NOVA SCOTIA. The Commissioners of His Majesty's Customs have decided that Tea, although imported into Great Britain from a foreign port, being of the produce of a foreign plantation, is to be considered as a direct importation from the place of growth, and therefore free of duty.

We are glad to learn that Messrs. Campbell and Jones, who ascended from this place some months since, with the Brig Macmillan, and proceeded to a considerable amount of business at Rio. The result was successful.

The Officers of His Majesty's Customs, at the Port of Liverpool, have made seizure of an American Smuggling Vessel, with a very valuable cargo on board, consisting of tea, tobacco, coffee, shoes and boots, and most every article necessary to supply the Fishermen along the Coast, to the prejudice of the British Merchant; the value is said to be about four thousand dollars.—N. Scotia.

PROVINCIAL. Our columns, this week, are full of changes of the highest interest; and among others we have the gratification of announcing to our readers that the question regarding the succession to the Administration of the Government in the absence of the Lieut. Governor, an Act which was likely to lead to interminable disputes between the Executive and Legislative Councils, is happily decided by His Majesty's Government in a manner which must be eminently conducive to the welfare of the Colony. In future, in case of the absence or demise of the Lieut. Governor, the duties of the office will be discharged by the Administration of our local Government; by which all party feelings, and the petty cabals which have so frequently disturbed our tranquility, will be effectually silenced, and impartiality and candour, we doubt not, will henceforth distinguish our public measures. We must further add, that the Honorable Lieut. Col. Fane is specially named as the successor on the first vacancy; and we sincerely congratulate our fellow subjects, on this choice having fallen on a gallant officer of high rank and character.—St. John Courier.

His Excellency the Lieutenant Governor with Lady Campbell and family arrived in Town from their winter residence on Tuesday evening. On Thursday, His Excellency accompanied by the General and Staff of the Garrison, reviewed the Detachment of 34th Regiment, and we understand, was pleased to express his approbation of the soldierly appearance of the men and the high state of discipline of the detachment generally, which reflected much credit on Major Raw, the Commanding Officer.

Lady Campbell and family proceeded to Fredericton this morning, in the Steamer John Ward.—His Excellency, we understand, leaves town to-day, on a tour through the East Counties, and on his return, will meet the Governor of Nova-Scotia, Sir COLIN CAMPBELL, at Fort Cumberland.—Ib.

The Commissioner of Highways for the Township of Saint Andrews, begs to call the particular attention of all persons liable to perform Statute Labour, to the 22nd Section of the late Road Act, which he has caused to be republished for their information as follows:—

XXII. And be it enacted, That if any person or persons when so notified to labour as aforesaid by the Surveyors of their respective Districts, shall neglect or refuse to appear and labour agreeably to such notice, and shall also neglect to pay the sum of two shillings and six pence for each day's labour as aforesaid, it shall be the duty of such Surveyor, within six days after such neglect or refusal to make report of such delinquency to some one of the Commissioners, who shall without delay make complaint in their own names to a Justice of the Peace against every such delinquent, which Justice shall, on conviction, adjudge every such delinquent to pay the sum of four shillings for every day he has so neglected to appear and labour, together with costs of suit, to be levied by Warrant of distress and sale of such offender's goods and chattels, under the hand and seal of such Justice, directed to any Constable in the Town or Parish to which such offender may belong, and if such offender or chattels can be found, he shall and they shall be liable to be taken such Constable to the Common Goal of the County for a space not exceeding Six Days; and if any person who shall appear agreeably to

such notice, and being under the direction of such Surveyor, shall refuse or neglect to work, or shall not work in such manner as to satisfy such Surveyor, shall refuse or neglect to work, or shall not work in such manner as to satisfy such Surveyor, he is hereby empowered to dismiss such person from the work, and shall forthwith make complaint against him to some one of the Commissioners, who shall immediately proceed against him in the same manner as is hereinbefore directed to be done against persons neglecting to appear and labour after being duly notified, and the person so dismissed by such Surveyor, for such delinquency, shall be adjudged to pay the sum of four shillings for every day he shall have neglected or refused to work to the satisfaction of such Surveyor, agreeably to such notice or be liable to imprisonment, not exceeding Six Days in the manner hereinbefore mentioned.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE STANDARD. I read in your issue of the 24th April, a letter from Mr. Brown stating that he did not intend to present a petition to the House of Assembly, praying the support of the House to a representation to the Home Govt. for a repeal of the duty on Flour. Now, without entering into a long story that I conceive quite unnecessary, I have merely to inform you that I never heard of such a charge being made against Mr. Brown, and I am aware that he is innocent of it; but, Mr. Editor, if Mr. Brown can deny that he asserted on the floor of the House of Assembly that *Salted Flour is an article of luxury and could bear a small duty say of two shillings and sixpence a barrel*, then Sir, Mr. Blitch has reported an untruth.

I would have noticed Mr. Brown's letter at the time it appeared, but expected that others more accustomed to such matters would have done so. I agree with Mr. Brown as regards the latter part of his letter.

FOR THE STANDARD. "And whence came a reasonable reason? It good, it was the voice of repetition." If that be the case, we have no objection to your saying, "You are much by conviction; who cease insisting in and out of reason; convince all men, even a politician; or what is just the simple matter out; so the end's gain'd what signifies the route?" Byron.

After all that has been said and written upon the subject of the late Appropriation, it would appear that the end is not yet "gained," even you yourself say "that although I have made no mistake in my own mind, yet the matter is far from being settled by either." The subject has not been discussed at very great length in your paper; with a hope therefore of adding something to the knowledge of some of your readers, I propose to take an impartial view of it—its merits and faults, and to do so, without consulting the good sense, or valuing the character of any man, or body of men whatever, and with a determination to strive at correct conclusions, as far as possible, to deduce truth from another by fair and well connected arguments.

Here then is the fact: The Appropriation of the last Session are but 100, and now who has done the mischief? "That is the question."

On the 19th January 1786 the General Assembly of this Province was first convened. In form it resembled the Imperial Government, the Governor being put for the King, the Council for the Lords, and the House of Assembly for the Commons. Its jurisdiction was limited to the Province, and its executive operations were confined to what is called by Parliamentary procedure, and constitutional principles—the powers of the different branches bearing upon one another with the same relative force as those of the Imperial Parliament. This fully confirmed by the Journals of both Houses, and cannot therefore be disputed.

We enquire now what are the Constitutional duties of a House of Commons? and find by universal admission, that one of their peculiar duties and privileges is "To grant the necessary supplies," and the Council of this Province in exact accordance with this acknowledged right, have declared, "That it is the sole and undoubted right of the House of Assembly to originate a supply Bill, and to include therein, not only what may be recommended from the Executive Chair, but also such other sums, as they may think necessary for the public good." Money bills are therefore presented for the Governor's assent, as the sole act of the House, in the word "Not losing." I have now to present to Your Excellency on behalf of the faithful Commons of New Brunswick—a Bill for raising a Revenue, also sundry Bills of supply, to which I pray Your Excellency's assent. In reply to which, His Excellency answers in the following words:—"Mr. Speaker and Gentlemen of the House of Assembly, "In His Majesty's name I thank you, for the provision you have made for the services of the current year, and it will be my earnest desire to see the appropriations placed at my disposal promptly and faithfully applied."

Before the year 1801 all money bills were completed in the House, and sent up to the Council for concurrence. The Council had no power to alter any such bills, but were compelled, either to pass them in toto, or throw them out. In 1801 however, a practice unknown to the Constitution was adopted.—The Assembly set down all the items that they intended to put into the appropriation bill on separate sheets of paper, and sent up these for the consideration of the Council.—The Council looked over them, and after agreeing to them returned them to the House—the House then put them into the form of a bill, as they used to do before the year 1801, and sent the bill up to the Council for concurrence, which bill would be agreed to as a matter of course, all the items having been agreed to by the Council before. And here it may be proper to notice, that an annual bill was made heretofore made for the expenses of the Speaker and Members of the House, and in 1801 this was the first item on the first sheet sent up in manner here described, and an item for the same purpose has since that time been every year sent up, and until the late Session invariably allowed to the Council.

The constitutional concession hereafter mentioned by the Council at first, with great forbearance and moderation, so much so, that the House did not experience any uncertainty about money bills. The first year, the whole of the items sent up were allowed by the Council without a single exception. The second year (1802) the Council objected to four of the items, but did not disallow them. With great caution they called upon the House for a conference. After the conference the Council agreed to two of the items, one article having undergone a verbal alteration by the House. The other two items remained unaltered in substance, and were finally disallowed by the Council. The House however proceeded to put in one general Bill, the whole of the appropriations, including the two rejected items, and also the whole of the Revenue Bill, and this Bill which they called "a Bill for raising a revenue in this Province, and for appropriating the same together with the moneys now in the Treasury" they sent up to the Council for concurrence. It was what did the Council do? They did not abandon even this Bill, but called upon the House for another conference, and finally passed the whole Bill with both objections, after the House had agreed to a verbal alteration, merely leaving out the name of an officer and naming the office. In this manner business was conducted for a number of years, the Council always calling a conference when any objectionable item appeared, until at length they began unceremoniously to strike out and disallow such items as did not suit them, and the conference system was finally abandoned.

Things remained in this state for a number of years longer, and more useful, as well as questionable, grants were struck off by the Council from time to time, from the roads and miscellaneous services. The House however, they had contained themselves, with striking out what they pleased, but during the late Session they advanced a step further, and began to dictate to the House in the originating of certain allowances, in a manner not only wholly unprecedented, but altogether insufferable. The House in the exercise of their undoubted right to manage the finances, had raised a finance committee—in their report they recommended "that in providing for the ordinary services, and in making all other necessary allowances the nature and extent of the several services should be fully considered, and that in no case should more than a fair compensation be allowed. Acting upon this principle, it was found necessary to allow the clerks of the House a larger sum than the clerks of the Council." The Council however, because they thought the grant to their clerks too small, struck off the allowance to the clerks of the House, and then sent a resolution down dictating to the House, and saying the "impropriety of not allowing the clerks of the Council." Acting also upon the same principle, they disallowed a Bill to provide for the expenses of the Speaker and members of the House, because the same Bill did not also do as they state, make provision for the attendance and expenses of the Council.—These two transactions are exactly of one character, both unprecedented, and in both cases an approved and usual grant was struck out for the avowed and declared reason (of course which stated reason was not included).

Here then we find, that the constitutional mode of sending up Bills of supply in gross for concurrence was put upon in this Province for a period of fifteen years—that in 1801 a concession was made by the House for the sake of convenience as was said, and the paper resolution system was adopted; that under this mode the Council acted, first by merely objecting to certain items, and then settling or endeavoring to settle, the matters objected, by calling a conference, with the House—that advancing a step farther, they began unceremoniously to reject or disallow grants, without calling any conference; that last Session they made one advance more, and now endeavor to originate certain grants, and they do so by striking out some other grant which they themselves approve, and giving a reason for so doing, that the Bill, or paper, did not contain some other grant, which they very much desire. Heretofore they had struck out such grants only as appeared to them to be improper or improprietarian; now they consider the propriety or necessity of some grant that is not made, and because it is not made, they strike out some other grant which they themselves acknowledge to be just and reasonable!

Mr. Editor, these are recorded facts. I defy any man to dispute or rather to confute them; and I put the question candidly to every reasonable man, whether such dangerous and daring innovations ought to be tolerated?

A new turn has been given to the American Indemnity bill, by a proposition to pay twelve millions and leave the rest to negotiation.

Tux Strains.—The state of the weather is a constant theme in most Journals, and the latitudes of the present spring, a subject of general regret. Many experienced Agriculturists, however, are of opinion that fine weather early in the season tempts people to put in their crops too soon; for climate is slow to maintain its average in certain parts of years, and hence cold and wet winters frequently follow these premature labours, and frustrate their efforts. We would call attention to the mode of cultivating the Potato, given on our first page, and to that of Rye Bags, which would be found a valuable addition to the food of Cattle, especially in such late seasons as the present. To show that Spring weather does not vary widely in its range we may instance the first arrival at Quebec, which from 1813 to 1834 averaged the last of May; the 15th of that month was the latest, and the earliest on record was on the 15th April, when the Nemesis arrived from Hull in 23 days and no more. We have lately had a few mild days, but as yet no warm, showery, genial, growing weather.
