Sections 4, 5, and 6, are repealed and re-ilaced by the following:-4. Before any Salmon net shall be used the 4. Before any Salmon net shall be used the owner or person interested in such net shall cause a memorandum in writing, setting forth the name of the owner or person interested, the length of the net, and its intended location, to be filed with the local Fishery Overseer who, if no valid objection exists, may, in accordance with instructions from the Department of Marine and Fisheries, issue a Fishery License for the same; and any net used before such License has been obtained, and any netused in excess or evasion of the description contained in such license, shall be deemed to be illegal and liable to forfeiture, together with the fish caught therein, and the owner or person using the same and the owner or person using the same shall be also subject to fine and costs under the Fisheries Act.

5. When, with her next calf, you require the milk to be retained twelve hours, the udder becomes hard and painful, and the milk leaks from the teats, or more likely, nature accommodates the quantity of milk secreted to the capacity to retain it, and the cow bepacity to retain it, and the cow becomes permanently a small milker Much of the future character of a cow, therefore, depends on her treatment with her first calf.
