Defaulters Given Until March 31 to Discharge Their Duty.

The Director General at Ottawa has issued the following notice under date of February 24th:

Under the authority of the "War Measures Act, 1914," it is required that every make between the ages of 16 and 45 years, residing in Canada, shall fill in and return a National Service Card, within ten days of the receipt thereof.

Any person who has made default in the discharge of this duty is hereby notified that the time for the return of the completed card has been extended until the 31st day of March, 1917, and that a National Service Card and addressed envelope may be obtained upon application to the nearest post-master.

### Wants Tax on Cats.

FRANCHISE FOR WOMEN

Legislature to Pass Bills Giving Womèn Right to Vote.

Toronto, Feb. 28.—A Government measure in the Legislature grants to the Ontario womanhood franchise corresponding to the present manhood franchise, all women of the full age of 21 years who are British subjects and who have resided in the province for the requisite period being entitled to vote. Machinery will be devised so that the names of women will be placed on the voters' lists in time to permit of them exercising their franchise at the next provincial elections.

J. C. Elliott, Liberal member of the Legislature for West Middlesex, is the author of a bill to extend the municipal franchise to married women owns in gropperty, which was given a second reading in the Legislature last might, and referred to the municipal committee. This means that the bill will shortly become law, members of the Government intimating that the measure would be passed. Mr. Elliott has been fighting for the enactment of this measure since 1913, but in other years it was consistently rejected by the Government.

# ROUTE OF PROPOSED ROAD

### Middlesex Will Present Claim for Toronto-Windsor Highway

London, Feb. 27.—Middlesex county, backed by the city of London, as represented by the board of control, will fight for its rights to be included on the route of the proposed Toronto-Windsor highway, which, it is planned, will eventually run from the American border to Montreal.

Last night a special joint session with the city board of control was held, and the city representatives will likewise go to Toronto to back up the fight.

following the lake shore front via St. Thomas and other southerly localities, would serve only the southern strip of Western Ontario. By following the London-Middlesex route the very centre of the district would be traversed and the whole peninsula benefitted rather than a meagre portion.





CARING FOR THE WOUNDED.

Red Cross Work Done by Women in

Mrs. W. H. Cawthra, of Toronto who recently returned from London where she was actively engaged in the work of the Canadian Red Cross Society under Lady Drummond, gives an interesting description of the per-fect system that Lady Drummond has organized in her department.

organized in her department. It was in the filing and record department that Mrs. Cawthra worked as well as being the authorized visitor of the Red Cross, for two hospitals. At every hospital in England blue tickets are left with the scretary or O. C. to be given to any Canadian who may be admitted. This is called a "Welcome Ticket" in that it may be filled out by the patient for anything that he needs or wants. And invariably the patient wants his own razor and shaving outfit, for he loses this when wounded. There is also a great demand for Canadian badges, such as "Canada" or the "Magle Leaf" that they lose off their caps and uniforms. If the thing asked for is not at headquarters, it is bought and sent to the wounded Tommy.

is bought and sent to the wounded Tommy.

The authorized nurse visits him once a week. On the first visit she gets such particulars as name, number, battalion, when wounded, nature of wound when admitted to hospital, and next-of-kin and their address. These particulars are all put on a card and filed. The relatives are then communicated with and all particulars given. Once a week a letter goes to the next-of-kin telling of the progress of the patient.

When he is sent to a Convalescent Home he is then considered able to

When he is sent to a Convalescent Home he is then considered able to do this work himself. Miss Clara Hagarty, of Toronto, the well known artist, is in charge of the parcel room, having been there from the start, and never missed a day. The parcels are made up individually and sent collectively to the hospitals. The largest number of parcels ever sent out in one day was 496.

Another interesting department is the paper s. ction, where all the newspapers are received. A soldier, may ask for a Hamilton paper, and if unobtainable a Toronto one is sent him, or he may be from Calgary, and get a Winnipeg paper. Countess Ferozine, formerly Miss Molson, of Montreal, is in charge of this work. Taking the patients out for motor rides is another very well organized work.

Why fly in the face of Providence? The sound advice, contained in the bulletins of the Department of Agriculture, is based on the knowledge of the best agricultural experts in the country and the secumulated experiences of thousands of farmers. Second. The sust must be chopped very fine so as to resemble bread-crumbs. If the sue it rendered and then allowed to cool in a solid lump it can be grated with a coarse grater, which is less trouble and even more satisfactory than chopping.

Third. Equal quantities of flour and breadcrumbs make a lighter pudding than flour sleep. Aimost every soil lacks some element of the plant food necessary for a maximum crop, and each crop leaves the soil and breadcrumbs make a lighter pudding than flour alone.

Fourth. Plain suet puddings can be made without eggs, but when they are used the puddings are both lighter and more nourishing.

Fifth. In making a pudding the consistency should be too wet to handle, sistency should be too wet to mandle, too stiff to pour.

Sixth. Suet puddings require to be very well cooked. A pudding no larger than a big cup requires at least an hour steaming or boiling, and the larger and richer they are the longer cooking they need. cooking they need. In making suet pastry for meat pies Suet Crust.-One-half pound flour,

one quarter pound suet, one table-spoonful fine breadcrumbs, one tea-spoonful baking powder, a pinch of sait, cold water. Chop the suet very fine, mix all the dry ingredients very well together. Suet Dumpling.-One-half pound flour, four ounces suet, two ounces sugar, one-half teaspoonful baking powder, one-quarter teaspoonful salt, a little milk. Chop the suet finely and add to the flour sugar, baking powder and salt; make a stiff paste with the milk, knead lightly, divide into six pieces and roll up into balls. into six pieces and ton a. Have a saucepan ready with rapidly boiling water, drop in the dumplings and boil gently for three-quarters of

Roly-Poly .- Pastry; jam. Make the suct crust as in forgoing recipe and then roll out to about one-quarter inch thick in all oblong twice as long as it is broad. Spread it with jam to about an inch of the edge, then brush the edge over with water and roll up neatly, pressing the ends well together and keeping the jam in the middle. Place it on a scalded and floured cloth and roll up loosely, so as to leave room for swelling; but tie the ends very tight and quite close to the pudding, carry-ing the string from one end to the other so that it makes a kind of handle by which it can be lifted. Then stitch the edges of the cloth and plunge pudding into rapidly boiling watter, taking care not to bend or break it when doing so, and boil for two hours. To lift the pudding slip a fish slice or even a plate under the pudding with the left hand, catch the string with the right hand and lift gently without bending; take off the cloth and drain away all the water; put on a hot dish, dust over with pow dered sugar and serve very hot with Fig Pudding.—Four ounces flour,
