost was 7,000, the Japanese loss 10,000 men, and resulted in the Japanese being driven back in disorder.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 5, 2.16 p.m.—There are persistent rumors here of a naval engagement between the Vice-Admiral Kamamura's squadron, but no confirmation of the report has been received here up to date of clock this afternoon. The admiralty says no further news has been received here.

LONDON, May 5.—A despatch to the Central News agency, dated Seoul, Tuesday, says: "Heavy cannonading was heard off Gensan (on the east coast of Korea) Monday and this morning. It is supposed that Admiral Goto's fleet succeeded in engaging the Russian Vladivostok squadron."

ST. PETERSBURG, May 5.—General Kuropatkin has gone to the front from Liao Yang to inspect the situation personally. Troops are being hurried forward from the Liao Yang and Mukden line to a position near Peng Wang Cheng. All the Russian wounded have been sent back toward Liao Yang to encumber the operations of the Russian army. It appears evident that General Kuropatkin is preparing to give battle to General Kuroki's army if circumstances warrant. Private reports are to the effect that the position of the Russians is up, and that they are thirsting for an opportunity to revenge the slaughter on the Yalu. Although the commander in chief is greatly chagrined at the miscarriage of his plans on the Yalu there is no idea here that he will act rashly on that account. His decision as to the extent of the opposition he will meet in the direction of the Japanese plans and success of Japanese landings in Manchuria. Attempted landings are momentarily expected near New Chang and the head of Korea Bay.

KUROPATKIN'S PROBLEM.

Occupying a fighting line and pursuing the tactics of Napoleon, Kuropatkin's problem will be to prevent a correct line of the direction, strength and whence the other column will come before deciding how to fight his adversary in detail. It is believed here that the Japanese plans for concerted action have been delayed by their failure to close the entrance of Port Arthur Tuesday and a repetition of the attack on the Russian Gibraltar is momentarily expected. Vice-Admiral Goto's fleet was sighted off Port Arthur last night and, indeed, confirmed rumors are that fighting is now in progress there.

AT LEAST THE CUTTING OFF OF PORT ARTHUR is not the fate of the fortress, depends, in the opinion of the general staff, upon General Kuropatkin's presence at a juncture of the Japanese forces.

DEPUTY MAYOR'S BROTHER DEAD.

Deputy Mayor Hamm received this morning the sad intelligence that his brother, David Hamm, had died at his home, Grand Bay. Death occurred this morning, the immediate cause being kidney trouble. Deceased was seventy-six years of age. For the past twenty years he has been post master at Grand Bay. Deputy Mayor Hamm is the only relative surviving.

AN AMERICAN CUP-HUNTER.

LONDON, May 5.—The racing schooner yacht Ingomar (owned by Commodore Martin F. Plant, of the Leamington Yacht Club), arrived off the Lizard at 11.5 a.m. The Ingomar, which is sailed by Charles Barr, captain of the Reliance during the America's cup races last year, will take part in regattas in British and German waters this year.

THE PLAGUE IN JOHANNESBURG.

JOHANNESBURG, May 5.—The bubonic plague has re-appeared in the heart of the town. Two cases have been detected in the market which has been ordered closed.

IS PORT ARTHUR BLOCKED OR NOT?

PORT ARTHUR, May 4.—The enemy's ships were visible, cruising on the horizon this evening, a fresh attack is anticipated. It was reported in the latest attempt to block the entrance to the harbor. The vessels of eight of those have been definitely located. The position of two others are not yet known and the remaining are unable to withstand the terrific fire of the Russian guns, turned back. The average tonnage of the vessels exceeded 2,000 tons. They were the Shibata, Koura, Asagao, Mikawa, Totomi, Fudosen, Yedo, Nagato, Otsuma, Sagami, Akokawa and Sohma (The despatch makes no mention, it will be noticed on that point, that the harbor was not reported from Port Arthur expressly stating that the attack had failed to close the channel).
