Flying Columns Still Hot in Pursuit of Shattered Armies of Enemy -- Constantinople Abandons Hope of Stemming Advance of Allies -- European Concert Treading Dangerous Ground -- Austria Watching Servian Activities.

B., Nov. 6.--The directors and shareholders of the Cobler Sexton Mining Co., Ltd., held a meeting in the town hall tonight to discuss whether they were willing to pass over their property to an outside company who offer to pay the Cobler Sexton Co. the amount of money spent on the mine. The offer was accepted.

Special to The Standard. Princeton, N. J., Nov. 6.--President-elect Woodrow Wilson turned away from an avalanche of telegrams and messages of congratulations for two hours today and went off for a brisk walk.

Ottawa, Nov. 6.--The Transcontinental Railway Commission has decided in public interest to operate the completed line of the National Transcontinental Railway in New Brunswick temporarily, i. e., until such time as the Grand Trunk Pacific Railway Company has applied for and been granted a lease of this section of the line under the terms of the National Transcontinental Railway Act.

New York, Nov. 6.--Only the uncertainty of a few close states whose electoral vote in no way can affect the election of Wilson and Marshall, kept the popular vote of the three presidential candidates and the completion of legislatures that will name United States senators, held interest tonight in the final returns of yesterday's general election.

been made to gather preliminary popular vote figures, that Gov. Wilson had not secured a majority of all votes, to figures nearly a million below a majority. The popular votes, however, will in no way affect his election, or his complete control of the total to be less than that of the combined vote for Roosevelt and Taft.

London, Nov. 6.--Bulgaria is giving the broken Turkish army no time to recuperate. In accordance with the tactics adopted throughout the war the Bulgarians are following up the defeated Turks with extraordinary energy. Flying columns are punning along the sea coast towards the Tchaatalja lines and it is believed that the main attack will be delivered tomorrow or Friday.

Constantinople appears to have lost hope of stemming the victorious advance even at Tchaatalja and the Turkish army is ready to cross into Asia.

Recognized on all sides that the end has come. The Mussulman population of the towns along the Dardanelles although depressed, maintaining calm. Some anti-Greek incidents of a small importance are reported to have occurred in the outlying villages.

Sofia, Bulgaria, Nov. 6.--The Turkish losses, killed and wounded during the fighting in the vicinity of Lule Burgas and Bunarhisar are estimated at 25,000 men. The Bulgarian troops captured 40,000 rifles, 200 machine guns and took 2,000 prisoners.

Princeton, N. J., Nov. 6.--The President-elect heard today that United States secret service men were coming to guard him, "I found it to my surprise," he said, "that it is the interpretation of the law to guard the president-elect even before he is inaugurated."

Accordingly, commencing Wednesday Nov. 20, a tri-weekly service will be inaugurated for both freight and passenger service between Moncton and Edmondston, a distance of 230 miles, leaving Moncton for Edmondston on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, returning Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays.

On the basis of the latest returns early in the evening, with the votes of Iowa, Kansas, Minnesota, South Dakota and Wyoming placed in the "doubtful" column, President-elect Wilson had 387 certain votes in the electoral college: Colonel Roosevelt, 89 and President Taft, 12. All of the doubtful states except South Dakota gave more or less certain indications during the night of landing in the list of Wilson electors, while South Dakota's returns showed a general trend toward a Roosevelt plurality.

The Porte shows no disposition as yet to treat for concordance with the allies, and until the big Tchaatalja situation is not likely to be changed. What will happen then it is impossible to foresee, the only thing certain being that the European concert will be not too harmonious will be faced by the most difficult and thorny task of settling the rival claims of Turkey, many aspirations of Turkish territory.

Another line of the Bulgarian advance is reported to be attacking the town of Tchaatalja, while still another column, which marched down the main road from Tchaatalja to Silivri, is now advancing towards Borodoss, for the purpose of forcing a passage along the coast of the Sea of Marmora.

These, however, are only flying columns. The main body has not yet commenced the attack on the Tchaatalja fortifications.

According to statements made by prominent public men in Constantinople, Tchaatalja has been captured and Adrianople has fallen, and although it is said that entry into Constantinople is no part of the allies' plan, Bulgaria will not listen to the suggestion of peace negotiations unless Turkey gives an undertaking to bring no more reinforcements from Asia.

Albania forms the crux of the position. It is stated that an attempt by Servia to encroach on Albania will be regarded by Austria as a casus belli. On the other hand Servia is a matter of life and death for her and she falls to see why her presence should be detrimental to the interests of any other power.

Further, Servia argues that she would only be retaining possession of what belonged to her before the downfall of the Servian empire. The Adriatic coast was flourishing Servian towns.

Nothing yet is known of Roumania's position in the new deal. The British minister at Bucharest had a three hours conference with the Russian minister today on the subject.

The fall of Monastir is not confirmed but it is considered not improbable. The Greeks are crossing the Vardar River and the fall of Saloniki is reported imminent.

Athens, Nov. 6.--A Greek naval squadron today occupied the Turkish island of Tenedos near the entrance to the Dardanelles. The Greek army operating in the vicinity of Saloniki has almost accomplished its object as the investment of the fortress is nearly complete.

Negotiations for the surrender of Saloniki were opened on Friday last between the foreign consuls and the military authorities, but the Turkish commander demanded that his troops be allowed to march out with their arms and with all the honors of war so that the negotiations fell through. The civil governor is said to have committed suicide.

The Greek newspapers in discussing the proposed armistice say it can only be accepted on condition that the Turkish throne be transferred to Asia Minor, and that reforms for the benefit of the Christian population there must also be introduced.

Vienna, Nov. 6.--King Nicholas of Montenegro discussed the intention of the Balkan allies today. In the course of an interview with a correspondent of the Vienna Tagblatt, His Majesty said: "While the Balkan nations will settle their affairs for themselves, their victories have not made them so daring as to forget to accommodate their wishes to the general situation in Europe."

A decree has been issued calling to the colors Greek reservists of the 1898 class. Greek volunteers recently captured the village of Bourli, near Metsovo, on the western frontier, after a stiff engagement and heavy losses.

Krushevo Captured. Belgrade, Nov. 6.--The town of Krushevo, twenty miles north of Monastir, has been captured by the Servians after a short resistance. A number of correspondents have returned from headquarters in Macedonia, as expected.

Sofia, Nov. 6.--The Turkish army commanded by Nazim Pasha, was completely crushed in the great battle of the last two days on the Serai Tchorlu line. According to the semi-official cables the Turks lost 10,000 and injured more than double the losses at Lule Burgas. The Bulgarians are now pursuing the defeated enemy.

Berlin, Nov. 6.--At a meeting of the Berlin Medical Society today Dr. Frederick Friedmann announced the discovery of what he believed to be a practical cure for every form of tuberculosis. He exhibited cured patients and declared that he treated 92 cases by his method with almost invariably complete cures. Prominent physicians testified to success by this method in their own practice. Dr. Friedmann injects living tubercle bacilli which have been rendered benevolent.

Berlin, Nov. 6.--An insurrection among the inhabitants of the Liberian republic is reported here, and the government has ordered the German cruiser Panther to proceed to Monrovia from Duala in the Kamerun for the protection of German residents.

Special to The Standard. Moncton, Nov. 6.--Some changes in the I. C. R. staff are announced. R. C. Colquhoun, recently appointed Assistant Divisional Superintendent of the St. John-Halifax Division, is now made assistant to General Superintendent Brady and H. B. Flemming, chief train despatcher at Moncton, takes Mr. Colquhoun's place.

Provincial Constables McArthur, Dobson, Woodman, Steves and Colquhoun, are now made constables. Murray has lodged complaint with Judge Borden, chairman of the civic police commission, against Chief of Police Rideout. They allege that he has absented himself from duty variously thought to be constant duty outside the city and has conveyed patients to the Provincial Insane Asylum, colored in feeble-minded which it is claimed are rightly due the constables. The hearing of the complaint will take place on Friday.

Ottawa, Nov. 6.--Domestic Bifano, an Italian, 20 years old, lying in Montreal jail under sentence of death for shooting Louis Guay, a restaurant keeper in Lagachetiere street, Montreal, will now spend the rest of his life in the penitentiary, according to the decision of the cabinet this afternoon.

He was to have been hanged on Nov. 15. The trial judge, Mr. Justice Ivenholme, recommended that a life sentence would suit the ends of justice.

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Special to The Standard. Ottawa, Nov. 6.--Hon. T. W. Crothers is taking active steps to protect laborers on construction works. A representative of the department next season will be with all large construction gangs to see that the men are properly housed and fed, and generally given fair treatment.

Quebec, Nov. 6.--The steamer Gladstone of the Nova Scotia Steel and Coal Company, which went ashore last night near St. Laurent, Island of Orleans, Barges left Quebec to unload the ship this morning. Special to The Standard. Ottawa, Nov. 6.--The weekly report of the Department of Trade and Commerce contains figures which go to show that the demand for wheat this year will be unusually heavy. Great Britain alone will need to import 25,000,000 bushels more than she did last year, the harvest having been a failure. Germany, the Netherlands, Italy, Spain, and Portugal, Scandinavia and Switzerland all will need more wheat this year than last and the total of additional requirements amounts up to 92,000,000 bushels for the wheat producing countries to supply.

It is understood that Canada is expected to export 104,000,000 bushels this year; the United States about 64,000,000 bushels; Russia, 128,000,000 bushels; and Argentina, Australia and Chile, 175,000,000 bushels.

THE VOICE OF BRITISH COLUMBIA.

Judging by a declaration made by Sir Richard McBride, by the tenor of a resolution passed and by the enthusiasm which prevailed at a public meeting in Victoria last week, the people of British Columbia hold no two opinions as to importance of an immediate contribution by Canada to strengthen the British Navy.

In the course of his speech Sir Richard McBride, who had just completed a tour of the Province, said he was convinced that the people of British Columbia were determined to uphold the honor and might of the Motherland, and to that end were prepared to support a strong naval policy by the Ottawa Government.

The concluding portion of Sir Richard's speech was in the nature of a prophecy to the effect that in his opinion it would be found when Mr. Borden presented his naval programme to Parliament that it was so fair and just a measure in the interests of Canada and the Empire that it would be approved without a dissenting voice.

Vancouver, B. C., Oct. 29, 1912. Capt. Clive Phillips-Wolley:

Dear Sir,—You have done me the honor to request my views on the navy question to be read at the ensuing meeting to be held under the auspices of the Navy League at Victoria, in view of the impending session of Parliament.

The question naturally resolves itself into two parts, namely: First, the question as to the best permanent policy to be pursued; and, second, the emergency question.

As to the first question, it is one of fact; and one which, in my opinion, is outside the pale of legitimate party politics. If the Imperial Government has advised the Canadian Government that an emergency exists, which sooner or later is likely to ripen into a crisis, then that ought, I think, to be sufficient for the people of Canada; and the question ought to be approached, not in the spirit of how little we can contribute in order to avoid the charge of being a niggardly or penurious people, not even in that of how much we can afford, but rather in that of how much is necessary to ensure an imperial victory in the event of conflict.

There are those, doubtless, who will maintain that it is wrong either to make war or to make preparation for war. If that were true, then our ancestors were wrong, when, Protestant and Catholic alike, they united to repel the invasion of the Armada and to keep the Spanish dragon out of England, and were equally wrong when they upheld the flag of freedom against the Corsican despot at Trafalgar and Waterloo.

If as a people we are not willing to the utmost of our power, to support the emblem which commands the respect of the world, and guarantees freedom and justice wherever it flies, but are ready to haggle over the performance of our manifest duty and to debate the worth to ourselves of the maintenance and defence of British institutions, then we should deserve to vanish from history as the degenerate sons of the Mother of Liberty.

It is of interest to note that Chief Justice Hunter before he removed to the Pacific Coast was one of the organizers of the Young Men's Liberal Association of Toronto in 1887. He was appointed to the position he now holds in 1902. His eloquent state-ment of the case will appeal to all Canadians who realize how little the Dominion has done in the past in support of Imperial Defence.

"That it is the duty, interest and wish of Canada to meet the present Imperial emergency by a prompt, adequate and unconditional gift to the Empire of battleships or their equivalent, to be followed as soon as may be by a permanent policy which will assure to our Dominion representation worthy of her dignity in the defence of the Empire."

It is almost unnecessary to add that the resolution was carried with enthusiasm. Commenting upon the keen interest displayed, the Victoria Colonist points out that the meeting was indicative of British Columbia's recognition of the duty of the hour. "The time has come," it adds, "when our pretensions must be converted into actualities." The strong Imperial sentiment which prevails in the Pacific Province is typical of the sentiment of Canada. Fictitious criticism of Mr. Borden's proposals by a section of the Liberal press carries no weight against the loyalty and devotion to the Motherland which inspire the people of the Dominion.

THE PRESIDENT ELECT.

Out of the three-cornered campaign which has been strenuously waged for months in the United States, Mr. Woodrow Wilson and the Democratic party have emerged triumphant. The returns indicate that the President elect will have an increased Democratic majority to support him in the House of Representatives and that there is an even chance that his party may control the Senate.

A feature of the election has been the overturning of

large Republican majorities in States never before captured by the Democrats in a Presidential election. The State of Maine, for instance, will send six Democratic electors to the National College for the first time in the State's history. The division of the republican vote between Mr. Taft and Mr. Roosevelt, and the consequent division of Republican organizations accounted for Democratic victories in many States.

Mr. Wilson's excellent record as Governor of New Jersey was undoubtedly a powerful factor in securing his election. The problems he mastered in this individual State, his probity and personal popularity went far to convince the people of the United States that he was well fitted to be entrusted with higher responsibilities. From a college chair at Princeton University, three years ago, to President of the United States, is no small achievement. As a candidate for the Presidency his position was unique, but there is every reason to believe that he will measure up to the best traditions of past Presidents of the Republic.

THE PRICE OF BEEF.

The Department of Agriculture at Washington a few weeks ago issued a compilation of prices for cereal, fodder, root and other crops, showing that the bounteous harvests for this year have made an appreciable reduction in the cost of living. It was predicted that as hay, so intimately connected with the price of meat, was lower in price it would not be long before the cost of meat declined in sympathy. A more recent report, however, is not so optimistic. It indicates that beef, at least is quite a reduction proof. Commenting on this conclusion the Toronto Mail and Empire points out this is not unnatural, nor should it cause much surprise. Beef is not a product of annual growth like grain or fruit. It requires several years to mature. Undoubtedly one of the chief causes in the persistent rise in the cost of beef is the increasing scarcity. Census figures indicate only too plainly that while the population of the country multiplies the supply of cattle diminishes almost as rapidly. Meat trusts, cattle rings, and other artificial methods of enhancing the cost to the consumer, while keeping down the producer's returns, may have a considerable hand in the high prices, but their operations cannot cloak the decay into which cattle raising seems to be falling.

In the Canadian West a Cattle Commission is at work investigating how best special assistance may be given the ranchers holding ranges leased from the Crown. But whatever may, at this late day, be done to restock the herds, it is plain that in so far as present high prices are due to the scarcity of cattle there cannot be material relief for two or three years. If four or five years hence the price of beef is to be at the present level or lower considerably, there must be prompt action today to revive the cattle industry.

An instructive insight into the motive which inspired Mr. Roosevelt in his campaign is given in a message he sent to members of the Union League on learning the result of the election. He declared that he had practically annihilated the Republican party, and that the Progressive party would be the party of the future and be in control of the national committee in 1916.

Current Comment

Direct Control.

(The Saskatoon Phoenix.) What is wanted is control and administration of the city's affairs by the city's best citizens and that can best be had through the election of a Board of Control. The proposition we make is simply this: That the city should elect four men from the city at large, who would be members of this Board of Control, and who with the mayor would be the executive of the city, handling the administration of the city's business, and do all the important committee work, working directly with the council and having direct control of all spending of money which has been voted by the council.

A Tribute to the West.

(Moose Jaw News.) Premier Borden's distribution of portfolios among the Western contingent of his party is in marked contrast to the policy of Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who had but two Western Ministers, and men not stalwarts, but the most mediocre of mediocrities, as those well acquainted with Messrs. Oliver and Templeman well know. The Western Provinces demand recognition and when it is accorded them it is appreciated. Extremely vigorous, they desire to be represented by men of strong personality, a quality to be found in Messrs. Rogers, Roche and Burrell.

Equal Suffrage.

(Montreal Star.) In Australia, New Zealand, some of the Commonwealths of the United States—in fact wherever women are today actively exercising equal suffrage with men—there have been no "militant" methods employed; where women have devoted themselves to stone-throwing, window breaking and other disorderly acts, the suffrage is as far away as ever. The interference is fairly obvious.

A Forlorn Hope.

(Saskatoon Star.) What the public really wants in the way of entertainment is something that is clean, wholesome and not too intense. We suppose there is no use in expecting the advent of another such combination as W. S. Gilbert and Arthur Sullivan, but we do hope the five years will bring forth something that will be in the same class.

A Reminiscence.

(Hamilton Spectator.) The Toronto Globe reiterates wearily that Borden will not contribute a single man for Imperial Naval Defence. It is evidently obsessed with the action of its revered leader, Laurier, who had to be forced by loyal public sentiment, to contribute aid during the Boer War.

One for Wm. Lyon Mackenzie.

(Hamilton Herald.) The substitution of Mackenzie King for N. W. Rowell in the leadership of the Ontario Liberal party, as talked of, would mean a long drop in the moral temperature of the Liberal leadership. Mr. Rowell is something more than a politician; but maybe he isn't enough of a politician.

To Fit the Crime.

(Toronto Star.) The practice of wife-beating is partly due to a popular delusion that a man has a right to chastise his wife, as he has to chastise his children. Nothing will dispel this illusion more quickly than a few floggings for wife-beaters.

Sir Donald's Suggestion.

(London Free Press.) Sir Donald Mann says the Hudson Bay Railway should be operated by the Government "until its real value has been demonstrated." And this, why not continue it under public ownership?

As Usual.

(Chicago News.) Some nervous people are saying that the war in Southern Europe is a sign of the approaching end of the world, but the landlords are asking for their rent just the same.

NEWS IN SHORT METRE

LOCAL

Pastor Gets Holiday. The members of the Congregational Church have granted three months' leave of absence to their pastor, Rev. H. S. Mahood, who is slowly recovering from his lengthy illness. It is Mr. Mahood's intention to leave today for a long visit to his old home in Ontario. On January 1 he will probably go to Mexico, where he has a sister living. It is hoped he will come back about February 1, completely restored to health.

Community Worker Leaves. John Bradford, community worker, Anns, and D. D. Milligan, Rev. Gordon Dickie and Rev. J. A. MacKelgan in the Y. M. C. A. yesterday morning, for a conference on boys' work. The object was to devise some organization by which the boys and young men could be tied up more effectively in church work. It is recognized that the time is ripe for such a movement and a special effort will soon be made to awaken church members to their responsibility. Mr. Bradford will return to this city Dec. 9 to address the ministers on the same lines.

Police Court. The justice court yesterday Robert Tucker, as keeper and Casie Cain, Kate Barrington and Agnes Cunningham, as inmates of a house of ill repute on Sheffield street, faced the most serious charge. The Cain woman was also charged with stealing \$24 from James O. Cook, who visited the house Tuesday afternoon. Detective Killen and Sergeant Scott saw evidence on the roof after which the prisoners were all remanded. Peter Yapp was fined \$8 for drunkenness and remanded on a charge of stealing a pair of boots, the property of H. G. Green. Charles McKinnon, arrested on a warrant charging him with assaulting William McKinnon, was found guilty and fined \$20. Andrew Craig, arrested on a warrant charging him with using abusive language, was remanded.

Runaway in Fairville. A span of horses, attached to Hamm Bros. bakery team, took fright while standing in front of a store on Main street in Fairville, yesterday morning and ran away. The wagon collided with an electric light pole and was badly damaged. The horses were finally caught some distance out the Manawagonish Road.

The Lolita Sinks. The steam yacht "Lolita," owned by Commodore S. P. Gerow, the flagship of the John Power Boat Club, lies sunken at Rowan's wharf, after a fire early yesterday morning when damage was done aboard her. The wheel-house and cabin were burned off and other damage done, including some to the machinery. The yacht was partially insured. It is not known definitely how the fire started. The steward was sleeping on board at the time, but escaped.

Gets Fine Deer Head. John Burchill, of Frenchmen's Creek arrived in the city yesterday morning with one of the finest deer heads he has ever sold in the city this year. The animal was shot near Spruce Lake on Monday.

GENERAL

An Empire Trade Mark. London, Nov. 6.—The Dominion royal commission yesterday received a deputation advocating an Empire trade mark. Col. Pelletier, of Quebec, said that since he had been here he had seen sold Canadian goods which he had been unable to trace. If the proposed mark was instituted it would mean that the province producing such goods would get the credit for it.

Murder in Alberta. Lethbridge, Nov. 6.—What appears to be the most cold blooded murder perpetrated in this city in recent years was committed last night when young Grassel, a boy miner found lying on the crossing of Seventh avenue north and John street, the battered remains of John Gurday, a miner also employed at No. 3 shaft of the Galt collieries. Suspicion rests on Waal Beccou, who is held in the mounted police guard room.

Wireless on Great Lakes. London, Nov. 6.—The Marconi Co. announces that they have signed a contract with the Canadian government for nine additional stations on the great lakes. The company will receive an additional subsidy from the government of \$1,500 per annum. The agreement is for 15 years.

**WITH THE LOCAL FINANCIAL AGENCIES**  
 Markets More Active Yesterday.  
 The stock markets were more active yesterday than they have been for some time. At the opening in New York there was considerable selling pressure, but good support was forthcoming with favorable news from Europe. The shorts took to cover, and prices advanced from one to three points in the bulk of active securities. In Montreal the volume of trading was large, and though the market barely held its own at the outset, an upward trend soon set in. C. P. R. was one of the features, opening at 227 1/2, rallying later to 267 1/2, and closing at 268 1/2.  
 Montreal Power was active, opening at 22 1/2 and closing at 23 1/2.  
 There was a good deal of trading in Dominion Textile with prices firm and steady.  
 Quite a number of shares of the Royal Bank changed hands at 224.  
 Bank of Nova Scotia shares sold for 289.  
 News from abroad was decidedly reassuring. American securities in London showed strength, prices rising from 1/4 to 3/4 points. Brokers' advances were to the effect that the liquidation following the Balkan war scare had about run its course.  
 Wheat cables were very weak. At the opening of the Chicago exchange there was a rush to sell, but some support developed at 88.  
 Corn ruled lower. Oats were weak under liquidation at the opening, but later there was some buying by commission houses and the market rallied.  
**Beet Sugar.**  
 In the beet sugar market there was a good deal of scattered commission house liquidation with efforts very noticeable. The market was as possible. The pool gave no evidences of re-buying.  
**Coming to Industrials.**  
 McCurdy's advice from New York yesterday stated that a drift of traders toward Industrials was becoming very noticeable. One of the chief reasons of this is said to be the feeling that the railways are earning all they are expected to earn for several months. There is a shortage of cars, and those available are now being used to the full capacity. The business earnings it is said, can only come as new equipment is provided.  
 Canadian railways, however, continue to report an increasing earnings. C. P. R. earnings for October were \$12,960,000 as compared with \$11,113,000 in October, 1911, an increase of \$1,847,000 or 16.6 per cent.  
 Grand Trunk traffic earnings for the last ten days in October, were \$15,484,054, an increase of 12.6 per cent over the same period last year.  
 The Canadian Northern Railway earnings for the week ending Oct. 31, were \$794,700 as against \$628,500 for the same week last year, an increase of \$166,200, or 26.4 per cent.  
 Smelters declared the regular quarterly dividend of 1 1/2 per cent on preferred, and 1 per cent on common.  
**The Political Situation.**  
 J. C. Mackintosh's advice from New York says that the consensus of opinion is that the election of Wilson will not have any bad effect on business. A New York financier, head of one of the largest hotels in Montreal, is quoted as saying that Wilson's big majority will enable him to lead rather than to lead the Democrats. The big haul for favoring measures prejudicial to business.  
 The Western Federation of Miners have called off the strike at the Nevada Consolidated Copper Mine.  
**REAL ESTATE NEWS.**  
 About a month ago Armstrong & Bruce purchased from J. S. Gregory a 25-acre block in Lancaster on the Sand Cove Road. They have now disposed of the property to a syndicate composed of Montreal men, at a handsome profit over their investment.  
 Taylor & Sweeney have just sold the house on Mount Pleasant, at present occupied by Commissioner Agar, to Dr. George A. Black, of Boston. The property was part of the Robert Reid-Duncan estate. The house is a very comfortable one, standing on a lot 200 feet by 70 feet. It is understood that the purchaser intends renovating the house and holding it as a speculation. This is the second buy Dr. Black has made in St. John real estate.

IMPERIAL DRY DOCK CO. ASKS FOR A GUARANTEE OF BOND SINKING FUND

W. H. Thorne and W. Burton Stewart Met City Commissioners Yesterday -- Grant will Mean About \$48,000 a Year from City and Province Jointly.

Yesterday W. H. Thorne, the newly elected president of the Imperial Dry Dock Company, and W. Burton Stewart, managing director of the Norton Griffith Company for Canada, had a conference with the city commissioners, at which matters relating to the project of establishing a steel plant at Courtenay Bay were discussed.

The company is asking the city and province to guarantee the sinking funds on its bond issues and propose as a consideration for this assistance to reclaim about 250 acres south and east of the breakwater which will be available as a site for an iron and steel plant, a shipbuilding plant and other industries.

Asks Credit to Help Bonds. When seen last evening Mr. Stewart stated that the company was practically asking the use of the credit of the city and province to enable it to dispose of its bonds on the most favorable terms. The federal government was guaranteeing the interest on the bonds, but they had to make provision for a sinking fund. They wanted the city and province jointly to agree to guarantee a payment

ANOTHER COMPANY TO WORK TO COLONIZE THE PROVINCE Englishman Here to Open Office for English Colonization Concern--Plans to Establish Demonstration Farm.

"It should be an easy matter to bring 75,000 people from the old country and locate them on the farm lands of New Brunswick within two years," said W. V. Corfield, a young Englishman who has opened an office at 71 Dock street, and is acting as representative of the Canadian Farms Improvement Company, a big English colonization concern.

"It is merely a question of advertising the opportunities of this province for the English farmer with moderate capital. New Brunswick offers advantages that he cannot obtain in the west and if he knew the conditions here he would not go west. Only recently has the government of New Brunswick begun to do anything to advertise the opportunities of the province in the old country.

"The great trouble has been that nearly every railway agency in Great Britain has been interested in sending immigrants to the west. The immigrants land here in the winter; they see the country covered with ice and snow and on the journey over the C. P. R. they see one of the roughest sections of the province under the most unfavorable conditions. When they return home for Christmas they proceed over the C. P. R. line in New Brunswick under the same conditions and if their friends ask them about New Brunswick they talk of the portion they have seen during the winter and give a very wrong impression of the province.

"One thing needed to give the immigrants a chance to see the province under fair conditions and to attract people here is a good steamship service all the year round. The fact that St. John is advertised as a winter port creates an unfavorable impression on the other side. "My father conducts a large training farm in the old country. About a year ago he went to the C. P. R. office in London and said he would like to invest a few hundred pounds in New Brunswick. The C. P. R. man decided the idea of investing anything in New Brunswick and urged him to go out west. When my father told him that he had visited New Brunswick and considered it one of

THE SUGAR REFINERY

Some Conditions in the Agreement with Mr. Durant which Hold Good with the New Company.

The old agreement between the city and Mr. Durant, which was ratified by act of the legislature, remains in force except in so far as conditions governing the guarantee for the erection of the refinery are notified by the new agreement with D. Lorne McCibbon, F. H. Anson and the other men who have taken over Mr. Durant's interest in the refinery project. The old agreement does not stipulate the minimum number of persons the refinery will employ, or the number of days it shall be in operation in a given year, but it does provide that the refinery shall be operated to 50 per cent. of its capacity of 2,000 barrels a day for at least 18 months in three years. This means that the city is required to turn out an average of 500 barrels a day.

The following is the clause governing output: "Provided that in event of the refinery not being operated to at least 50 per cent. of the full capacity of two thousand barrels per day (namely one thousand barrels per day) for the aggregate period of eighteen months in any thirty-six consecutive months, hereafter, all exemptions and special rights as to water privileges and as to taxation shall forthwith cease, save however, that if the city is satisfied that the shut-down is due to tariff conditions in Canada or other causes beyond the control of the refinery management, or if the authorities under the Lemioux or other labor act do not find the management in fault, this clause should not have effect."

The act of legislature passed in 1910 in relation to the agreement between the city and the company "shall contain a covenant providing for the payment of the interest on the property granted by the city, should the refinery enter into an agreement or understanding whereby its production is reduced or curtailed, without the consent of the city."

INSTITUTES FOR MISSION STUDY WILL MEET HERE

Prominent Speakers will Address Meetings in St. John on Monday and Tuesday of Next Week.

To impart a further impetus to the study in mission study in the Maritime Provinces, a series of institutes are being held in the principal centers in New Brunswick and Nova Scotia. Meetings will be held in St. John Monday and Tuesday next and the services of several prominent speakers have been secured for the occasion. The campaign is being conducted in connection with the Maritime Education Movement and is interdenominational in character.

The sessions here will take the form of mission study classes in the afternoon and public meetings in the evening. Rev. Dr. Bond and Rev. Fred J. W. Falconer, of Halifax, will be the principal speakers. At the evening meetings lantern slides and moving pictures will be shown. The speakers are Rev. H. B. Priest, of Toronto, secretary of the movement in Canada, will deliver descriptive addresses. Arrangements have been made with the I. C. R. whereby should ten or more persons from outside points wish to attend the sessions here, reduced fares may be secured on the standard certificate plan. The C. P. R. is offering a similar reduction for 50 or more passengers.

Y. M. C. A. NOTES. F. A. Dykeman presided at the monthly meeting of the physical work committee of the Y. M. C. A. held last evening in the association building when matters with regard to the winter work were taken up and discussed. Physical Director Howard presented his report. At the last meeting of the physical work committee a resolution was passed asking the board of directors to lower the age limit at which a boy can enter the association from thirteen to twelve. Physical Director Howard announced that a basket ball league had been formed and an early date. A league among the different Sunday schools is also in process of formation.
