"Resolved that in view of the great evils arising out of the establishment of canteens for the sale of intoxicating drink to the soldiers forming our military camps, that the secretary of this union be instructed to forward to the honorable, the Minister of Militia at Ottawa, the carnest protest against the continuance of the practice, so that our young Canadian volunteers may no longer be exposed to the temptations there met with, and before which many of them fall into utter ruin." After the opening of the afternoon ses-

2. "Resolved, that this Union deeply regrets the re-establishment of the bar for the sale of intoxicating liquors in the restaurants of the Canadian Houses of restaurants of the Canadian Houses of Parliament, and earnestly hopes the united protest of the friends of religion and temperance throughout the land may lead to its abolishment as a national disgrace." Mr. Geo. Pym seconded the resolutions, both of which were unanimously indorsed by the vote of the Union.

The report of the committee on Sunday schools was then presented by the secre-tary, J. R. Black, Kingston. It read as follows: "Your committee on Sunday follows: "Your committee on Sunday schools have to report that there are 97 per cent. Serious blame attaches somewhere, as more than 2,390 are absent every Sunday. The total amount raised for all purposes was \$2,999. The sum of \$410.99 has been spent for home missions, \$418.88 for foreign missions, \$7 for the college. The remainder was mostly spent on the maintenance of the Sunday schools. The

It, on the other hand, furnished the following grounds for encouragement: I The devotion of so many of the members of the churches to the teaching and official labors of the schools. 2. The statistical accuracy which prevails in a large proportion of our schools, and the promptness with which the officers respond to denominational efforts in their collection. 3. The esteem with which missions and ministerial education are held by some of the schools. 4. The expressed purpose of certain superintendents and teachers to possess for themselves and the scholars under their care, the best literature possible.

The committee recommended: 1. That there be uniformity in the papers and leason helps, and that those of the Boston Congregational publications be generally adopted. 2. That a hymn book be secured adapted to the song service in our Sunday schools. 3. That greater devotion be cultivated in the matter of winning children to Christ. 4. That where the cause of missions or the college has been neglected by the schools, the secretary or chairman of the committee for the coming year be instructed to write the superintendents of such schools with a view of securing their sympathy and support.

A short open parliament on the teaching of temperance in Sunday schools followed, Mr. S. P. Leet, Montreal, answering the questions put before him.

The membership committee then reported, recommending: 1. The acceptance as corresponding members of the Union of the names of local clergymen as printed in report of morning session. 2. That having had an interview with Mr. John Salmon, at which he expressed his desire of continuing his membership with this Union, we recommend that he be allowed to withdraw his resignation. 3. That Rev. Sampson Nichols be received as a member of the Union. 4. That with reference to the application for membership of Mr. W. H. Madill, the committee recommends its acceptance. 5. That in view of Mr. Burton's long and useful connection with us, our warm personal regard for him, and our regret in view of the prospect of his being removed from our fellowship, we recommend that the granting of a letter of dismissal be deferred until such time as an actual necessity for it shall arise, and meanwhile the secretary of the Union be asked, and is hereby authorized to grant him a letter expressing in the most hearty manner our high esteem for him personally, and our pressing in the most hearty manner out high esteem for him personally, and out best wishes for his future. (Applause.) of The committee—with the addition of several brethren named by Mr. Clarke—thaving had a conference with him, were unanimous in advising and urging the withdrawal of his resignation in deforence to the strong desire manifested by the Union that he should do so. They beg to report that Mr. Clarke accepted their recommendation-(applause)—and authorized them to say that with the consent of the union, he would withdraw his resignation with a grateful appreciation of the kind-ness shown him by his brethren.

This sum has been expended on missions, the local church, the local societies themselves and Christian Endeavor convention pur-noses.

London, Tuesday, June 13. CANADIANS are probably not aware that to his many other accomplishments, the new Governor-General adds that of being a good vocalist. While on his way home from Chicago on the Aurania, Lord Aberdeen delighted the saloon passengers by the ex-cellent rendering of two songs at a concert en behelf of the widow and children of one of the ship's company. We may find a prophetic touch in the fact that one of these songs was the familar "Since first I saw thy face, I resolved." LONDON is a self-respecting, self-sup-porting city, and that is the reason why

there is general opposition to the decision of the City Council to take city money to pay for Dominion Government work. This civilized society. all the more unnecessary seeing that Londoners pay fully their share of the surplus millions that have been taxed out of the people and boarded up at Ottawa to be distributed among needy friends of the Administration and disbursed in all sorts of questionable ways, as evidenced in recent scandal investigations.

WE HAVE sad news for such of our readers as belong to the Liberal party, or who sympathize with the fight it has made and is making against monopoly rule: The great convention at Ottawa next week will prove a dismal failure. No matter what happens it will not be a success. How do we know? Why, the editor of the London Free Press has arisen in his might, and so decreed ! Would it not be better, under these circumstances, if Hon. Wilfrid Laurier were to declare the convention off?

IT IS very evident that the different religious bodies view with disfavor the temptations that are daily set before the young men who come up to drill in the eamps by the establishment on the grounds of can-teens for traffic in intextenting liquors. The London and Niagara Methodist Conferences have already made strong protests against the continuance of the system. No doubt the Presbyterian General Assembly, now in session at Brantford, will take action.

"Look at the enormous amount raised by the customs and inland revenue taxes, shout high tax advocates. "Does not that show that we are all prosperous?" Not necessarily so. Does it not rather explain the scarcity of money that farmers, merto political affiliation, now complain about? In Great Britain, the home of civilization, as we have been proud to call it, the festal function of the royal marriage is being approached through a perfect epidemic of horrible murders. There has never been a time in the history of living Englishmen, we learn from a cable correspondent, when savage homicide was as common in England as it is now. Hardly a day passes without the report of some new crime of this sort, and causes celebre are just at the moment so numerous that it taxes the memory to keep track of them separately. There are now, for example, six cases of women found out or kicked to death in country fields, each nvolved in more or less mystery, beside the exciting case of a Sunday school eacher at Ramagate accused of wife murder, and the terrible butchery of a street-walker in London by a policeman, whose confession affords a psychological whose contession anorus a psychological study of absorbing and tragic interest. Curiously enough, the English people re-member preceding years of great unnatural drought as bringing an extraordinary number of murders in that country. But the revolting homicides in America can be traced to no such cause. The Emperor holds that he alone is a proper judge as to whether the army is or is not strong enough, and he rightly concludes that a Parliament which objects to pay for a larger armed force might at any moment vote for a reduction of the present army. The Emperor even goes the length of threatening to devise means for carrying out his views even if the vote of Thursday next is against him. Perhaps he will resist the popular will to a point beyond endur-ance. Well may the taxpayers ask where it is all going to end if this competition in piling up war expenditures is not soon stopped. The record of increases made in European standing armies during the last twenty years is really startling, as will be seen from the following table, which gives the strength of the armies of the different



Mr. Moody addressed the court, saying he understood the discussion now to be opened was that of the admissibility of Miss Borden's evidence at the inquest. He spent three-quarters of an hour maintaining the admissibility and claiming that the defendant's conduct and declarations showing consciousness of guilt would claim that a confession would not be.

The prisoner was visibly affected by the decision, which was in her favor.

He then took the reins and drove along Chatham street and Windsor avenue till he reached Millard's livery stables. Here he halted the horse and got out of the buggy. Policemen Langlois and Lister overtook him just as he alighted and put him under arrest. Hickey died almost instantly.

One of the policemen asked Vrooman why he shot Hickey. Vrooman replied, "Because he smashed me first." Vrooman's face was covered with blood when arrested. It is said that Vrooman was intimate with Hickey's wife for some time, and about a week age she disappeared.

VROOMAN'S STATEMENT

after being arrested is about as follows:

He was driving along Sandwich street when Hickey appeared and insisted on getting into the buggy to talk the matter over about his (Hickey's) wife. The conversation soon grew into a quarrel, when Vrooman says Hickey hit him. He believed Hickey intended to choot him, and for self protection he shot Hickey. 


