HOKEY SCHEDULE THE OUTCOME

Meeting at Chatham Forms New Brunswick Hockey League.

A meeting of the New Brunswick Hockey League, called by the league executive, was held at Chatham on Tuesday night in the town hall, when the election of officers took place and the playing schedule for the coming season was drawn up.

Besides last year's teams invitations had been sent to Woodstock, St. Stephen, Campbellton, Sackville, Sussex and Moncton to send delegates to the meeting. Campbellton was the only new team to send delegates. Those teams that had representatives at the meeting were Campbellton, Marysville, Fredericton, Bathurst and Chatham, and the league this winter will be made up of teams from those towns.

It was decided that purely amateur hockey will be played and no semi-professionalism tolerated. The National Hockey Association rules will govern the league games with the exception that there will be no off-side playing allowed. The playing time will be the same as last year, viz. two periods of twenty minutes each and the last one of fifteen minutes with five minute rest periods between.

The election of officers resulted as follows: Honorary president, Angus McLean, Bathurst; president, J. D. Black, Fredericton; vice-president, Max Mowat, Campbellton; secretary, C. Wade, Marysville.

Referees who will be asked to officiate are "Sandy" Staples, Fredericton, Frank Brown, Moncton, and W. J. George, Bathurst.

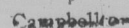

PICOTU, N. S., Nov. 27.—With her bottom badly damaged, for she had been struck by the steamer South American, left yesterday morning at 9 o'clock, bound for Little Cape, with 600 tons of coal, oil burner, cast William Fraser arrived in Picotou yesterday. She was only recently launched at Bridgeport, N.S., registered at Montreal. She was towed by the tugboat "Newfoundland," which took her on a trip, bound to Dalhousie to load for New York. Midnight Nov. 17, in the Gulf of St. Lawrence, she struck on the shore at Little Cape, where she carried five miles northward of Gaspé. The wrecking steamer Lord Strathcona came to her aid, but after several attempts failed to float her. On Nov. 24 she came off under her own power. The Lord Strathcona returned to the coast of Nova Scotia, towing her part of the way here.

An examination is being made by divers, and if found seaworthy, she will probably proceed to Halifax after taking on fuel oil here.

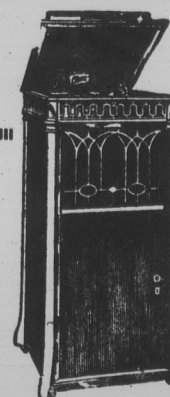

Paris, Nov. 20.—The number of former workers now unemployed in France is 25,000, according to official statistics. VENIZELLOS ON WAY TO NICE

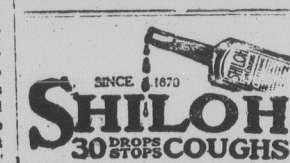
Government of Greece Will Hold Plebiscite Re King's Return.
