Arrival of the English Mail.

The English mail with London papers to the 3rd, and Liverpool to the 11th inst, arrived here yesterday morning by way of Windsor, per steamer North America. The steam ship Columbia arrived at Halifax on Tuesday morning, after a fine passage of 10 days and 17 hours from Liverpool.

CHINA.

It was reported that the war had recommenced in China, and that the Forts of the Bogos, and the Factory Canton, were taken by the English on the 25th of February.

The British ministers were defeated on the debate on Sugar duties by a majority of 36.

Lord Russell in his late expedition against Abul-Kader, was up in a boat, and drowned, a few days after he arrived there from England.

The political agitation in Ireland seems to increase.

Mr. O'Connell has addressed the people in another proclamation, in which he tells them that they are "in the throes of a great and important crisis," and they should be prepared to show themselves worthy of the name of Englishmen.

STATE OF TRADE.
