

ARRIVAL of the BRITANNIA.

We stop the Press to announce the arrival of the Royal Steamship Britannia at Halifax on Friday last. We hasten to lay before our Readers the most important news, viz. the Queen's Speech. By a letter received in town, we are happy to announce that the Timber market is revived.

OPENING OF PARLIAMENT.

House of Lords, Jan. 26.
Parliament was opened this day by her Majesty in person, and the attendance of Peers was fully as numerous as on the occasion of the prorogation of Parliament in August last. The galleries and doors leading to the body of the House were thrown open at 12 o'clock, and before 1 o'clock almost every seat was occupied. Just before the arrival of Her Majesty many of the front benches, which had been reserved for Peers, were taken possession of by ladies, whom the attendants found it impossible to displace, and the space near the bar was also filled by persons who were unable to procure accommodation elsewhere. Among the spectators in the right-hand gallery was an Indian prince, whose Oriental costume excited much attention.

Her Majesty was attired in a robe of white satin richly embroidered with gold, over which was the state mantle of purple velvet. She also wore a tiara, necklace, and earrings of magnificent brilliants. Her Majesty appeared to be in the enjoyment of excellent health, and looked extremely well.

During the recess the throne, footstool, and canopy, appear to have been regally decorated. The steps were covered with a magnificent purple carpet, embroidered with a Norman rose; and on the left of the throne was placed a splendid chair of state for his Royal Highness Prince Albert.

QUEEN'S SPEECH.

The following is a copy of the Royal Speech:—
"My Lords and Gentlemen,
I have the satisfaction to receive from Foreign Powers assurances of their friendly disposition and of their earnest desire to maintain peace.

"The position of affairs in the Levant had long been a cause of uneasiness, and a source of danger to the general tranquillity. With a view to avert the evils which a continuance of that state of things was calculated to occasion, I concluded with the Emperor of Austria, the King of Prussia, the Emperor of Russia, and the Sultan, a convention intended to effect a pacification of the Levant; to maintain the integrity and independence of the Ottoman Empire, and thereby to afford additional security to the peace of Europe. I have given directions that this Convention be laid before you.

"I rejoice to be able to inform you that the measures which have been adopted in execution of the engagements have been attended with great success; and I trust that the objects which I have in view are on the eve of being completely accomplished.

"In the course of these transactions my naval forces have operated with those of the Emperor of Austria, and with the land and sea forces of the Sultan, and have displayed upon all occasions their accustomed gallantry and skill.

"Having deemed it necessary to send to the coast of China a naval and military force to demand reparation and redress for injuries inflicted upon some of my subjects, the officers of the Emperor of China, and the indignities offered to an Agent of my Crown, at the same time appointed Plenipotentiaries to treat upon these matters with the Chinese Government.

"These Plenipotentiaries were, by the last accounts, in negotiation with the Government of China; and it will be a source of much gratification to me, if that Government shall be induced, by its own sense of justice, to bring these matters to a speedy settlement by an amicable arrangement.

"Serious differences have arisen between Spain and Portugal about the execution of a Treaty, concluded by these Powers in 1835, for regulating the navigation of the Douro. But both parties have accepted my mediation, and I hope to be able to effect a reconciliation between them upon terms honorable to both.

"I have concluded with the Argentine Republic and with the Republic of Hayti, treaties for the suppression of the Slave Trade, which I have directed to be laid before you.

"Gentlemen of the House of Commons,
I have directed the estimates of the year to be laid before you.

"However sensible of the importance of adhering to the principles of economy, I feel it to be my duty to recommend that adequate provision be made for the exigencies of the public service."

"My Lords and Gentlemen,
Measures will be submitted to you without delay which have for their object the more speedy and effectual administration of justice. The vital importance of this subject is sufficient to ensure for it your early and most serious consideration.

councils may be so directed as to advance the great interests of morality and religion, the welfare and happiness of all classes of my subjects."

Immediately afterwards her Majesty quitted the House, and the Royal procession returned in the same state to Buckingham Palace.

The House resumed at five o'clock, at which hour the Lord Chancellor took his seat on the Woolsack.

Lord Beaumont (late Mr. Myles Stapleton, who has made good his claim to the dormant peerage of Beaumont,) took the oath and his seat.

Viscount Melbourne laid the Convention entered into between her Majesty and the Emperor of Austria, the Emperor of Russia, the King of Prussia, and the Sultan, for the pacification of Turkey, on the table.

The Lord Chancellor then read her most gracious Majesty's Speech, during the reading of which Lord Brougham entered the House, and, walking up to the Conservative side, shook hands with the Duke of Wellington, and then took his seat in his usual place.

In the House of Commons, Lord Deane moved the Address, and Lord Lyndalgh seconded the motion.
